## DIFFICULT TO TRACK ILLEGAL IMMIGRANTS IN JAIL

MONTEREY COUNTY taxpayers spend more than \$1 million a year housing criminals and suspects who are in the country illegally and contribute to overcrowding at the Monterey County Jail, officials contend.

"These people are tying up bed space that we could be using for other inmates," said county jail chief Bert Liebersbach.

The Monterey County Sheriff's Office, which runs the jail, isn't even sure how many of its prisoners are in the United States illegally, since the process of tracking foreign-born inmates, legal and illegal, is tricky and far from foolproof.

In fact, the sheriff's department is not authorized to check the immigration status of inmates, a process handled by U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement.

And because immigration agents come from the San Jose area to visit the Monterey County Jail only once a week to screen inmates, many prisoners who might otherwise be identified as illegal immigrants slip through the cracks.

"There is the possibility that a lot of people going through our system don't get identified as being illegal," Liebersbach said.

One reason is that suspects who commit misdemeanor crimes such as drunken driving and petty theft are often released on their own recognizance, meaning they are released quickly without having to post bail after promising to show up in court.

"A drunk driver can be out in four to six hours," he said. "They will be gone before ICE even gets down here," to look into their immigration status.

### Is there a better system?

When a suspect is arrested and booked into Monterey County Jail, the arresting officer fills out a prebooking sheet, which contains a suspect's personal information, including his place of birth.

If he was born outside the United States, ICE will interview him to determine his immigration status.

"If an inmate pops up as an illegal immigrant [and he is still in custody], ICE will put a hold on them," Liebersbach said.

The hold, or detainer, is a document that allows ICE to

## Speed limits may have to be increased

■ Mayor calls law, 'bureaucratic idiocy'

THE SAME state law bringing increases in speed limits on two accident-laden stretches of Monterey County highways and several streets in Pacific Grove could affect radar use on some downtown Carmel streets as well.

In a section drafted to prevent the creation of speed traps, the California Vehicle Code requires local governments to set radar-enforced speed limits on busy roads at the highest speed used by 85 percent of drivers, though factors such as blind driveways and pedestrians walking on the shoulder can justify requiring motorists to go more slowly than they are inclined to.

Studies completed in May 2006 verified 25 mph restrictions on Camino del Monte, Junipero Street, Ocean Avenue, part of San Carlos Street, a portion of San Antonio Avenue and Santa Lucia Avenue; the 20 mph limit on San Antonio between Fourth and Second avenues, and the 15 mph limit on Mountain View from Forest to Ocean. Many drivers exceed posted speeds on most of those roads, but their narrowness, driveways, lack of sidewalks and other "conditions not readily apparent" support the limits, according to the surveys.

But the studies found the 25 mph limit could not be enforced on four city streets: Rio Road between the city limit and Atherton Road, San Carlos between Eighth and 13th avenues, Second Avenue between Carpenter and Santa Fe, and Carpenter Street between Ocean Avenue and the city's northern boundary.

"What it boils down to is a local city cannot just do what it wants with speed limits on the streets," Carmel Police Chief George Rawson told The Pine Cone. "On these four, the survey data did not support the 25 mph posting."

While police could legally cite speeders on those streets

## Public calm as airport gets first baggage carousel

IT'S BEEN two months since Monterey Peninsula Airport installed its first-ever baggage carousel and, for the most part, Peninsula residents seem to be catching on to the idea of circling, slow-moving bags.

Since January, travelers have used the baggage carousel, an ordinary feature of most airports but a modern contrivance heretofore lacking in Monterey. How are Peninsula residents handling the new machine?

"We have observed people sticking themselves through the [baggage claim] opening to see where their luggage is," said Ken Griggs, airport operations supervisor. "That's not a good idea."

The new carousel is more convenient because it allows passengers to spread out and avoid the jostling that was often necessary to retrieve bags in the old claim area, where luggage was piled on a stationary metal shelf.

Although the time it takes for passengers' luggage to arrive at baggage claim is about the same as with the old system, the new baggage area prevents passengers from being exposed to weather and allows greater airport

security. Big city airports have been using carousels for more than 40 years.

"It's an easier method for the public to retrieve their bags," Griggs said. "With the old baggage claim, there wasn't enough space."

# As opposition grows, no word yet on Homecrafters future

DOWNTOWN JEWELRY store manager Carmen Ajan and artist Jim Miller asked the Carmel Community Activities and Cultural Commission Tuesday to recommend moving the Homecrafters Marketplace, held the Saturday prior to Thanksgiving each year, off of Ocean Avenue. Wanting more data that might illustrate the fair's impact on retail sales, the commission put off deciding until next month.

Established more than 30 years ago, the fair — which

features arts and crafts handmade by jury-selected artisans from Monterey, Santa Cruz and San Benito counties — was previously held in the Sunset Center parking lot but relocated to several closed blocks of Ocean Avenue when the theater underwent renovation. Sunset reopened more than three years ago, but the sale stayed put.

Delivering a stack of 30 "STOP The CRAFT FAIR" fliers signed by downtown store owners and workers, Ajan told commissioners she took it upon herself to act after hearing so many complaints from downtown retailers.

"If you want to continue giving the craft fair, several of the businesses are going to close that day," she warned.

Among the businesses that want the fair relocated are Lush Cosmetics, Jewels on Ocean, Robert Talbott, B&G Jewelers, Hildegunn Hawley antiques, Mum's Cottage, La Renaissance, Giles of Carmel, Conway of Asia, Rittmaster, Great Things Antiques, Linens & Such, Wittpen's Antiques, Red Haute and The Club, The Hart Gallery, Carmel Cashmere and Co., Trajan Gallery, Robert Cordy Antiques, Concepts, Wrapunzel, Loran Speck Gallery, Karges Fine Art, Gallery Sur, Lussori, Augustina's, Rip Squeak and The Elegant Set, while St. Mortiz Sweaters suggested a Sunday fair instead.

Herb Osborne, manager of The Sharper Image, wrote, "It draws a crowd that does not shop in my store, uses parking for potential customers and kills my Saturday sales, also forces me to schedule more sales associates to protect my product as too many hands are touching products way out of their price range."

Jim Miller, whose business is the oldest artist-owned

gallery in Carmel, said at the March 13 meeting, "You have to realize it's really unfair to the shop owners who pay really huge rents."

He complained about vendors setting up lawn chairs, sitting on his planter and blocking his doorway while smoking cigars and eating sandwiches.

"When Sunset Center closed, they came around to all the shops and said they had no intention of coming to Ocean. That promise was broken, and now they want to stay," Miller said.

Ajan specifically took issue with the Homecrafters fair, given the time of year it is held and the effect on her business. By contrast, closing the street for the Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance Tour boosts her business, as it attracts clients to the store she manages, Pat Areias Sterling.

"If you want to close three days during the Concours d'Elegance, I'm happy, because they are my customers," she said. "The craft fair is not us."

Commissioners received copies of letters and e-mails submitted to the community recreation department. A Nov. 27, 2006, e-mail from Carmel store owner Ruth Baltes said the fair negatively affects businesses on side streets, and many of the fliers submitted by Ajan were signed by people with shops off of Ocean Avenue.

The packet also included compliments from vendors at the annual sale who described Homecrafters as "my favorite local event," and "a wonderful experience from beginning to

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
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# Elementary students (K through 5) to learn elementary Spanish

**K**IDS IN the three public elementary schools will add Español to their reading, writing and arithmetic next year. Responding to requests from parents and recommendations from administrators and principals, the Carmel Unified School District Board of Education voted Monday night to develop foreign language programs for River, Tularcitos and Captain Cooper schools.

"We have talked about it for years and in fact had minor-league versions of it," though none of them lasted long, superintendent Marvin Biasotti commented before discussion began.

According to a proposal presented by River School principal Jay Marden and Tularcitos principal Brenda Sylvia, kindergartners and first graders would spend 15 minutes three times each week learning Spanish, while kids in grades two through five would sit in 20-minute sessions thrice weekly. The Spanish classes would cut into time spent on other subjects and would not lengthen the school day.

Assistant superintendent Mary Bull said young pupils not only learn additional languages more easily, but tend to perform better in other areas.

"Children have a unique ability to excel in pronunciation, and that's hardly ever replicated if language is learned later," Bull said. Studies also indicate foreign-language learners

demonstrate greater abilities in problem solving, higher thinking, listening and remembering, understanding their native language, and scoring on standardized math and language-arts tests conducted in English. "There's a lot of indication children would benefit tremendously."

"And the more languages we speak, the more access we have to people, libraries and information," Sylvia added.


### Spanish 'not a foreign language'

When Marden and Sylvia began discussing offering another language at their schools, they hadn't already decided it should be Spanish. But, for obvious reasons, they settled on the language of Sebastian Vizcaino and Junipero Serra.

Parent Richard Kreitman commented, "In California, Spanish isn't a foreign language."

The principals said the plan would call for hiring two qualified instructors, one for Tularcitos and one for River, who would roam from classroom to classroom and lead students in lessons while the main teacher remains in the room. (Captain Cooper, a much smaller school with a large percentage of native Spanish speakers, will have a program tai-

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
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


**EARLY, PHYSICAL SIGNS OF ALZHEIMER'S**

As it turns out, the earliest signs of Alzheimer's disease may be physical not mental. That was the finding of researchers who used four measures (walking speed, balance, lower-body strength, and grip strength) to evaluate the physical function of over 2,000 healthy adults aged 65 years and older. Six years after assessing these factors, it was found that those who scored poorly on overall physical performance or walked slowly at the start of the study were more likely to develop Alzheimer's or other types of dementia whether or not they showed any cognitive decline initially. Individuals who had poor balance and no memory problems at the start of the study were also at increased risk for Alzheimer's

Currently there is no medical treatment that cures, stops or reverses the progression of Alzheimer's disease. 

## Dragnet finally catches fleet-footed, vehicle-stealing suspect

A 20-YEAR-OLD Salinas resident allegedly stole and crashed an SUV and two bicycles, all the while shedding and adding clothing to change his appearance, before plain-clothed detectives caught and arrested him Tuesday afternoon, according to Pacific Grove Police Chief Darius Engles.

The chase began at 7 a.m., when a resident in the area of Hillcrest and Congress awakened to see someone breaking into a Chevy Suburban.

As officers arrived, the suspect drove away. With police in pursuit, he sped up and, approaching 19th Street, Engles said, "he jumped out of the vehicle as it was still moving."

The suspect, later identified as Brandon Thomas Gastelum, managed to land on his

feet and fled into the neighborhood as the unmanned Chevy crashed into a fence in front of a house.

Police established a perimeter to monitor all the streets for the suspect, who was wearing a black T-shirt, jacket and dark pants. They briefly stopped passing vehicles, but Gastelum reportedly got through the dragnet by shedding his coat and stealing a bicycle, which he later ditched to again flee between the homes in the area.

On the scene, the P.G. chief requested help from nearby police agencies to set up a larger perimeter and conduct a house-to-house search. The Monterey County Sheriff's Office; police departments in Carmel, Salinas, Seaside and Monterey; the district attorney's office; state parks, and the California Highway Patrol answered the call.

Meanwhile, with so much police activity

in the area and a suspect at large, administrators at nearby P.G. middle and high schools decided to lock down their campuses, Engles said.

Again the suspect emerged from another house, this time wearing a white T-shirt and riding another stolen bicycle, according to Engles. And again he refused to stop as officers yelled at him.

While being pursued down 19th Street by a squad car, Gastelum crashed at Congress and Gibson but got to his feet and ran, including through the open doors of some homes. Police brought out a K-9 to help search but failed to find the suspect.

At around 10:30 a.m., officers gave up their street-by-street perimeter, but they didn't leave.

"We put plain-clothed detectives in the area, knowing he would eventually pop up and be desperate to get out of town," Engles said.

Wary neighbors also kept watch, and around 12:30 p.m., several people reported seeing the suspect, who had apparently been hiding in a garage. Gastelum was arrested

for vehicle theft and residential burglary and lodged at Monterey County Jail. Although bail was set at \$50,000, he was not allowed to post bail because of alleged probation violations.

"I'm very proud of my folks," Engles said. "They were diligent and professional."

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# Police, Fire & Sheriff's Log

## Snoozer contacted while wife shops

HERE'S A look at some of the significant calls logged by the Carmel-by-the-Sea Police Department, the Carmel Fire Department and the Monterey County Sheriff's Office last week. This week's log was compiled by Mary Brownfield.

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

# Peninsula mayors deliver meals to homebound seniors

CARMEL CITY Councilman Mike Cunningham, Pacific Grove Mayor Dan Cort and four other Peninsula mayors will join Meals on Wheels of the Monterey Peninsula to deliver meals to homebound adults on March 21.

The mayors and councilman will be delivering the daily doses of healthy nutrition and good cheer that are the staples of the Home Delivered Meals Program. In 2006,

the program delivered 230,000 meals to 600 local residents.

Homebound clients receive milk, cereal, juice, fresh fruit, a hot entrée, soup or salad and dessert five days a week. On Friday, clients can receive a double meal to see them through the weekend.

The only criteria for participation in the program are being homebound, with an inability to shop or cook for oneself, and with no adult caregiver in the home. Clients are asked to contribute a suggested daily donation of \$5, but no one has ever been turned away at Meals on Wheels because of financial hardship.

In a unique partnership with the SPCA and Best Pet Care and Supplies, Meals on Wheels of the Monterey Peninsula also delivers pet food to elderly animal owners.



A worker who witnessed the accident at around 9 a.m. March 12 reported it. Two of the injured man's coworkers were with him when an ambulance crew arrived from Carmel and made its way down the cliffside to assess the condition of Marco Guerra, who was lying on the rocks beside the six-wheeled work truck.

"The position he was in was really a rough spot. There were rocks all around him, we couldn't roll him over, and we had to take our time because it was a back injury," said Carmel Regional Fire Ambulance paramedic Graham Evans. "The vehicle was leaning over him, there was gas leaking, and the tide was coming in."

Engines from the Pebble Beach and Cypress Fire Carmel Hill stations, which are managed by a state agency, Cal Fire, arrived after the ambulance and quickly decided Guerra would have to be strapped into a Stokes Litter basket and lifted up the cliffside.

"We had to use a full rope system to haul him up — it was just too steep to carry him," Evans said, since Guerra weighs about 200 pounds and the terrain was steep. "We just needed to get him up and out, but it went really smooth. Cal Fire did a really good job — they were awesome on the call."

Battalion chief Buddy Bloxham, the incident commander, said a dozen people, including a Westmed paramedic stationed in Pebble Beach, Evans and CRFA emergency medical technician Elliot Rubin, worked together on the rescue.

"They set up a system with ropes and attached that to the Stokes Litter," Bloxham explained. "The good thing is the tide was out."

The two Pebble Beach Company workers with Guerra were bilingual and able to translate his Spanish into English for the rescuers, "so that assisted with us being able to determine some of his injuries," Bloxham said.

Because it was likely that Guerra's injuries were serious, a California Shock Trauma Air Rescue helicopter was called in and landed on the nearby fairway. After raising Guerra up from the shoreline, rescuers placed him on a gurney and took him to the awaiting air ambulance, which transported him to Santa Clara Valley Medical Center. He reportedly suffered a cracked vertebra, broken thumb and substantial bruises.

The P.B. Co. made arrangements to haul the utility vehicle up from the crash site, and Evans said the fuel spill ended up being inconsequential.

He and Bloxham commented on the cooperative effort of the groups involved. "It was a seamless operation, with teamwork among CRFA and Pebble Beach and Cypress Fire," Bloxham said.

lored its size and demographics, according to Bull.)

"The goal would be to align the study of Spanish with the current curriculum," Sylvia said.

Students could be encouraged to use their Spanish in a wide range of study areas, including art, history, social studies, writing, drama and even math, board members and the principals observed. That could also make up for some of the time taken away from the other subjects in order to teach Spanish.

The goal would be to produce students who could communicate in complete sentences and read by the time they finish elementary school, Sylvia said, which would help support and increase enrollment in Spanish classes at the middle school.

Learning a foreign language early would also enable students to pick a different language to study in middle school or high school, according to Biasotti. In February, the board voted to add Chinese to Carmel High's course offerings.

Marden said River School staff support the concept, and offering the language would satisfy a request frequently found in parent surveys.

Board member Marcy Rustad has long favored offering foreign language lessons to younger kids but cautioned administrators to ensure they communicate to parents exactly what the program will entail so they don't develop unreasonable expectations.

"Unless you articulate very clearly what parents can expect, if you ask if parents are

satisfied, there's a good chance they're not," she said. "They want their kids to be done with Spanish I by the time they're done with fifth grade."

But the elementary school program would not replace that introductory Spanish course designed for older students, and board member Howard Given said annual totals of 30 hours of Spanish for the two lower grades and 40 hours for the four upper grades at the elementary schools would hardly qualify as immersion in a foreign language.

"There's a lot of potential in how you educate parents so their expectations align with what you're trying to achieve," board president Amy Funt observed. "I think parents can be satisfied on a more personal level, hearing how their children sound and seeing what their children pick up."

Annette Yee Steck said, "This is exciting to hear that we're finally actually thinking of implementing it," and all the board members enthusiastically supported the concept by voting in favor of it.

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

## Bechler's reopens after oven blast

FOLLOWING A gas explosion that shut down Bechler's Patisserie in Pacific Grove for four weeks, the bakery is back in business.

The blast, which destroyed the patisserie's industrial oven and sent customers scrambling out of the building, also knocked a portion of the bakery off its foundation. The bakery reopened March 9.

"We are back in business stronger and better," said owner Gerard Bechler. "It's good to be back and have the energy, the people, the whole package."

The bakery sustained at least \$100,000 in damage from the explosion, caused by a natural gas leak. The blast was so powerful, it knocked the bakery's large metal oven door off its hinges and sent it flying several feet away.

"They rebuilt the outside wall," he said. "They had to redo the electric. It's a new oven but the old one was good before the explosion."

Customers were inside the 1225 Forest Ave. business when the blast occurred. Two kitchen workers received singed hair and ringing ears from the blast, which forced firefighters to evacuate buildings within 1,000 feet of the bakery because of the gas leak.

Bechler said word has spread quickly that the popular bakery is back to serving

customers.

"There was a good response," he said. "It's a small community, so everybody knows what's going on."

without using radar, following and pulling over isn't as effective.

"Radar is a critical tool to detect and stop those drivers who drive at speeds that are unreasonable, unsafe and pose threats to the safety of the community," Rawson wrote in his March 13 staff report to the council. "Without radar, the police will be severely limited in effectively responding to complaints about speeding."

San Carlos Street residents Barbara Livingston and Peggy Purchase worried about speeders and heavy trucks passing their homes and asked the council to seek another survey.

"We were very disappointed to see the results on those four streets," Rawson said.

Mayor Sue McCloud wasn't as diplomatic. She called the state law limiting speed enforcement, "the ultimate in bureaucratic idiocy."

"We want to get another opinion and see

if we have a way to address this issue that would keep the radar and the limits at 25 mph," Rawson said.

Pacific Grove recently raised the speed limit on several main arteries to 30 mph. In Monterey County, speed limits are increasing on stretches of highways 1 and 101.

Carmel's chief said police will continue to set up the radar trailer that shows motorists how fast they are going and will use other methods of enforcement until the matter is settled.

"The radar machine seems to slow them down," councilman Gerard Rose commented. "I'm not sure why, but I'm happy that it does."

"We will continue to deploy that," Rawson replied.

McCloud said the city should look into purchasing more, smaller radar trailers to use in heavily trafficked areas where speeding is a problem.

The council adopted the ordinance verifying the limits on the eight streets successfully surveyed.

It also supported commissioning a new study of the other four.

The baggage carousel is part of the airport district's \$5.5 million modernization project, which includes consolidation of the security and waiting areas and seismic retrofit. The upgrades are expected to be completed this fall. As of now, the airport has no plans to add jetways.

### Not a ride

There have been a couple of minor kinks with the new carousel, which cost about \$240,000, but nothing a small amount of tweaking didn't fix, Griggs said.

"Overall, it's obviously an upgrade compared to the system we had before, which wasn't much of a system," he said. "The carousel makes it look like more of an air-

port."

The new baggage claim area is located at the west end of the airport terminal, where the America West ticketing counter used to be.

"The old baggage claim will be the new [Transportation Security Administration] checkpoint," Griggs said.

"There will be a gift shop and snack bar" within the security checkpoint area, which is expected to open in late August.

The airport facelift also calls for a new rental car area between the airport lobby and baggage claim.

## Waiting for signs: 'Don't ride the baggage carousel'

The facility has seen few upgrades since it was constructed in two phases in 1949 and 1972. It's hoped the renovation will encourage local travelers to use the airport, which last year experienced the biggest decline in business in 30 years.

Still, Griggs said they are awaiting signs telling passengers not to monkey around with the new baggage claim machine.

"The point we want to get across is: Don't ride the carousel," he said.

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

end.” One said customers commented the marketplace vendors were “far superior.”

“The highlight of my day was when Wilkes Bashford entered my booth and made a significant purchase of two framed fine art photographs for display in his Carmel home,” he said of the November 2006 Homecrafters.

Commissioner Nancy Jones wanted to know who might have promised not to use Ocean Avenue and asked staff to outline the history of the craft fair at a future meeting. She also wanted to know if Sunset Center would be available for Homecrafters Nov. 17.

Chairman Clyde Klaumann said hard numbers reflecting sales before, during and after the marketplace would be helpful, and Ajan said she would provide those data for the store she manages. After the meeting, she supplied those numbers to The Pine Cone. In 2005, the Saturday prior to the fair yielded \$1,614, while Homecrafters day brought in \$505. The Sunday after the marketplace totaled \$2,631 and the following Saturday, \$3,928. Last year, those numbers were \$1,967, \$260, \$2,999 and \$2,219, respectively.

The commission unanimously voted to continue the matter to its April meeting.

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

take an inmate into custody after he or she has served time in jail or prison. Inmates in this category include those who have entered the country illegally as well as foreign-born legal residents who have committed offenses, such as certain violent and sexual crimes, that make them eligible for deportation.

"In some cases, these people may go into immigration proceedings," and could be deported, said Virginia Kice, spokeswoman for ICE. "It depends on their circumstances."

This week, there were about 50 inmates, of a total of about 1,100, that had ICE detainers. While a few of those may later show proof of residency, with a green card for example, most are illegal immigrants, Liebersbach said.

The number of prisoners with ICE detainers fluctuates in the jail. In July 2006, there were 79, and in October, that number dipped to 49, according to Liebersbach. Every year, several hundred immigrants with detainers pass through the jail, he said.

"We are usually running somewhere in the 50s on any given day," he said.

Nationwide, about 29 percent of federal prisoners are criminal aliens, according to the Federation for American Immigration Reform.

Monterey County Jail Classification Sgt. Jose Mendoza said he believes the number of identified illegal immigrants in the jail would increase dramatically if there was a more efficient way of tracking inmates.

"What about all the people that fall through the cracks?" Mendoza said. "If we had better staffing and a better way of identifying them, I would say our numbers would double."

Kice agreed the numbers would double and said help is on the way.

"Beginning next week, we will add a second ICE officer to assist with the inmate screening at the jail," she said.

Still, others will likely go undetected since some inmates lie, providing phony names and identification cards, Mendoza said.

"There is really no way of knowing if they are telling the truth or not," he said. "It's common practice, especially among gang members, they usually don't carry any ID with them. They will give a friend or family member's name or ID that is clear so they can get off."

When inmates are booked into jail, their fingerprints are taken and run through a Department of Justice program that will identify an inmate, but only if they have been arrested

before and have a record.

"When the prints come back," Liebersbach said. "It doesn't say if you are legal or illegal."

### Not enough space

Liebersbach estimates it costs about \$1.3 million to house illegal immigrants every year. In 2005, the federal government gave Monterey County \$735,000 to help pay for jailing immigrants. While the money, provided by the State Alien Assistance Program, is helpful, local officials contend it doesn't address the biggest problem at the county jail: too many inmates, not enough space.

"It doesn't matter what they pay us when [illegal immigrants] are using our bed space," said Monterey County Undersheriff Nancy Cuffney.

Because of the growing number of immigrants lodged in the jail, inmates are increasingly squeezed into tighter quarters.

"It does have an impact on our current overcrowded situation," Mendoza said. "When their numbers were down to about 20 to 30, we did have them in an individual housing unit. But as their numbers increased, we were forced to spread them out throughout the facility."

More than half of the prisoners with ICE holds are awaiting resolution of their cases in court. The remainder of them

are serving their time, having already been sentenced.

"They are not here just for a couple of days," Liebersbach said. "They can be here for a while."

## PacRep dares to bring 'La Cage aux Folles' to Golden Bough stage

DESPITE ITS enduring popularity, no local theater company had ever attempted the Tony-award-winning 1984 play, "La Cage aux Folles," until the PacRep Theatre started hosting auditions in October.

"The cast requires at least six men who can pull off cross dressing, and there's an incredibly high dance requirement," explained Stephen Moorer, artistic director for PacRep. "They've got to be able to tap

dance, and they've got to be able to do it in high heels."

After what Moorer described as an "excruciating" audition process, PacRep's production of "La Cage aux Folles" opens at the Golden Bough Playhouse this weekend.

"It took us until Feb. 13, just three days before the start of rehearsals, before we had a cast," Moorer said. "We had auditions in San Francisco and Los Angeles. We thought 'The Buddy Holly Story' was hard to cast, but this one was more difficult."

Finding actors who could handle the roles wasn't the only challenge facing PacRep when it decided to take on "La Cage aux Folles."

"It's a costume nightmare like 'Beauty and the Beast,'" Moorer declared. "This show is known for its wild costumes. There also are multiple costume changes, and sometimes cast members even have to rip off their costumes on stage."

"La Cage aux Folles" tells the story of Albin and Georges, two middle-aged partners who run a drag nightclub in St. Tropez, France. All is well at the drag club until one day when Georges' son, Jean-Michael — the result of an affair Georges' once had with an actress — announces his impending wedding to the daughter of a local moral crusader.

"It's a love story between a son and his family," explained director and choreographer Terry Barto. "Over the course of the show, the son realizes his family is important. It's a beautiful story about a family. It's just not your typical family."

"La Cage" also features an irresistible romantic score by Jerry Herman. The end result, according to Moorer, is simply dazzling. The first mainstream Broadway production with a gay theme, the play set box-office records at the Palace Theatre in New York. The play was also nominated for eight Tony awards, winning four, including Best Musical.

Despite the challenges of producing such a play, Moorer is confident Barto can pull it off. So far, he's been impressed by what he's seen.


"It's amazing," he exclaimed. "We've never had tap dancing on our stage before. The dancers are doing full splits in the air. You can't help but get caught up in the excitement."



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
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
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**Sunset concert marks debut of 19th century symphony**

**HIGHLIGHTED BY** the debut of a recently discovered century-old symphony and a work by the "Spanish Mozart," the Monterey Symphony will present its fifth concert of the

season at Sunset Center Sunday, March 18, at 3 p.m. and Monday, March 19, at 8 p.m.

"We are doing the American debut of a 19th century symphony by a Spanish composer named Pedro Miguel Marqués," explained Joe Truskot, executive director of the Monterey Symphony. "It should be a real treat."

Marqués was born in Palma on the Spanish island of Mallorca, not far from the birthplace of Father Junipero Serra. He produced five symphonies between 1869 and 1880.

Marqués was celebrated in his heyday as a powerful composer of the "zarzuela grande," Spanish-language dramatic genre that alternates between spoken and sung scenes.

Conductor Max Bragado-Darman discovered Marqués' Fifth Symphony during his research and brought it to the attention of the Monterey Symphony.

The Monterey Symphony will also perform "Overture to the Happy Slaves," a piece composed by Juan Crisóstomo Arriaga in 1819, when the composer was only 13. Arriaga was born on what would have been Mozart's 50th birthday.

**ROBERT GLENN BECK**

October 3, 1923 - February 24, 2007

Well-known northern California art and antiques dealer, Robert Beck, a resident of San Anselmo, California, died peacefully of complications of Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis following a lengthy illness.

Born in Pilot Rock, Oregon, Mr. Beck was a graduate of Oregon State College and a member of the 1947 graduating class at the U.S. Naval Academy, Annapolis. As a young officer he was appointed Education Administrator of the U.S. Trust Territories in the Pacific, and in early 1950 saw duty as Naval Attache at the American Embassy in Paris, France, during which time he served as liaison officer with the French navy aboard the USS Bellow Woods during the French involvement in Viet Nam.

During the Paris years he met and married his wife, Anna Walbridge. In late 1955 he was assigned Personnel Officer at Treasure Island, San Francisco. Subsequently he resigned from the Navy, earned a teaching credential from San Francisco State College and began a career in education in San Francisco and in Monterey County.

In 1960 Mr. & Mrs. Beck purchased Tassajara Hot Springs in the mountains south of Carmel. They ran the resort until late 1966 when they sold it to the San Francisco Zen Center. He then began in earnest his career as an art and antiques dealer, becoming known as an expert on early 20th century plein air painting. The Robert Beck Gallery in San Anselmo will be continued by his son, Adam Beck.

Robert is survived by his son, Adam, of San Anselmo, his sister, Barbara, of San Diego, his former wife, Anna, of Carmel and by nieces Robin, Jan and Laurie Beck, and a nephew, Jeffrey Beck. A daughter, Anna Kathleen, died in 1994. His countless friends and colleagues in the art and antiques communities will miss his sparkling wit and warm friendship. A memorial celebration of his life will be held in later in Sausalito.

## Big Night Bistro: If you loved the movie, you'll go pazzo over the restaurant

THEY SHARE ownership and chef duties at one of the Peninsula's newest lunch and dinner houses, but Marie and Nino Favalaro are certainly no newcomers to the area or to the restaurant business.

The couple owned Favalaro's restaurant in downtown Pacific Grove's Holman Building — just across Lighthouse from their new establishment — from 1997 to 2005. They also were the proprietors at Ariana's coffee house two doors away until its recent closing.

The thrust of their new enterprise is an oyster bar and a full menu of seafood and Italian specialties, but they also brought over customer favorites from Ariana's — Italian panini and gelato.

The move across the street didn't happen all at once. The Favalaros acquired the property that housed Scotch Bakery in 2000, and later took over the bakery business. Nino did all the baking from 3 a.m., worked all day at the bakery, then at

six o'clock hurried across Lighthouse to the restaurant.

After all that effort, when Marie and Nino ended their eight-year run at Favalaro's, they had retirement in mind. But seven months ago they decided to open a little family restaurant where the Scotch Bakery had been for so many years.

They call the new enterprise Big Night Bistro after the 1996 movie starring Stanley Tucci and Tony Shaloub, who

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

played two volatile Italian brothers, émigrés to the United States, who open their own restaurant and undergo all the exhilaration and heartache inherent in the artistry of the dedicated restaurateur.

The high point in the film is “the big night” — an evening of revelry and savoring of one gourmet course after another, all paired with fine wines. “It’s going to be a big night here every night,” Marie predicted.

The restaurant seats only 20, but the oyster bar, with its six seats and long banquette with two tables for diners waiting for seats in the restaurant is designed for easy conversation among patrons. “Part of the fun of the movie, ‘Big Night’ is everyone is talking to everyone,” Marie said.

The main dining room at the front of the restaurant is divided from the rear oyster bar by a low partition. Replete with many original oil paintings of food and fruit, statuary and green plants, the dining area is casual by day yet romantic by night with white table cloths and much candlelight.

After many years in the restaurant business, Nino and Marie have all the know-how and talent necessary to run a successful business. They met in 1977 at Nino’s Colombo restaurant on Fisherman’s Wharf in Monterey. Marie Ferrante was a high-school student then and worked as a waitress. They

were married when Marie was 18. Later, Nino sold Colombo’s and went into the commercial fishing business with two boats, the Lucky Marie and Sea King.

He continued with this enterprise until 1992, and the next year the couple opened the first Favaloro’s Italian-American Restaurant in the Fairway Shopping Center on upper Forest Avenue in Pacific Grove three days after Marie gave birth to their first child, Ariana.

They enjoyed a four-year run at that location, but in October 1997, a year after son Anthony Jr. was born, they moved the restaurant to the Holman Building on Lighthouse Avenue at Fountain in downtown Pacific Grove.

Because fish and shellfish play such a pivotal roll in Big Night Bistro, the Favaloros have fresh fish and the catch of the day delivered daily by the Monterey Fish Co.

“My dad, who came here from Palermo in 1957, fished and delivered his catch to the Monterey Fish Co. way back then,” Marie said, indicating that a continuity exists.

Nino came out of Palermo when he was 16. He arrived alone, got a job, and later his family followed.

oyster offerings. Nino shucks the oysters to ready them for raw consumption and operates the gas char-broiler by placing unopened oysters on a heavy grating above the gas flame, allowing the heat to open the oysters partially before adding condiments.

There are seven other appetizers, two soups and three salads on the dinner menu from 5 to 9:30 p.m. Nine dishes and four of the 16 pastas are prepared with fish or shellfish. A Big Night cioppino is offered with fresh fish, clams, prawns and scallops in a pescatore marinara sauce.

Serving is done by Sara, Nino's second cousin from Italy, Jennifer and Luigi.

Lunch is a simpler affair: Soups and salads, seven entrées and dessert are offered, but the 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. specialties are 11 Italian panini — grilled sandwiches — and "The American hamburger."

Nino and Marie prepare

everything on the menu for lunch and dinner on the premises, even the freshly baked bread. Nino bakes a crunchy crusted bread with extra virgin olive oil, kalamata olives and rosemary to impart a distinctive flavor, as well as a semolina loaf.

Marie takes pleasure in selecting wines for the Big Night Bistro wine list composed of fine California and imported Italian wines. The prices are moderate, and if a patron doesn't want to order a full bottle, many wines are available by the glass.

"Nino and I love to cook," Marie said. "The children are happy and come to the restaurant right after school and have dinner. Ariana's an honor student and Anthony Jr. is an artist. Ariana sometimes is the hostess for dinner, and Anthony Jr. can study upstairs."

# An indulgent weekend on the Seine — without leaving home

IT MAY not be possible to go to France without leaving American soil, but I came pretty close this past weekend. The Lodge at Pebble Beach hosted “Dining on the Seine,” the third (and final) event in its Winter Food & Wine series. Previous weekends took guests to California Wine County, and then off to Tuscany with famed Italian winemaker Piero Antinori, before a final journey to the Burgundy, Bordeaux, Alsace, Rhone Valley and Champagne regions of France.

Sadly, I can count on one hand how many times I’ve ventured inside the gates of Del Monte Forest. Usually it’s been to take out-of-towners on the *de rigueur* tour of 17 Mile Drive or to interview various Pebble Beach culinary figures,

so to experience the luxury of staying at Pebble Beach for an entire weekend was a wonderfully eye-opening experience. I don’t golf, or even like it all that much, but was breathless over the beautiful grounds. And don’t get me started on the glorious view of the bay from The Lodge at Pebble Beach.

After checking into our room at The Lodge, smack dab on the 18th Hole, my boyfriend, Morgan, and I embarked on a three-day epicurean tour de force that gives the now-defunct Masters of Food & Wine a serious run for its money. The weekend kicked off with a lavish opening reception in the Card and Library rooms featuring tastings of the 1989 vintage from each of the first-growth Bordeaux producers — Château Latour, Château Lafite Rothschild, Château Mouton Rothschild, Château Haut-Brion and Château Margaux. The

array (and superior quality) of wines available to taste was dizzying, even for a skilled consumer like myself. Since I like to play favorites when it comes to food and wine (and I know it will induce major wine envy), the wines that made me go gaga, categorized by station, were:

- The Champagne Station — Salon Blancs de Blancs 1996 and Billecart-Salmon Cuvee Nichola Francois 1998;
- The Burgundy Station — Domaine de L’Arlot, Nuits-St.-Georges Blanc A.C. 1999 and Domaine de L’Arlot, Vosne Romanee, Les Suchots Premier Cru 2004; and
- The Rhone Station — Chateau Rayas, Châteauneuf-du-Pape 2002.

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# Editorial

## A battle no one has won

PROponents of creating a Town of Carmel Valley don't like the fact that they're being required to prepare an EIR before their incorporation proposal is submitted to voters. They dislike it so much, they filed a lawsuit asking a court to let them out of the EIR requirement. Unfortunately for the incorporation advocates, this is a legal battle nobody in this state has ever won.

That's too bad because, as this newspaper has long argued, if the people of Carmel Valley want to form their own town, nobody on the outside should place any serious obstacles in their way.

Unfortunately, the people who pass the laws in this state (in other words, Democratic party legislators) don't agree. Almost 15 years ago, they enacted a law forbidding new cities from taking their tax dollars with them when they incorporate. That's because, in almost every county, some neighborhoods (in Monterey County, think Pebble Beach and Carmel Valley) pay far more in taxes than they get in services. If these communities want to incorporate, the legislature decided they should be required to pay alimony to the county they leave behind — a requirement that unfairly interferes with the basic right of self-determination, we argued almost six years ago. (See [www.carmelpinecone.com/010713-5.pdf](http://www.carmelpinecone.com/010713-5.pdf).)

Not only do the people of new cities have to pay for the privilege of electing their own mayors and city councils, the Legislature has imposed a broad requirement that anybody who does anything that could be characterized as "development" (lay a sidewalk, sell an historic building, create a city, etc., etc.) first submit an exhaustive report analyzing the "significant environmental impacts" of what they want to do and suggesting all sorts of ways to change it so these impacts are minimized ("mitigated," in government-speak). Also, this law, the California Environmental Quality Act, requires the agency in charge of granting permits for the project to modify it so the mitigations identified in the environmental report are included. As the proponents of creating a Town of Carmel Valley — and many private landowners before them — have discovered, complying with this law can be so onerous it kills their project.

Nevertheless, it is indisputable that CEQA was meant by the Legislature to be interpreted very broadly. That's why it's shot through and through with ambiguous language purposely included to avoid giving developers an out. To put it plainly: If a government agency requires you to do an EIR, you have to do it. And any lawyer worth his salt would advise a client who's been required to do an EIR to get it over with, making sure the EIR is as comprehensive as possible. There have been hundreds of lawsuits in this state challenging decisions that this project or that project didn't need an EIR, or challenging the adequacy of an EIR once it was finished. A great many of them have been successful. But, according to our research, there has never been a successful lawsuit challenging a requirement that an EIR be done.

That's why, if the people of Carmel Valley backing the incorporation movement are serious about their mission, it would be far wiser for them to figure out a way to get the EIR finished. Fighting it out in court is a sure way to lose.

### Doesn't like new signs

Dear Editor,

On March 2, state parks erected three new informational signs in the parking lot of the Carmel River State Beach.

The information presented attempts to give facts about the Carmel River Lagoon, the migration of the steelhead trout and the habitat of the red-legged frog. Unfortunately, the information is presented in such a way that you come away feeling that the problem stems solely from the homeowners who have built homes in the floodplain and on the bluff above the beach. The explanation goes as far as to blame Father Serra for the contamination that started after he built the mission in 1770.

My opinion is that the presentation is not a well balanced portrayal of the conditions that currently exist and does not address the fact that there are eight government agencies and at least four nonprofit organizations currently working together to try and resolve these issues. These signs are not appropriate, nor are they comprehensive enough to help bring about a solution.

The duty of state parks, and its main focus, should be to maintain the beach. The cost of these signs would have been better spent on reopening the beach access at Valley View by repairing the steps, clearing the overgrown iceplant, replacing the wooden bench and filling the unsightly marsh created by the erosion of the slope by the Carmel River's ill-conceived northern breach.

State parks has also diminished public beach access by removing two parking places for the space occupied by the new signs and has not contributed any meaningful information for the resolution of the lagoon's preservation. Further, it has not implemented a plan to restore the Carmel River State Beach so that the public can enjoy what is one of the most scenic beaches on the West Coast.

I don't know who is directly responsible for the creation of these signs or what agency actually paid for them; however, I believe the information stated on the signs did not receive a proper review process and should be removed.

After two hours of wine bliss, chefs Russal Rassallat and Patrick Mullin offered a sumptuous five-course feast at Club XIX which, of course, commenced with more Champagne (Krug Grande Cuvee, Champagne N.V.).

Next day, the intimate group of 32 attendees was committed to the cause and ready for more at the 11 a.m. Dom Pérignon panel tasting, where we quaffed the following vintages: 1998, 1993 Oenotheque, 1990 Oenotheque, 1985 Oenotheque, 1973 Oenotheque and a lovely 1996 Rosé. The 1985 Oenotheque was so delicious, it nearly brought tears to my eyes.

Next, a leisurely stop for a French-bistro-style lunch on the sun-drenched patio at Club XIX — the Kumamoto pearl oysters & Tuna Tartare was perfectly paired with the Ladoucette Pouilly-Fume 2003 — and then we were ready for the highly anticipated panel tasting of Domaine de la Romanée-Conti, including: Echézeaux, Grands-Echézeaux, Romanée-St.-Vivant, Richebourg, La Tâche and Romanée-Conti — all 2003 vintages, and all divine.

Then, a quick spin to The Beach and

Tennis Club and a short nap refueled us for that evening's Veuve Clicquot Grand Dame Reception and seven-course Chef's Grand Tasting Dinner.

Just as I thought I was getting used to consuming wine nearly around the clock and a 20,000-calorie-per-day diet, I hit a wall on the third course when I devoured a decadent duet of terrine and seared foie gras. However, I recovered in time to partake of the 1988 Château d'Yquem, Sauternes being served with Club XIX's signature Grand Marnier soufflé & crème brûlée.

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

If you didn't know it was there, you might easily pass by the GREAT WALL OF CARMEL. It's a Carmel stone monument, 2-1/2 feet wide and slightly higher than a man's head, that completely encloses an entire block. 4th and 5th Avenues are on north and south, Guadalupe on the east, Santa Rita on the west. All along the top of the wall are jagged stones set on an edge, a distressingly sadistic touch. The wall dates from 1925, when a man named Smith (from Southern California) caused it to be built by two stone masons who spent three years on the project. He planned a major estate on the property, but went no further than a caretaker's cottage, elaborate walks, patios, pools, and a giant BBQ pit before his interests led him to a farm in the lower Carmel Valley and his block was sold.

He headed back south, and today there are many small lots and private homes inside the enclosure. A few gateways have been broken through, and here and there a growing pine tree is winning the war of the wall. Start at Guadalupe and 4th where you'll find the main gate, a forbidding iron structure with the initial "S" set in small stones beside it, then walk around this interesting block... you'll enjoy it. You might even hear the hoof beats of the horse who haunts the great wall!


