HUNDREDS FLOCKED to the Mission Wednesday to witness history, as Pope Francis, visiting Washington, D.C. during his first trip to the United States, canonized Junipero Serra, the founder of almost half of the missions in California. While the crowd watched the ceremony via a live feed to a Jumbotron set up in the courtyard, and news crews from all over the world looked on, a group of American Indians held their own quiet ceremony nearby, remembering their ancestors and the pain and death they experienced during the construction of the Mission in the 1770s. Serra's new sainthood is expected to substantially increase the number of visitors to the Mission, where he is buried. Meanwhile, the statue of Junipero Serra that keeps watch over the north entrance to Carmel was vandalized Wednesday morning with eggs and black paint. See page 11A

Tassajara fire: Started by a suicide

AUTHORITIES AREN'T releasing the name — or even the gender — of the person whose suicide led to the nearly 1,100-acre wildfire that destroyed a dozen homes and damaged a 13th before it was brought under control late this week, but investigators confirmed the victim intentionally burned to death.

The blaze began around 3 p.m. Sept. 19 in the area of Carmel Valley and Tassajara roads, and was quickly whipped into a firestorm by hot, dry winds and parched vegetation.

When she went to begin her work piecing together how and where the fire started, Cal Fire investigator Catey Trenner discovered the person's burned body in a grass clearing.

"I found the individual in a clearing area, next to a vehicle. The vehicle was not burned," Trenner said. The body was in an area where the grass had been trimmed, but the fire quickly spread to longer grass, then into trees and shrubs, across the creek bed and up the steep hillside, raging out of control. "We had extreme weather conditions, and it got

going."

The fact someone committed suicide by catching himself on fire is "kind of hard to comprehend," she said, adding that nothing suggests the person meant to ignite a wildfire in the process. "There's no evidence pointing to that at all."

Trenner said the Monterey County Sheriff's homicide detectives who were also sent to the scene Saturday determined the victim died of suicide, not murder.

Rescuing pets no small feat

RETURNING HOME from the SPCA with a new dog last Saturday afternoon to join their numerous other pets, Cachagua resident Stacey Jacobs and her family suddenly noticed something ominous on the horizon. Collectively, their hearts sank.

"We had just made it past mid-valley when I saw what can only be described as a mushroom cloud," Jacobs told The Pine Cone. "I said, 'My God, that's in Cachagua.'"

Jacobs and her husband, Matt — who were traveling with their three children — realized immediately that the smoke they saw rising in the east was coming from a wildfire. While the new SPCA dog, a great Pyrenees, was

Paddleboarders visit iconic, but off-limits, Big Sur beach

SCOTT EASTWOOD and five friends defied the odds in mid-August when they used stand-up paddleboards to access the elusive but much-photographed beach at Julia Pfeiffer Burns State Park. Photos from the trek — including one memorable image of a paddleboarder taking a dunk under the park's famous waterfall — went viral after they were posted online.

But the images have also captured the attention of a local state parks official, who said the beach Eastwood and his friends visited is closed, and they should not have been there.

According to Mat Fuzie, supervisor for state parks in the Monterey district, except for military bases, every beach in the state is open to the public — even if you have to reach it by boat — but that rule only applies to the portion of a

beach below the mean high tide line.

Above that, access can be restricted by the owner of the beach, or by state or local law. At Julie Pfeiffer Burns, Fuzie said, "the beach above the high tide line is closed by a local ordinance."

Fuzie called the beach and its dramatic surroundings "one of the popular viewsheds in the world." But trying to reach the beach by land is dangerous, as a young woman discovered last month. Despite prominent warning signs, Medina Faraz, 20, fell to her death Aug. 28 while trying to climb down the cliffs above the beach. Others have made the same mistake and paid the same price, and that's why the beach is off-limits.

Meanwhile, rough surf conditions usually make paddleboarding along the Big Sur coast too dangerous to even



Commission OKs Hahn, nixes chocolate factory, and decides Barmel is a bar

HAHN WINERY can open a tasting room in Carmel Plaza, and Gabe Georis' Barmel is now officially classified as a drinking establishment — and can stay open until 2 a.m. — Carmel Planning Commissioners decided Wednesday.

But the commission was divided over a use permit for a new candy store on Dolores Street, and the tie vote meant that the shop's permit was denied — even though the owners submitted a revised plan after commissioners asked for one last month.

'Locals certainly eat chocolate'

The Carmel Chocolate Factory, proposed for Dolores Street, was to be a sister store to the Monterey Chocolate Factory on Fisherman's Wharf, and would have featured confections made at the Monterey location and brought to the Carmel store every day. While Dennis and Rashmi Joshi originally proposed displaying their candy in barrels, they revamped the design with glass cases, wood shelves and granite counter tops after commissioners objected last month to the barrel display as not befitting of a Carmel store — especially in a historic storefront like the location they planned to occupy on Dolores Street.

"We've worked hard to try to meet the design aspects that evoke the Carmel values," the Joshis' architect, Derek Etow, told the commission at the Sept. 23 meeting. The new plan for Carmel was "quite different" from the Monterey store, the architect said.

"All our chocolates are handcrafted of the highest quality," Dennis Joshi explained in a letter. "We are extremely excited and hopeful to become a part of the Carmel-by-the-Sea community."

But commissioner Keith Paterson said that regardless of the improvements in the design, the store wouldn't be a good choice for the storefront, which was occupied by an antiques store for many years, and was a dry cleaner prior to that. "I somehow don't see this fitting into that space," he said, because he didn't feel "this is a store we would want in Carmel."

Commission chair Don Goodhue agreed, saying the business is "totally tourist oriented."

"It's not consistent with the quality of the shops on our streets," Goodhue said, and he worried the store would have a "carnival atmosphere," and run counter to the general plan policies governing the mix of downtown businesses.

Commissioner Michael LePage countered that the commission was "getting into some dangerous territory when we start trying to define every business by if a local would shop there."

"Locals certainly eat chocolate," he added.

But the Joshis needed a four-fifths vote in favor of their permit, and with commissioner Jan Reimers recusing herself from that hearing because she owns property within 500 feet of the store, the commission voted 2-2 on a motion to approve the permit, with Goodhue and Paterson dissenting. The tie vote meant the application was denied.

Drinking establishments

At the same meeting, commissioners spent considerable time discussing what constitutes a "drinking establishment" in town, because a city ordinance says the town can only have three. While several restaurants also have bars, like Il Fornaio and the Hog's Breath, senior planner Marc Wiener suggested the commission officially declare that the three bars in town are Sade's on Lincoln Street, A.W. Shucks on Ocean Avenue, and Barmel on San Carlos Street. The designation means their primary purpose is to serve alcohol, with food as an additional service.

After some deliberation over the other places that might be considered bars, commissioners ultimately agreed with Wiener, even though the three businesses are quite different from each other. Wiener said he based his recommendations on the businesses' operations and floor plans, which are dominated by bars, not restaurant seating.

Commissioners unanimously agreed to designate the three businesses as the city's drinking establishments, and then moved on to the issue of Barmel's hours, which Georis requested be extended to 2 a.m. from the current closing time of midnight.

While the bar had stayed open until 2 a.m. when it was operating as Ody's, after Georis bought the business and extensively remodeled it, he learned the use permit in fact limited the hours to 11 a.m. to midnight.

"It's caused us some serious financial hardships. We've persevered and taken the time and come back to prove we're serious about doing a good job," Georis told commissioners. He described Barmel as "a gathering place for residents to

come together and enjoy each other's company, not just to drink too much."

In a letter to the commission, he argued for the extended hours by pointing out the location's long-standing operation as a bar, the fact there are no residences nearby that could be affected by late-night revelry, he runs "a tight ship" when it comes to noise and service, he has a good relationship with the police department, and the bar generated only one noise complaint in the past year (as opposed to the 17 complaints at Brophy's).

Wiener recommended extending the hours, "primarily due to the location of the site, which is surrounded by non-residential uses." He also said the planning commission would be updated on Barmel's operations in six months, and if the later hours have created any problems or generated ---complaints, commissioners could deal with the issues then.

After a couple of people spoke in favor of the new hours,



Police, Fire & Sheriff's Log

You're too old to be a shoplifter!

HERE'S A look at some of the significant calls logged by the Carmel-by-the-Sea Police Department and the Monterey County Sheriff's Office last week. This week's log was compiled by Mary Schley.



Em Le's abruptly closes amid rent dispute

ONE OF downtown's most familiar eateries served its final cups of coffee Tuesday. Mena and Jimmy Hogan, who purchased Em Le's a decade ago, shut it down after they and the building's owners failed to come to an agreement on a new lease for the space the restaurant occupied on Dolores Street. They also fought over back rent and whether the Hogans could sell it.

"Keeping the restaurant open isn't feasible anymore," Jimmy Hogan said Tuesday afternoon. "I'll really miss the customers and the friendships."

Kim Campise, Mena's daughter, said the landlord "became more and more unmanageable," about the lease. "It got to that point where we couldn't do anything about it."

The building is owned by Catherine Compagno, and she and her son, John, manage it. John Compagno, who is an attorney, said he had been in talks with the Hogans for several months, and that he had done what he could to help them.

"They've been tenants since 2005, and in 2010, when the market was down, we reduced the rent substantially," he said. But when the lease expired in 2014, he told them the rent revert to what it was in 2009.

"We had always talked about when the term's up, we're going to increase the rent back to where it was, and that's essentially what we did," he said.

But the Hogans said they couldn't pay it, didn't sign the new lease, and continued to pay the old rent.

At Compagno's suggestion, they also considered selling Em Le's to someone who might continue operating it at the same location. "We went to Carmel Business Sales and they brought us a legitimate buyer," Jimmy Hogan confirmed.

Compagno said the buyer was interested in Em Le's and would have also paid market-rate rent in the space.

But Hogan claimed the landlord wouldn't

allow the sale to proceed until the higher rent was paid, dating back to the expiration of the old lease.

"He wouldn't let the sale go through, because he claimed I owed him back rent," Hogan said. "He was charging me as if I had signed my option to extend my lease."

Compagno responded that a sale couldn't be completed unless the balances were cleared and the Hogans signed a new lease.

"I said, 'OK, you guys don't have a lease, so you don't really have anything to sell,'" he recounted. "So you need to pay your rent and put a new lease in place, so you can sell your business."

The Hogans said they offered to pay their back rent after the sale closed, but Compagno said that wasn't acceptable.

"We're not going to go through all the work on hope of getting the rent when it sells," he said. "You don't underpay rent and then try to use that as a negotiating point."

At loggerheads, they gave their 30-day notice last month. "We can't sell it, and we can't pay the high rent," Mena Hogan said.

"It's such a shame to see a Carmel icon, Em Le's, close," her husband said.

Hogan, who owned a laundromat as well as Goodies Deli in Pacific Grove, purchased Em Le's after hearing from a customer who worked there that the restaurant was for sale.

"And my wife had been here before, and she really liked the concept," he said. "We both just fell in love with it."

Hogan said he will miss the customers, the friendships and the pleasure of seeing his regulars. "Clint Eastwood is a regular in here," he said. "He comes in."






Coastal commission, city try to come to agreement on beach fires

A PROGRAM to limit beach fires that was approved by the city council in May won't be heard by the California Coastal Commission until November or December, city administrator Doug Schmitz said Friday.

The delay is to give the coastal commission's staff more time to examine the plan, and to work out some changes with the city before asking the commission to OK it.

"Obviously, we would like to work out something that's agreeable to the coastal commission staff," public works director Rob Mullane said. "We want to talk about what all the different options are for the coastal commission, as well as for the city."

The plan approved by the council in May calls for the placement of 26 fire rings on the beach south of 10th Avenue, with the idea of getting fires off the sand to help keep it clean, while limiting the number of wood fires to protect air quality.

After high levels of smoke were detected in the residential area along Scenic Road this summer, the council also enacted a year-long emergency ban on weekend fires.

While the coastal commission will certainly share the

city's concerns about pollution of the beach and the air above it, part of the commission's mandate is also to protect public access to the state's beaches, and Schmitz said the extra time will "allow time for the city and commission staff to meet and discuss options on how to proceed."

Hoping they'll be forthright

Mullane said he hopes the coastal commission staff members will be forthright about what restrictions they find objectionable about the current plan or any proposed alternatives.

"That's the purpose of the meeting — to talk about all the various options," he said. "We'll be looking at possible revisions to the program, including possibly maintaining the prohibition on wood fires for Friday, Saturday and Sunday, or just allowing propane fires seven days a week, or some hybrid that would allow some use of wood-burning fire devices, but most likely fewer than the 26 in the current pilot program."

The meeting with the coastal commission's staff, which Mullane hopes will happen next week, will probably include him, city administrator Doug Schmitz, Carmel Police Chief Mike Calhoun and possibly Mayor Jason Burnett.

STOLEN HANDMADE PURSE RETURNED

THE OWNER of a crocheted tote bag that was stolen late last month got good news Monday when it was unexpectedly returned.

On Aug. 27, the large felted wool bag that Carrie McWithey crafted to hold jewelry, hats, arm warmers and other items she makes and sells at farmers' markets was stolen from her car in Monterey. Days after the items were pinched, a friend of McWithey's who works at a coffee shop in Seaside spotted a female customer with the stolen tote.

The friend got the woman's number, and McWithey exchanged text messages with the lady, who assured her that she wanted to return the bag. However, that didn't happen.

On Monday, though, McWithey told The Pine Cone that she got a surprising call from her friend at the cafe.

"She texted me and said, 'I have your bag, come to the shop,'" McWithey said.

The tote was in good condition although its stolen contents — worth about \$3,000 — were missing.

"It had leaves on it and it kind of smelled like perfume that's not my own," according to McWithey, who said she promptly threw the bag in the washing machine.

According to her friend, an unidentified man arrived at the coffee shop with the tote saying he was "told to deliver the bag" and something about "working for God." He didn't say who gave him the bag.

In any case, McWithey said she's thankful it was returned.

"I'm happy to be done with it," she said. "It's a big relief to not have to think about it anymore."


All about water: bills, meters and the drought

“Our deputies saw the scene and thought it looked suspicious, so the detectives did their thing and concluded it was a suicide,” said sheriff’s Cmdr. Keith Wingo. “They were there pretty quick — some of the guys’ shoes were melting.”

Due to the condition of the body, the coroner’s office is requesting dental X-rays for comparison, in order to identify the victim, according to Wingo. Until then, authorities are releasing little information about the person.

Evacuations, outages

Within 12 hours after the fire started — and quickly darkened the sky with a gigantic mushroom cloud — it had grown to more than 1,000 acres and displaced residents. A massive effort led by Cal Fire and the Cachagua Volunteer Fire Department was augmented by help from numerous other federal, state and local agencies, as well as engines from other parts of a state already ravaged by devastating and deadly wildfires.

Cal Fire Battalion Chief Scotty McLean, the public information officer for the Tassajara Fire, said extremely dry brush and trees, steep terrain, and hot, dry weather made the fire so vicious and difficult to fight.

“Fires have burned with such intensity this year — it’s amazing,” he said. “We were finding spot fires a quarter mile away. This fire was very dynamic, because of the topography, the heavy, heavy brush, and it being so dry.”

Air tankers dropped water and retardant — at one point drenching a Cachagua volunteer firefighter’s truck with the pink substance — bulldozers cut fire breaks, hand crews worked on the ground with tools in order to clear vegetation, and firefighters sprayed water and lit back fires wherever and how ever they could, to try to control its spread. At the height of the fight, personnel assigned to the Tassajara Fire numbered more than 750, and they set up a large base camp in Toro Park and commuted to the fire zone.

“We had a place we were starting to set up closer to the fire, but that wouldn’t logistically support us,” McLean said. “Toro Park really has everything we need. It’s great.”

With roads closed and mandatory evacuations in effect, the Red Cross set up a shelter at Carmel Middle School. Cell service, Internet and power were all interrupted, causing anxiety for those inside and outside Cachagua.

Firefighting efforts held the blaze to 1,086 acres, and 12 houses were burned, along with eight outbuildings, while a 13th home was damaged. Among them was the residence of Cachagua Fire volunteer Bob Eaton, who was driving an

engine at the time.

“As he was out trying to save lives, his house burned to the ground,” Cachagua Fire reported on its Facebook page Sept. 20. “Bob is a hero, and all of us at Cachagua Fire are proud to work alongside Bob.”

Also during the fire, a 63-year-old Tassajara Road resident who reportedly lost his home to the flames got into a fight with a firefighter who was trying to convince him to leave the evacuation area, according to the Monterey County Sheriff’s Office. The man, Jack West, was arrested Monday for battery after allegedly punching and shoving the firefighter, Richard Dickinson.

Recovery

By Wednesday, with the fire just under 90 percent contained, fire crews began repairing fences they’d had to cut

through and mitigating other damage they caused while battling the blaze, McLean said.

“We basically try to remove the footprints that we put in there,” he said. “It’s not just putting the fire out — we are the division of forestry for the State of California. That’s the big picture.”


Late in the week, PG&E crews were still out in full force in Cachagua, working to restore power. While many had already regained it, a little more than 100 residences remained without power as of Thursday, and PG&E officials expected to have everyone back online by Saturday night. Roads were reopened and evacuation orders were lifted Thursday afternoon.

The Monterey County Office of Emergency Services has

Grand pipe organ installed at C.V. church

A WEEK after all the parts — 5 tons of them — were dropped off at St. Dunstan's, the installation of the Carmel Valley church's new \$700,000 pipe organ is nearly complete. But now the organ will need tuning, and the process could take up to a month.

No ordinary organ, the instrument was designed by Dobson Pipe Builders of Lake City, Iowa. The company made headlines two years ago when it won a worldwide competition for the contract to build a new organ in a 13th century stone chapel at Merton College, which is part of Oxford University in England. So rare and complicated are the instruments, Dobson has built fewer than 100 of them over the past four decades.

\$700,000 for 1,008 custom-made wood and metal pipes

The story of how a small church on Robinson Canyon Road came to acquire such an extraordinary musical instrument starts with Steve Denmark, who began playing the organ at St. Dunstan's after his daughter, Jennifer, died at 26 in a Big Sur car accident five years ago. The rector of St. Dunstan's, the Rev. Rob Fisher, told The Pine Cone that playing music at the church proved to be a healing experience for the grief-stricken father.

It was Denmark who first suggested that the church replace its very ordinary electric organ with pipe organ of a much higher quality — and price tag. When the idea picked up steam, he and his wife, Karen, kicked off the fundraising drive by making a generous \$50,000 donation.

"Steve is not just a gifted musician," Fisher said. "In the midst of his own process of healing after a great tragedy, he had a vision of a fine instrument gracing our space. In some deep sense, this organ is a memorial to Jennifer."

The organ fund received a big boost when Denmark's brother, Tom, donated \$70,000, and the church's first

organist, the late Sallie Witter, left \$71,000 in her will. To date, a total of \$450,000 has been collected, while an additional \$250,000 is being financed at an interest rate Fisher called "very reasonable."

When the parts and materials for the organ were delivered, more than 30 church members joined four builders in what resembled an old-fashioned barn-raising party. Like all of Dobson's instruments, the organ was custom-designed to fit the church's sanctuary. "Every organ they build looks like none they've ever built," Fisher noted.

Understandably, Fisher is thrilled to watch the organ come to life. It stands 20 feet high, and is 15 feet wide and 9 feet deep. It has 1,008 pipes, some made of wood and others made of metal. As the rector described them, the pipes range from "the size of a tree" to "the size of a drinking straw."

"It complements the space very well," he suggested. "I had no idea it would be this beautiful. If it sounds half as good as it looks, we will be in for a real treat."

The rector is patiently awaiting the day when music will fill the church's sanctuary.

"The [month-long] tuning process starts this week," he explained. "We think we'll start using it for services in early November, but we'll have to wait for the green light."

The arrival of the organ is good news not only for church members who love music, but it's also a boon for two local music nonprofits, the Carmel Bach Festival and Hidden Valley Music Seminars. Fisher said he has talked to Bach Festival officials about staging concerts at the church — Bach was, of course, an organist — and he's met with the folks at Hidden Valley about using the sanctuary for organ classes.

While the organ will no doubt bring attention to St. Dunstan's, Fisher said he also believes the music played on it will bring people closer to God "in a special way that mere words cannot."

with them, they feared for the lives of their other animals, which were left home alone.

They eventually were able to get to their house, which is located about a quarter-mile from where the Tassajara Fire started. But they couldn't stay long because it was too dangerous. "I could see the orange flames," Jacobs recalled.

Along with valuable documents and cherished photographs, the family quickly evacuated their five dogs from the 10-acre property. But they had counted on a neighbor to use a trailer to rescue their three goats and three mini donkeys, and the neighbor wasn't able to reach their home due to road closures. So Jacobs wrote her phone number on two of the donkeys with a Sharpie — and prayed they would be okay.

"I wished them goodbye," she said. "I told them I was so sorry. It was terrible."

Before leaving, Jacobs was faced with a difficult decision. Would her pets be safer if she left their enclosure open so they could escape? Or would they be safer in their pen, where they couldn't get in the way of firefighting vehicles? She decided to close the gate.

"It was an awful decision to have to make," she explained. "If I'm wrong, they don't get a second chance."

After learning that her neighbor was unable to help, Jacobs called the SPCA for Monterey County and asked if they could rescue the goats and donkeys. "They were my only hope," she said.

The SPCA said right away they would try to help, Jacobs said, but they were unable to reach the home as the fire spread through the rural Upper Carmel Valley community.

Saturday night, Jacobs worried about her pets while she slept in the back seat of her Prius with the great Pyrenees she had adopted earlier that day.

In the back of her car, Jacobs had an opportunity to catch up on news of the fire through email and Facebook. "Cachagua Fire did a brilliant job of letting people know what was happening," she said, "It sounded like the fire was moving away from our home."

Early the next morning, her husband successfully managed to reach the family's property. "The house was still standing, and the goats and donkeys were wondering what was happening," she explained.

Her husband wasn't home long before he heard a knock on the door. "It was Jackie [Lee] from the SPCA," Jacobs reported. "She said, 'We're here to get your donkeys and your goats.' They had a trailer."

Using apples and carrots as an inducement, the SPCA team quickly moved the donkeys into the trailer. The goats weren't nearly as cooperative, but eventually they, too, were

loaded into the trailer.

At the SPCA, Jacobs was reunited with her goats and donkeys — and fed them their favorite treat, Australian black licorice. They were placed in a stall next to other refugees from the Tassajara Fire. On one side was a particularly charming male goat who flirted with the Jacobs' female goats. And on the other side was "a beautiful white horse and his best friend, a mini donkey." "They're icons along Tassajara Road," she said of the mismatched pair.

The Jacobs have returned to Cachagua with their dogs, goats and donkeys. Also, the newest addition to their menagerie, the recently adopted great Pyrenees, got to see her new home for the first time.

"She's very happy," Jacobs explained. "She was afraid her new home was in the back of a Prius."

Now that the fire has been extinguished and life is returning to normal, Jacobs wants to let the SPCA know that she deeply appreciates their help.

"I am absolutely thrilled to sing the praises of the SPCA," she added. "They truly did everything they could. Things could have turned out very differently without their help. They made such a big difference."

Asst. public defender blames media for sex predator housing troubles

THE NEWS media this week were blamed in part for failure by a state contractor to find a home in Monterey County for Eldridge Chaney, a sexually violent predator from Seaside who assaulted several women in the 1970s and 1980s.

For more than a year, Liberty Healthcare has searched for but not found a place to house Chaney, who is living in a state mental

hospital having serving about 20 years in prison for rape and attempted rape.

During a court hearing in Salinas Wednesday, Assistant Monterey County Public Defender Don Landis told Superior Court Judge Lydia Villarreal that the reason Liberty hasn't found a house is because of the "adverse media attention" the case has received.

"As the year has gone by, it has been more and more difficult, given the media attention

... that [Liberty is] finding little or no properties that are available," Landis said.

He said media attention to the Chaney case has "come down" on property owners considering renting their homes "in all sorts of threatening ways." Managing Deputy District Attorney Chuck Olvis told The Pine Cone that nobody has been charged with such threats.

Liberty officials this year have publicly identified only one home — near Prunedale — as a location for Chaney. However, following outcry on social media in July, including one Facebook user who said Chaney should be "lynched," the unnamed homeowner backed out of the deal.

Monterey County Superior Court Judge Mark Hood in October 2014 determined Chaney could leave Coalinga State Hospital and be conditionally released somewhere in Monterey County.

"So it's time for Mr. Chaney to be released, and I ask that we all work diligently to do that," Landis said.

Landis recommended that Villarreal consider permitting Liberty to explore other options, including "transient motel arrangements," housing outside Monterey County, and housing that does not comply with Jessica's Law, which, among other things, mandates where sex offenders can be placed.

However, while Villarreal ordered Liberty to seek "all avenues of placement" for

Chaney, she rejected Landis' request that Liberty seek housing at odds with Jessica's Law. She set the matter for a December hearing.

"Certainly, if any [new housing] options become available, I would encourage you to get this on the court calendar immediately and the court will consider it," the judge told Landis.

Chaney was convicted of rape and assault with intent to commit rape on several women, including a military wife and a 16-year-old girl. He used weapons to terrorize his victims. His first offense was in 1978, and his last in 1988. Chaney spent more than 20 years in prison before being treated at state hospitals in Atascadero and Coalinga.

A psychologist who had known Chaney for nine years testified at an April 2011 hearing that some tests showed Chaney's "risk of conviction for another sexual offense [was] moderate to high compared to other sex offenders, and that Chaney's diagnosis of antisocial personality disorder could increase his risk for re-offense."

The psychologist also said, "It is difficult to assess Mr. Chaney's current degree of sexual self-regulation." He noted that early tests showed Chaney had "a deviant sexual interest in sexually aggressive acts," but that he had "completed behavioral counterconditioning treatments" and "now displays a non-deviant sexual arousal profile."

SERRA STATUE VANDALIZED ON DAY OF CANONIZATION CEREMONY

THE MORNING of Junipero Serra's canonization Sept. 23, residents at the north end of Carmel awakened to see famous local sculptor Jo Mora's statue of Serra vandalized with black paint and eggs. By the time police got to the scene of the crime at the intersection of Serra and Camino del Monte — which marks the north entrance to the city — nearby resident Glen Mozingo had already cleaned much of the paint and debris off the sculpture.

"I worked on the statue for about two hours and removed

most of the black paint," he said. "However, the statue will need to be completely redone," because when he cleaned off the vandals' paint, he also removed the brown paint of Serra's robe.

Mozingo is vice president of the Carmel Woods

Association, which keeps the small park area of the Serra statue clean, decorates it with pumpkins and poinsettias during the holidays, and takes care of the general appearance of



Military says Confederate flag OK at Presidio Civil War commemoration

THE CONFEDERATE flag will indeed be allowed to fly during next week's Civil War encampment at the Presidio of Monterey, officials told The Pine Cone this week.

Though a Facebook page created by event organizers noted the controversial flag would be banned at the historical reenactment event in Monterey, the chief of public affairs for the Presidio said the military doesn't have an issue with it being used.

"There is no prohibition against the display of the Confederate flag for the purpose of historical reenactment," Jim Laughlin said Monday.

Laughlin's comments clear up a misunderstanding about use of the Rebel flag at the Oct. 3-4 event — which is intended to celebrate the group of Union infantrymen and artillerymen who were stationed in Monterey in 1865, the last year of

the Civil War.

Event coordinator, Tim Reese, with the local chapter of the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War, told The Pine Cone this week that the confusion originated from a series of email messages from the Presidio pertaining to the flag and this year's event. Subsequently, Reese said he mistakenly posted on the event Facebook page that the Confederate Battle Flag would be "banned" from the encampment.

"In the end," Reese told The Pine Cone, the Presidio was referring to a ban on the "waving of the Confederate Battle Flag in a political fashion." The event "has never engaged in such an activity of political rhetoric since [the event] was founded in 2007."

Besides participants dressed in Union military outfits, Reese said there will also be a small group of Confederate army actors at the Civil War event.

Dennis Copeland, an historian for the City of Monterey — which leases the land where the event will be held from the federal government — also said the city has no problem with the Confederate banner being used in the reenactment.

"The 9th Annual Ord Barracks Civil War Encampment will proceed as normal as it has for the past eight years," Reese said.

The free event, which includes Civil War ordnance and

firearms displays, is part of Monterey History Fest 2015. It will be held at the Presidio of Monterey Museum at 113 Corporal Ewing Road.

The hills will be alive with history

MONTEREY COUNTY is home to a number of military installations — Camp Roberts, Naval Postgraduate School, the former Fort Ord, the Presidio and of course, Fort Mervine.

OK, if that last one's not ringing any bells for you, it's understandable. But the local chapter of the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War would like to change that. Its Civil War encampment, scheduled for October 3 and 4 in conjunction with Monterey's History Fest, will be held at the Presidio Museum, near where Fort Mervine was once located.

The fort was originally built and occupied by a small group of Marines Commodore Sloat left behind after raising the flag in Monterey in 1846. It was named for one of his officers. According to the City of Monterey's Museum website, with the end of the Mexican war and the gold rush, the unit was disbanded and the fort was abandoned.

The base was re-opened in the closing months of the Civil War by soldiers of the U.S. Army. During that period, it was known as Ord Barracks. Since 2015 marks the sesquicentennial of the end of the Civil War, the encampment this year will also be known as Ord Barracks.



P.G. weighs demolition of historic Cal Am facility

AN OLD pump house in Pacific Grove that owner California American Water wants to demolish but a few residents want preserved is set for two public hearings, including one next week.

On Sept. 30, the city's historic resources committee will consider a demolition permit for the 860-square-foot pump house that sits in the middle of an intersection at Sinex and Eardly. The building, which was probably built in 1926, has been damaged in recent years from three car accidents, including one in 2012.

While engineers Cal Am hired in 2013 determined the unreinforced masonry building posed a public safety hazard and recommended it be torn down, five residents and a historic preservation group have said it should be preserved. The

building was designated historic by the city in 2004, and it's currently fenced off so the public can't access it.

In his letter to the city opposing the teardown, resident Luke Coletti said the building is historically important to Pacific Grove. He pointed to an 1884 advertisement for "new and unlimited water supply from the Carmel River" for the city.

"Without question, this water directly led to the development of the communities we know today," Coletti wrote. "Also without question is the fact that the [pump station] was a key part of this history and should be preserved and appreciated by our community."

The Alliance of Monterey Area Preservationists contend Cal Am intentionally allowed the pump house to decay and that approving its demolition would set a "terrible precedent."

"The premeditated demolition through neglect has not only put the pump house in jeopardy, but also the preservation efforts of Pacific Grove as a whole," according to a July letter.

The pump house, the group argues, "holds neighborhood and regional historic importance," is a "prominent local landmark," and is built in an "important definable style."

But the EIR prepared by the city indicates that the pump house, which was taken out of service in 2008, has not been neglected to the point of needing to be demolished. Rather, damage from motor vehicles, and the fact the building does not meet current seismic codes, makes it unsafe, the city determined.

"After three car crashes occurred at the site, Cal Am took preventive measures to protect the health and safety of residents," the EIR goes on to say. "The city concluded that the structure's current conditions are a result of the lack of stable foundation and the unforeseen circumstances of the car accidents."

"We agree with the EIR conclusion that the unsafe conditions were caused by motor vehicles and that the structure was built before current earthquake standards were in place," Cal Am spokeswoman Catherine Stedman told The Pine Cone. "We support full review of the pump house, and await direction from the city to move forward."

Cal Am has not been cited for any code violations related to the upkeep of the building, which was first owned by Monterey County Water Works, the utility that then provided water to Pacific Grove.

On Oct. 13, after the HRC recommends whether or not the structure should be torn down, the city's architectural review board will consider certifying the project's final environmental impact report and decide whether to grant Cal Am a permit to demolish the building.

for months. Luckily for them, the weather complied. "If the swell or wind were different than we hoped, then all the planning and time spent would've been for nothing," Cox wrote.

As they journeyed down the coast from the Monterey Peninsula, camping the first night at Andrew Molera State Park, the paddleboarders marveled at seeing Big Sur from such a rare perspective.

"With each twist and turn, the little kid inside of us came out, and it was like exploring a playground for the first time," Cox said.

The most perfect beach

Along the way, the six men explored caves, dove off of rocks, had a close call with about 50 sea lions, watched a great white shark pass beneath them, took a short detour up the Big Sur River, enjoyed a meteor shower, watched multiple whales breach from as close as a 100 feet away, and visited the seemingly impossible-to-reach sands of Julia Pfeiffer Burns State Park, which Cox described as "the most exclusive and perfect beach in the world."

Cox told The Pine Cone the group stayed at the beach for about an hour and didn't venture far from the water. He said they left earlier than planned so they could travel north before the wind picked up.

While he and Miller work for Isle Surf and SUP, Cox insisted the trip "was never intended to be a marketing campaign" for the company.

Cox said he and his friends were careful not to leave any evidence of their journey behind.

"We packed everything in and we packed everything out," declared the 2005 Carmel High graduate. "This is my hometown — I would never disrespect it."

In an effort to minimize the risks associated with such a trip, the men used walkie-talkies to stay in touch with a sup-

port team on the coast which followed their progress.

While he and his friends enjoyed an adventure they won't soon forget, Austin discouraged others from even attempting such a voyage.

"This trip was planned and thought out for months," he added. "The Big Sur coastline can be very unpredictable with the swell and winds shifting in minutes. This should not be attempted unless you are a seasoned paddler with lots of water experience. Also, this area has the highest concentration of great white sharks and miles from any help. In a nutshell, don't try it!"

SCRAMP, RACING SERIES RESPONSIBLE FOR DRIVER LOSING, LAWSUIT SAYS

POOR MAINTENANCE of the Laguna Seca track is the reason a racecar driver finished in last place at a May 3 race and his team risks losing the championship this season, according to a lawsuit filed last week in Monterey County Superior Court.

In the complaint filed Sept. 14, Tropacaval Media LLC alleges that a 12-15 inch steel piece of storm drain grate that was perpendicular to the track tore through the team's No. 33 Dodge Viper GT3R driven by Ben Keating as he struck the

object at 76 mph after exiting Turn 5 on the second lap. Keating was competing in the GT Daytona Class of the Continental Tire grand prix when the mishap occurred.

The piece of grate that had become dislodged tore through the car "like a buzz saw through a tree trunk, ripping through the floor, diffuser, and metal shell of the fuel cell," according to the lawsuit. Had the metal penetrated the fuel cell and ruptured its liner, "the entire racecar would have burst into flames."

The real damage, though, was to Keating — who finished dead last in the 100-lap race — and his team's standings.

Besides losing the Monterey race, Keating lost 15 points in the GT Daytona Tudor United SportsCar Championship Series, which crowns a team champion based on the cumulative number of points for winning races during a season.

"As of last week, Mr. Keating was 15 points out of the lead, with only three races left for the year," according to the lawsuit, filed for Tropacaval by Newport Beach attorney Jonathan A. Michaels. "Therefore, if Mr. Keating had not had the Laguna Seca race ruined by the defendants' failure to properly maintain the drainage gates, [the team] would have had the opportunity to finish in first place."

The complaint alleges gross negligence against defendants International Motor Sports Association, which promotes and sanctions the race series in which Keating competed, and the Sports Car Racing Association of the Monterey Peninsula, which manages the track. The lawsuit is another headache for SCRAMP, which is facing scrutiny from the county over its operation of Laguna Seca.

David Hart, public relations manager for Mazda Raceway Laguna Seca, told The Pine Cone that SCRAMP is aware of the lawsuit and that it was filed "as a standard step in an insurance settlement procedure."

Though the metal from the grate "sliced through the racecar's floor," Keating wasn't injured. But it took pit crews more than 10 minutes — an "eternity in racing" — to repair the damage so Keating could finish, according to the suit.

As a result of Keating's "dramatic fall in the standings," the team "will likely lose valuable sponsorship money that it otherwise would have gained," the complaint says. Keating and teammate Jeroen Bleekemolen alternated driving during the two-hour-and-40-minute race.

Tropacaval Media is seeking \$58,289.93 in damages for car repairs; \$300,000 in travel, transport, crew costs and other expenses; a \$15,000 "fee" for Bleekemolen, "as well as virtually eliminating the team's ability to compete to win" the 2015 season. The prize money for the winner of the May race was \$20,000.

Furthermore, the complaint alleges Keating had raced the 2.24-mile Laguna Seca on three prior occasions, and in 2013 experienced a similar issue with a drainage grate at the track's famous Corkscrew, the lawsuit says.

"The defendants knew of the propensity for the drainage grates on the Laguna Seca Raceway to create life-threatening hazards for the racers," the suit says, "and yet failed to take any measures to secure the grates and protect the drivers from this risk of death or serious injury."

Ironically, before the May race at Laguna Seca, Keating commented on his prospects there.

"For some reason, I have never loved Laguna Seca," Keating said. "I hope to change that this weekend," according to a report on the International Motor Sports Association website. "I love Monterey, I love that area of California, but the track has always been a little difficult for me."

a property owner's due process protections. But it is clear that a requirement to preserve architecturally significant buildings does not generally afford property owners immunity from a public regulation. The burden often, and legally, falls on the uncompensated property owner. Ignorance of this is not a legal defense nor does it afford immunity from a regulation that may change over the course of ownership. Ms. Mehdipour appears to have learned this the hard way.

If the burden of architectural preservation rules are to be born by the public at large there would be no such rules as a practical matter. For example, there would be no Carmel as we know it today. Fortunately, development rights are not absolute and are always connected to a broader public benefit that is not compensable. But a "regulatory taking" issue in the case of this Pebble Beach home may be testing constitutional limits if not the limits of fair play. How old after all does a house have to be in order to be subject to regulatory preservation?

So long as the Massy Mehdipours of the world are paying the price of preservation, my guess is that the public will nod their approval and hope silently that their homes are not on the same list.



the neighborhood.

He described the vandalism as "conduct of the ill-informed and misguided who choose to destroy Christian icons," and said the residents were "surprised by the actions of domestic religious zealots."

"The faithful community will not be harmed by the actions of those who choose to destroy the art of a community, or the symbols of any denomination of faith," he continued. "We will instead do what we can to pro-

tect our community heritage and forgive those who act out of ignorance or hatred."

The sculpture, completed by Mora in 1926, was commissioned by Pebble Beach Company founder S.F.B. Morse to commemorate the opening of the Carmel Woods real estate development. It was previously vandalized in December 1999, around the time of Serra's beatification, when someone defaced it and the surrounding stone with black spray paint.

In that instance, association members paid for its restoration, which was completed by a local painting contractor — Mike Calhoun, who is also the city's police chief.

Update from wineries in the fire zone

Located near the Tassajara Fire that started and quickly grew Saturday afternoon, Bernardus Winery in Jamesburg lost power shortly after the smoke appeared, in the middle of a busy day crushing grapes, but winemaker Dean DeKorth reported Monday that a generator was brought online and operations are back in order.
 "We have a generator in place, and it looks like the 2015 wines are safe!" he said. "Also, most of the road blocks seem to have been lifted. But still hearing plenty of helicopters overhead. Huge sigh or relief!"
 Will Chesebro, who grows grapes and

makes wine alongside his dad, Mark, was on his property in Cachagua during the fires and observed the flames raging around him. A backfire lit to bolster a fire break helped ensure the buildings, vineyards and orchards on the property went unscathed. He said Sept. 20 that the efforts had been successful.
 Alan and Sandra Silvestri said their property and their staff were also spared.
 "It's been a very long weekend for everyone in Carmel Valley and Cachagua Valley who was directly impacted by the Tassajara Fire," they said, going on to "the firemen, the air and helicopter support, our fellow citizens and neighbors, the police and sheriff's department, and most of all Marshall Moranda who held down our fort during this fire." "We send our condolences to everyone who lost in this terrible fire," they continued. "God bless all the heroes and heroines who stepped up."


These three highly skilled pastry chefs have collaborated for YAC fundraisers in the past, and no doubt they will bring the same ingenuity to this event.



PEBBLE BEACH AUTHORS AND IDEAS FESTIVAL SET TO KICK OFF NINTH YEAR

THE STAFF of the Pebble Beach Authors & Ideas Festival has remained unchanged for nine years — which is to say, it still consists of Jim and Cindy McGillen, the founders of the popular event that brings together award-winning authors and speakers to meet with book lovers in intimate settings. The 2015 festival runs Sept. 25-27 at Stevenson School in Pebble Beach.

“We’re a good team,” McGillen says. “We

intentionally keep the number of speakers and attendees to a manageable number. That way we don’t need a staff. We can handle things ourselves.”

When asked if putting on the festival has gotten easier after nine years, McGillen said it’s a matter of degrees. He reminisced about wondering if the festival would continue after the first year. That one almost sent Cynthia and him to the poor house.

“We paid top dollar for marquee presenters,” he said. “And we provided them with

first class airfare, hotels, meals — everything was the best. We wanted to do it right the first time, rather than have the festival build slowly.” After that, the McGillens decided that the festival was going to stand on its own. They were no longer going to pay for marquee names. It was a risk that worked.

“No one returned my phone calls that first year. Then, for the second festival, I was suddenly everyone’s best friend. Agents and publishers were calling us wanting their authors to be invited to speak,” McGillen said.

Rags to riches

Putting on the festival was indeed a risk. However, McGillen has never hesitated to take a chance when he saw an opportunity. He grew up in Germantown, Pa., an only child. His father died when he was 2. His mother raised him while working two and sometimes three jobs.

He put himself through St. Joseph’s College night school. During the days, he worked a full-time job for Philadelphia Electric Co. At night, he studied for a degree in business and marketing. After four years at PE, he talked his way into selling advertising at the CBS affiliate in Philadelphia. Two years later, he was running CBS’s advertising office in Chicago. Then he moved here to become general manager of KSBW in Salinas.

While at the station, he took the risk of starting a television production company,

Telepictures Inc.

“We started this company, but we didn’t have any product, and then Ralph Edwards, a big-time Hollywood producer from the old ‘This Is Your Life,’ called us. He needed a distributor for a new show, and we needed product. So we made a deal.”

The new show was an odd concept that McGillen’s friends laughed at. It was called “The People’s Court.”

“My friends said, ‘Boy, did you make a mistake.’ But I always thought you roll the dice and see what happens.” “People’s Court” hit well over 200 markets. Telepictures cut another deal for its next show, “The Love Connection,” a popular show hosted by Chuck Woolery. In 1978, Telepictures merged with giant Lorimar Productions, producer of “Dallas,” “Knots Landing,” and “Falcon Crest.”

The P.B. Authors & Ideas Festival is the result of the McGillens wanting to do something for Carmel because they love the town’s bohemian spirit. They decided on the festival, which they modeled on ones they had attended in Sun Valley and Aspen.

Even if the execution of putting on the festival has lessened by degrees, the challenges remain the same.

“Every year, we strive to find the best 30 speakers in the country,” McGillen said. He definitely puts the emphasis on an author’s ability to communicate through the spoken word rather than the written word.







The canine center and the requirements for getting a permit

WHEN DEVELOPMENT projects come before one of the local planning commissions, city councils or the county board of supervisors, there's always a lot of discussion about what the criteria should be for deciding whether a particular project should or should not be approved. Sometimes, this is presented as a very knotty issue, but it actually isn't. Just a few tests need to be applied.

The first is whether rejecting a project would violate the constitutional rights of the property owner or developer. That's an easy one, because the Supreme Court has laid down the law: Every property owner is entitled to use their property for an economically beneficial purpose, but that's all. In other words, you can't just require a landowner to leave it alone. A minimum use — such as a single family home on a residential lot — is the one thing a property owner has a constitutional right to have.

The next test is whether some law requires that a project be approved. Again, there are very few instances where this is true. State law, for example, requires developers of larger projects to incorporate affordable housing into those projects — a requirement that also means the local government with land-use authority over the developer's site would have to approve the affordable housing required by state law.

The final test is that every decision by local government has to be made for a good reason: Development projects can't be denied arbitrarily or capriciously. Property owners also can't be treated differently from other land owners in similar situations. But, unless a city council member has taken a bribe to vote "No," it's not usually very difficult to find a "public good" reason to deny something.

And that's pretty much it. Unless a project denial violates the Constitution or a state law, or is undertaken for a phony reason, it will almost always be legal. Which means that, when you see a big shopping center or housing project under construction in San Jose or the Central Valley, and ask yourself why it ever was granted a permit, the answer invariably is that the government in that location liked the project and wanted to approve it.

Similarly, in the wealthy areas of the state — and especially in the Monterey Peninsula — where new development always has a devil of a time getting OK'd, the only explanation is that that's the way the local government wants it. When a development permit comes before the Monterey County Board of Supervisors or the Carmel City Council, for example, all the decision makers have to do is ask themselves whether the project must be OK'd, and if it doesn't, then they can pretty much reject it if they don't happen to like it.

This type of permit is called a "discretionary permit," because the decision makers have the discretion to vote "Yes" or "No."

When you listen to a discussion among planning commissioners, city council members or county supervisors about a project that's come before them, their discretion to approve it or not becomes evident right away.

For example, when September Ranch was before the county planning commission in 2010, one commissioner noted that she would vote "No" because the September Ranch development would "place stress on issues of water and traffic" and therefore approving it wouldn't be "fair" to the surrounding community.


"This is the best quality project we've seen come along in a long time [but] the people in the area have convinced me that [approving it] is not fair, and I can't support it because of that," the commissioner said about September Ranch.

Likewise, when Ferrini Ranch was before the county planning commission in 2014, the very same commissioner, again citing traffic and water, said that, "development in the past has outpaced our ability to provide infrastructure to support it." Therefore, she said, she would vote "No" on Ferrini Ranch because she didn't want to see anything "increase" the infrastructure "deficit."

Who was that planning commissioner? None other than Martha Diehl, whose very own project, the Carmel Canine Center, would unquestionably increase water use from the Carmel River and add traffic to Carmel Valley Road. If she were allowed to vote on her own project, she would definitely have to vote "No" on it — unless she's changed her mind about everything she professes to believe in.

She won't be voting on the canine center when it comes before the board of supervisors next month, of course. And as for the supervisors themselves? She'd better hope they don't look to her voting record on the planning commission for direction, or even inspiration. If they do, her project is toast.

Public shouldn't have to pay

Dear Editor,

I take umbrage with your assertions (editorial, Sept. 18) that the public should assume the financial burden of the landmark historic home.

Drama does not begin on its own nor is it played out in one act.

It begins with one act followed by another and in this case and some that are not so transparent. Your positing that it be the public who bear the burden is a false one.

Years prior to the acquisition of the property by Mehdipour, the 'Connell House' was a mid-century landmark home by international master architect Richard Neutra beautifully sited within its property. Then, it was silently sold. Thus, it became the center of this continuing multiple play and counterplay once details emerged it was to be demolished.

Understand this project became special because of the initial deception played against HRRB by their 'architect of record' denying he knew the home was by Neutra. HRRB corrected him and he redacted his comment.

This initial misrepresentation would prove the Achilles heel for many of us in the design community. Soon there was further disregard for proper permitting process via ignored grading and tree removal permits with still no demolition permit in hand. Possession should not be the means by which land owners play the benefit card.

The home has since been determined a national and state historic landmark - but, without acceptance by the owner. This would benefit her with tax breaks under the Mills Act.

Between intermission of this drama, 'vandals' conveniently exacted calculated dirty work to the structural members.

Burden falls on owner for trying to benefit playing with code violations and blatant disregard for land development process that our county code requires.

Your claim that it is in the public and/or local government taxpayer's position to take over is preposterous. She is accountable for property that became damaged under her watch not us nor the county.

The burden should be on Mehdipour and no one else.

Because sometimes you have to 'hug a house' to make a point.

It may be unfair, but it's legal

Dear Editor,

Your Sept. 18 editorial underscores the difficulty of balancing a public good with private property rights. However, you are incorrect in stating that "no individual citizen should be forced to bear the burden of providing a public benefit."

While there may be public disagreement over the reach of architectural preservation, its primary purpose is to provide a public benefit. This benefit cost is privately born but publicly enjoyed and is a permissible practice deeply rooted in California law and both state and federal case law.

It is difficult to know exactly when a government taking crosses the line and violates

PROVIDING DENTAL CARE IN HEAVEN ... AND IN HELL

PEDIATRIC DENTIST Mark Bayless walks into the room, wearing his colorful cotton cap, and a surgical mask, loose at his collar. He greets parents by name, and children by their nicknames as he sits down to examine their teeth. He always asks about their schooling, their sports, their pets. At the end of the appointment, he performs a little magic trick for his younger patients, and invites them to pick out a toy from the cabinet as he goes over their oral health with their parents.

In practice on the Monterey Peninsula for 32 years, Bayless has performed a lot of magic tricks and has cared for thousands of local children. Yet his magic also extends to children throughout much of Central and South America.

After finishing dental school, Bayless actually tried to find international work, to pursue a dream to get into third-world dentistry.

"I thought, if I came to Monterey, I'd be splitting the pie among a lot of other established dentists," Bayless said. "I was also idealistic and adventuresome, and I wanted to take my skills where they were really needed. But, I had student loans to pay off. So, I went into practice in Monterey with John Faia, and began looking for ways to volunteer."

In 1985, one year into his practice, Bayless began traveling to Mexico with Los Médicos Voladores or "The Flying Doctors." This nonprofit organization, established in 1975, works to improve the health and well being of geographically diverse peoples through education and no-cost, high-quality medical, dental and optometric clinics.

"Mark came into my practice in the 1980s," said Faia, now retired. "He was a bachelor, and I had small children. He had already started helping people, and I

thought, I've got to figure it out, too; I've got to go down there and help these people."

Five years later, in 1990, Faia and his family traveled to Guatemala to treat the dental needs of children at an orphanage, before going on to vacation in the ecoparadise of Rio Dulce. There, they ended up also repairing the dental deficiencies of the Kekchi Indians, whose problems had contributed to considerable health issues.

Soon, Bayless and Faia embarked on annual dental missions to the Rio Dulce region. Beginning in 1998, they expanded their care to include impoverished people of Belize, Argentina, Cambodia, Ecuador, Honduras, India, Nepal, Nicaragua and Peru.

Bayless remembers watching patients come across the river in dug-out canoes, overloaded with frightened, expectant chil-



dren, to join others in a long line, and wait. Their hope was that they would be able to feel better, eat better, look better. Their fear was that the dental care would hurt. But maybe not as much as their mouths hurt already.

Their feet were bare, many of them, but their faces were scrubbed clean, and they were wearing their absolute best. Bayless and Faia endeavored to give it to them.

"We are people who have been fortunate enough to go into dentistry on the Monterey Peninsula. We also have been blessed to find a way to give back to people," Bayless said. "Our work is very simple. We find a tooth that needs fixing, and we fix it, often changing not only the health, but the future of that

The world's best egg salad

"TELL ME what you eat and I will tell you what you are," said a great French epicure. If that's true, some of my best friends were Cheetos, salami sandwiches, and Twinkies. And I've known a few hot tomatoes, too. Note to wife: None compared to you, honey.

My good friend Milt Josefsberg, the late, great comedy writer and producer of "All In The Family," was a ketchup freak. He poured ketchup over every meal, and cut everything into small bites until his dinner plate looked like abstract art gone horribly wrong.

For Milt's birthday one year, his pal Iv Robbins (the "R" of Baskin-Robbins), commissioned ketchup-flavored ice cream in his honor. Baskin-Robbins had a production minimum of five gallons, so Milt received a colossal tub of tomato-y ice cream.

Unfortunately, it tasted as bad as it sounds. Not even Milt could eat it. Finally his wife flushed it down the toilet, one gallon at a time. The bad news is, it stopped up the plumbing, flooded the bathroom, and took Roto-Rooter, an army of plumbers and a building contractor months to repair. The good news is, it gave Milt fodder for comedy material, and a story he dined out on for years.

I knew a guy who loved rice pudding, and claimed he made the world's best. I can't stand rice pudding. Nor can I cotton to people who say they make the best anything. I ate at a coffee shop that claimed their pancakes were world famous. I had my doubts. Whenever I traveled after that I asked people if they'd heard of those pancakes. Not one person answered in the affirmative. Most just stared at me, especially in places like Bali, Jakarta and Kuala Lumpur.

But when I say I make the world's best egg salad, I'm simply stating facts. There can't possibly be a better egg salad anywhere.

Normally I wouldn't consider divulging my secret recipe. But since we're friends ...

First you need a couple dozen eggs. You'll have to choose between brown or white, AA or A, large, extra large, or jumbo, standard, vegetarian, anti-biotic and hormone free, free-range, organic, omega-3, cage free, and responsibly raised. By the time you read the labels and make a decision you'll probably need a rest.

After you regain your strength, get some mayonnaise. I'm not promoting any particular brand, but you can't go wrong with the one whose initials are Best Foods.

You'll also need some plain yellow mustard — the American brand usually squirted on hot dogs, not the foreign "grey" stuff.

Assuming you'll want to make the world's greatest egg salad sandwich, you'll need bread. The right sandwich loaf is critical. This is one time that calls for white bread. Slices should not be too thick or too thin, too soft or too firm. None of the squishy stuff. And no artisanal loaves. In other words, something just right. Now you know what Goldilocks was up against.

Then pick out a nice white onion, a crisp head of dark green romaine, and the reddest, perfectly ripe slicing tomato you can find. Don't even consider one of those anemic reddish baseballs that some markets have the nerve to call tomatoes.

Once you've gathered your ingredients, go home and take a nap.

When you're rested, boil the eggs. For four sandwiches, you need eight eggs. Double that number just in case. My mother was right when she said it's always good to have extras.

Boil the eggs gently until the yolks are hard cooked, but not so long the yolks turn bluish green. Plunge immediately into ice water. Dry yourself off, and then peel the eggs.

For best results, tap eggs lightly on the counter to break shells all over. Before the drought it was easiest to peel under cold running water. Now, you must peel them dry. Some of the whites may stick to the shells. Good thing you made extra.

Once your eggs are peeled, put the yolks in one bowl, and the whites in another. Set the whites in the fridge where you can move them from shelf to shelf for a few days until you throw them out.

Mash yolks into a smooth paste. Add mayo a little at a time aiming for a creamy consistency. If you're watching cholesterol or calories, avert your eyes. That way if a little extra mayo gets into the bowl, you won't be a witness.

Add some yellow mustard for color and kick, but not enough to really taste.

Mince some onion. Not too much. Keep Band Aids nearby in case you nick a finger.

and Georis said he would keep the kitchen open later to ensure customers can order food late at night — a concern expressed by commissioner Ian Martin, who worried people might be tempted to get behind the wheel if they're hungry after an evening of imbibing — commissioners voted to extend the hours to 2 a.m. daily.

South of Ocean OK

The meeting was particularly friendly to the adult-beverage crowd, as commissioners also unanimously approved Hahn Winery's request to open a tasting room on the ground floor of Carmel Plaza. Although the city recently denied two other winetasting applications in part because they would have been south of Ocean Avenue, while guidelines include a strong preference for new tasting rooms on the north side in order to promote business diversity, commissioners decided Hahn would be a good fit for the Plaza.

They may have been swayed by commercial realtor John McCormack (who used to own the Cheese Shop in the Plaza), as he pointed out that more commercial space is available south of Ocean than north of it, and many of the storefronts on the north side are not ADA accessible — a deterrent for anyone wary of being sued. "Many of these spaces are still unoccupied because of the handicap issues," he said, and tenants don't want to be sued.

Paterson said he was willing to forego the north-of-Ocean preference.

"In this particular instance, I agree Hahn is a very reputable company, and I personally would like to see it here," he said.

LePage observed the rules for approving tasting rooms are guidelines, not ordinances, and are therefore discretionary. "It's not a hard and fast thing," he said. "We look at each application on its own merits."

The Plaza's general manager and the executive director of the Monterey County Vintners & Growers Association also supported Hahn's efforts, and commissioners voted to let Hahn open in the corner storefront near Sur La Table.

The McGillens spend 95 percent of the time they devote to the festival screening potential authors. They watch TED lectures, follow the Aspen Ideas Festival, and check out recommendations they receive. Their high standards mean that only one of every 20 potential speakers makes the final cut.

"The first thing we do when authors request to speak at the festival is to have them send us videos of their last three talks or lectures. You could write the most successful best seller in the world, but if you can't hold the interest of an audience for 20 minutes, you can't speak at our festival."

The festival also partners with the Monterey school system in bringing more than 2,400 students to the event yearly to hear and meet the speakers. The student programs will be held at Santa Catalina School on the mornings of Sept. 24 and 25.

Even though the 2015 speakers list is loaded with well known authors, McGillen

doesn't go out of his way to ballyhoo the name of any one author.

"I don't want people to buy a ticket just because a couple of famous people are coming. I want them to come for the whole weekend. Besides, if we've learned anything, it's that the authors you've never heard of often turn out to be the most interesting speakers," McGillen said.

A case in point is Michael Alec Rose, associate professor of composition at Vanderbilt University's Blair School of Music. Last year, his presentation "From Beethoven to the Beatles," proved so popular that McGillen extended his program to 45 minutes.

"It's the only time I've done that," McGillen said. By the way, Rose is on the program again this year.

Also featured at this year's event are Victor Davis Hanson, David Igantius and Jeff Greenfield. Tickets to the event are \$550.

According to Tim Reese of the sons of veterans group, who started the event with Thomas Brown in 2007, this year's event is shaping up to be a cornucopia of interactive living history. There will be a horse-drawn cannon, a Civil War ambulance, and dozens of knowledgeable re-enactors.

The encampment will also host a "School Day" on Oct. 2, when 270 ROTC cadets from local schools and 65 students from Robert Down Elementary School in Pacific Grove will drop by for a visit. The students will rotate through a variety of teaching stations and have the opportunity to see a firing

demonstration of cannon and muskets.

On Saturday and Sunday, there will be live cannon demonstrations at 11:30 a.m. and 2:30 p.m., so don't be alarmed. Retired Carmel Police Chief Don Fuselier will be there, too, not to keep the peace, nor in his current role as an Episcopal pastor — although he is the camp chaplain. This time, he'll be reprising previous years' performances as a doctor in a period medical practice.

There will also be a replica of a sutlery. Don't worry, The Pine Cone had to look that one up, too. It turns out a sutler was a civilian who sold goods and supplies to soldiers on a military base.

Guests can also get a close-up look at a tent display depicting a soldier's life, learn

about the Confederate Navy, and see typical firearms used during that era. There will also be a display featuring the story of physician Mary Walker, the only woman ever to win a Medal of Honor.

Walker volunteered during the war and served as a surgeon at a temporary hospital set up in the Capitol. When she later crossed enemy lines to treat wounded civilians, the Confederate army captured her and accused her of spying. She was returned to the North in a prisoner exchange and given the nation's highest award for bravery, one of only eight civilians to have achieved that honor.

That's just one of the many interesting stories and pieces of history visitors can experience.

The Presidio museum will give walking tours and bus tours to the interior of the Presidio. The encampment is open to the public from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturday, and 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. Sunday. Admission is free.



person.”

In 2000, Faia and Bayless formed International Health Emissaries, a nonprofit organization dedicated to two goals. One is to provide medical and dental care at no cost to indigent people throughout the world. Second, they provide the opportunity for American volunteers to positively represent their country. Volunteers gain further appreciation and understanding of other countries, as well as their own, and they get the chance to develop relationships with people around the world.

“We call ourselves emissaries,” said Bayless, “because we go out into the world to make a difference. When it seems like the world is going to hell in a hand basket, we

can always find someone who needs our help. And we don’t encounter anti-American sentiment with anybody we work with — only gratitude.”

When the emissaries travel, sometimes with as many as 17 volunteers from this community, they pack big red bags with clothes and toys to give to their patients. They also bring dental tools and materials, plus plenty of plastic wrap, with which they cover desks and tables — wherever they can find space to work on a patient.

“Where we go, nobody else goes, said Faia. “We are in the jungle, in desolate, scrubby, awful places, with wonderful people, whose lives are on the line. When they see us, their faces brighten, they clap for us and hug us as they ask, ‘Why are you coming here?’ We come for the people, and our own lives are better for it.”

Four reviews I guarantee will tempt you to read the books

THE AUTHORS and Ideas Festival, which runs through Sunday, is all about brilliant ideas communicated through the written word. In the spirit of the festival, I've created a list of four books I think are the best. Two are fairly new and two are classics.

"The Martian," by **Andy Weir:** Try to read this book before the movie's release date on October 1. I'm sure the movie will mesmerize the audience with special effects, but

Weir paints pictures in your head that no amount of computer graphics could render on the screen. Mark Watney is abandoned 140,000,000 miles from his parking space at Cape Canaveral when a huge storm forces his crewmates to abort a Mars mission, leaving him behind because they think he is dead. But he isn't and keeps himself alive by growing potatoes, making water from H and O, and fighting off hordes of Martian monsters. I made that last part up.

But not to worry. There are plenty of surprises to keep him teetering on the brink of extinction, including when earthlings realize he's still alive and it will take 4 years to get another ship up there to rescue him. There is enough technical stuff to send you into orbit while our hero is dancing with the stars, but roll with it, as it makes the story plausible and interesting. No, I won't give away what happens. The ending is one of the most exciting I've read in eons.

"The Road to Character," by **David Brooks:** Brooks may be the only human on the planet I could out jump in basketball. But while he may be slight of stature, his intellect is a slam dunk.

In the book, Brooks uses two terms that everyone should post-it note to their brains: "resume virtues" — things we enumerate to boast about our work experience and educational achievements — and "eulogy virtues," which are the things he says should be at the core of our being, including kindness and faithfulness.





Brooks said he wrote the book "not sure I could follow the road to character, but I wanted at least to know what the road looks like and how other people have trodden it." This is a

But did you read the book ... all 423,575 words of it? If you did, you would know that Scarlett was married three times and had three children. What were their names? See, you didn't read the book.*

The Bible: A good-looking young couple cavort through a beautiful garden sans care, sans worries and sans clothes. A silver-tongued snake pulls off the world's first sting

by convincing the couple to hack into an apple, and they end up crashing the whole operating system. They get evicted and mayhem follows. One of their kids kills his brother, and things get so bad that a storm bigger than Hurricane Katrina threatens to destroy everything on earth until a guy builds a floating zoo that saves every species.

There are plagues of locusts, and then Kermit the Frog with millions of his buddies invade Egypt until Yul Brynner lets the Israelites go and Charlton Heston turns the Red Sea into Highway 1 — and we're still only in Chapter 2.

There's sex (David and Bathsheba), drugs (a giant gets stoned) and rock (Peter) and rolls (five of them feed five thousand people). There are super heroes, too, including a longhaired muscle man who wreaks more havoc with an ass's jawbone than Donald Trump pulls off with a microphone.

In Book 2, a very grateful and forgiving son takes three days to wipe out hellish malware and begins offering lifetime anti-virus protection for free. All you have to do is ask for it. The last chapter looks into the future and is truly a revelation. *Spoiler alert!* The good guys win in the end.

Nine reasons to **STOP AVOIDING** the dentist's office

By ELAINE HESSER

MANY PEOPLE remember the dentist's office as a frightening place with unpleasant noises and smells, not to mention painful procedures. Then, of course, there's that dreadful dental scene from "Marathon Man." You can Google it.

Actually, it's probably better if you don't.

Unfortunately, those images not only do today's dentistry an injustice, but they keep people from getting the care they need.

Dental care has come a long way in the last few decades. Anesthesia is better, and the introduction of sedation dentistry means some patients can sleep through their procedures, often taking care of multiple problems in one visit.

Also, the state of dental education in California is excellent, according to dentist Arlen Lackey of Pacific Grove. He pointed out that every dentist is required to complete 50 hours of continuing education every two years. And practitioners who take pride in staying current with all the latest techniques often do more than four or five times that many hours.

In addition to Lackey, David Love of Carmel, along with periodontist Jochen Pechak of Ryan Ranch, gave several reasons to quit procrastinating when it comes to getting that checkup.

Maybe one or two will help you, or someone you care about, work up the courage to make — and keep — an important appointment with your dentist.

9. Even if all your teeth sit in a jar by the bed at night, regular oral checkups will make sure those dentures continue to fit well. Love said that, over time, the shape of gums could change, making the dentures loose fitting. That can lead to gum pain, sores and infections.

8. Dentists are often the first to detect oral cancer. Lackey and Love both noted the importance of regular screenings. "Age is a risk factor for oral cancer," said Lackey. "It's serious and it's ugly."

7. Technology has improved dental care dramatically. For example, digital X-rays reduce a patient's exposure to radiation by 80 to 90 percent compared with traditional X-rays, according to Lackey. Plus, there's no waiting for film to develop.

He also said the latest dental implants "cut healing time by two-thirds." Getting those implants has become a lot faster and easier, too.

Pechak showed off a 3-D imaging system he uses to create a virtual map of where implants will go. The map is used to produce a plastic model and a guide for inserting the implants, speeding up the procedure and making it more precise.


Among Pechak's other high-tech solutions is laser removal of diseased gum tissue. The gums are numbed, so there's no pain during the procedure. Even better, Pechak said, "Overall, the post-op discomfort is about 90 percent less than traditional scalpel gum surgery. Some patients do not take any pain meds, and some take them just a couple of days."

Laughter and Longevity

ON HIS 99th birthday, comedian George Burns was asked, "What is the secret to a long life?"

Burns replied, "Keep breathing."

I would amend his answer and add, "Keep laughing."

More and more medical research shows that a good sense of humor is linked with longevity. The Bible says, "A merry heart doeth good like a medicine," and studies now bear out that pearl of ancient wisdom.

Today, we recognize that one of the greatest assets humans can possess in their golden years is a keen sense of humor. It's a natural tonic for mind, body and spirit always at the ready to help us handle the myriad challenges of advancing years.

Speaking to a group of seniors not long ago, I asked them, "What's funny about aging?"

Someone in the back shouted, "Nothing!" Then somebody up front yelled, "Everything!" The audience laughed and applauded, except for a few sourpusses. Some people would rather die than laugh. And many do. As Phyllis Diller used to say, "Most grumps don't live longer — it just seems like it."

We all face a multitude of unavoidable hurdles in later years — coping with sudden change, learning to live with disability, dealing with physical and mental infirmity, grappling with loss and loneliness. None of these issues is particularly funny. But that's what humor is for — to help take the bite out of adversity.

A humorous attitude helps people maintain a positive perspective, which in turn helps to minimize setbacks. Having the ability to face life with a light-hearted attitude allows us to manage stress. It provides the resilience we need to roll with the inevitable punches.

I received an e-mail recently from a woman who said her doctor told her the best medicine to get through her cancer treatments was to laugh. She embraced his advice, and she's now on the road to recovery.

And a friend who's got a great knack for seeing things funny recently told me about her annual

Medicare visit with her doctor. One of her chief complaints was feeling tired all the time. The doc said, "You need to get more exercise."

She said, "Nonsense. I get more exercise now than I ever did."

He asked her to explain.

"I'm forgetful," she said, "so I log several miles a day just walking around the house looking for my keys and glasses. And since I'm not as coordinated as I used to be, I drop things. So I'm constantly bending, stretching and lifting. And my bladder is weak, so I have to run to the toilet a million times day and night."

"I see," said the doctor. "Well, no wonder you're so tired."

Several years ago at a health conference, I had the pleasure of spending time with Norman Cousins, the former editor of *Saturday Review*. His book, "Anatomy of an Illness," was a best seller. In it, he described how he helped get through a life-threatening ailment by incorporating belly laughs into his daily medical regimen.

Having the ability to face life with a light-hearted attitude allows us to manage stress.

It turned out that 10 minutes of belly laughs produced an anesthetic effect that allowed at least two hours of pain-free sleep. Blood tests taken before and after those laughter exercises also provided quantifiable evidence that laughing is indeed good medicine.


When Cousins reported his findings in the *New England Journal of Medicine*, his article prompted more than 3,000 letters of support from doctors who had observed similar results in their patients.

Cousins' book opened new avenues in medical research, and forever changed the thinking about the connection between humor and health. He told me, "If negative forces like tension and stress could weaken the body to the point where it could succumb to illness, then positive forces — confidence, joy, faith, hope, love, laughter and the will to live — might have the opposite effect." He also said that humor interrupts the panic cycle of illness and helps to restore a feeling of well being.

Since then, medical research has shown that laughter has a positive effect on immunity, too.

Cousins called laughter "internal jogging." And studies have confirmed that belly laughs produce some of the same

Diabetes — What's your type?

YOU HEAR a lot about diabetes in the news. Gladys Edwards did, too. Gladys is Mom to The Pine Cone's production and sales manager, Jackie Edwards, who suggested this story after seeing what her mom went through with undetected diabetes.

Gladys said she'd heard of the disease but knew little about it, and when it snuck up on her, she didn't realize how serious it could be.

"I had every symptom in the book," she said — and she was rationalizing every one of them.

She was tired and slept a lot, and she was thirsty all the time, but didn't think anything was really amiss. During a follow-up visit after an unrelated surgery, Edwards' surgeon noticed high sugar levels and gave her a slip with the lab work results to take to her primary care doctor.

"I didn't do it," she said, meaning she never dropped off the slip. "I didn't have diabetes. I was in denial."

Later, while reviewing the results of routine blood work, another doctor was shocked to see that Edwards' blood sugar was dangerously high. He called her and told her to go to the emergency room. Immediately.

"I fought him," she said. So he passed the phone to a nurse, who finally persuaded her to go to the hospital. Edwards was given insulin, and she said, "The next day, my symptoms started going away."

That was about eight months ago. Since then, Edwards has been seeing a nutritionist, started exercising, lost some weight, and monitors her blood sugar regularly. "Everything's OK right now," she said, "as long as I eat right and get exercise."

Edwards was lucky, and she's not alone. In 2014, the medical journal, *The Lancet*, published a study predicting that 40 percent of all Americans will develop diabetes during their lifetimes.

While fear of diabetes is everywhere, news reports don't talk much about symptoms and treatments. You have to look for that information — and you have to sort out fact

from hype, as quacks push "miracle" pills and potions they say will prevent or treat the disease.

The Pine Cone went to Dr. James W. Chu, a board-certified endocrinologist who treats diabetes, to get the straight scoop. Chu is a Stanford grad who works at the Monterey Endocrine and Diabetes Institute, which is part of Community Hospital of the Monterey Peninsula.

So, what is diabetes?

In a healthy person, an organ called the pancreas secretes insulin, which enables glucose, or sugar, to move into the body's cells and be converted into energy. In diabetes, this process is impaired, and symptoms like those Edwards experienced result.

When sugar can't move into cells, it builds up in the blood and is flushed out through the kidneys. That causes more frequent urination, and therefore, increased thirst. Since glucose isn't being converted to energy, the person may also feel fatigued, or even dizzy and faint.


The natural healing process is also impaired, so people with diabetes tend to heal more slowly. If left untreated, diabetes can cause blurred vision and even blindness, and it can lead to many other complications.

The two most common types of diabetes are Type 1 and Type 2. Chu said Type 1 is a disorder in which the pancreas can't produce insulin.

Type 1 has a genetic component, so if you have a close relative who's had the disease, it's more likely you'll have it. However, the causes are not clearly understood. Patients are usually diagnosed when they're young, and must replace the insulin their bodies cannot make via injections, pills or an insulin pump.

Type 2 diabetes is far more common — it's responsible for 90 percent of all diabetes diagnoses — and more complicated. Chu said it's the result of dysfunction in multiple systems and organs, and is sometimes related to high blood pressure and heart disease. Genetics can play a role, but so do weight and physical activity.

One surprising thing Chu said was that regular exercise lowers people's risk of getting Type 2 diabetes, independent of weight loss. In other words, even if you don't lose a pound but you get three or four hours of cardiovascular exercise a week, you'll lower your risk.

Of course, weight loss also helps — and it doesn't have to be a lot. Chu said that just 5 to 7 percent could make a difference. For a person who weighs 200 pounds, that's just 10 to 14 pounds.

"It's not an all-or-nothing thing," Chu said. "Staying active even once or twice a week is better than sitting."

In addition to lifestyle changes, Chu said there are many drugs that can be prescribed to treat the disease. Because so many body systems are involved, individual treatment plans will vary.

Some drugs help the body produce insulin, and others help muscles take up sugar in the blood. Still others help control appetite and slow down the release of glucose during digestion.

People with diabetes should monitor their blood sugar regularly to make sure they're meeting targets their doctors provide. A healthy diet that includes complex carbohydrates and limits processed foods — which tend to be high in the simple carbs and sugar that cause blood sugar spikes — is a necessity.

The important thing is to know the truth about your blood sugar, and the best way to find out is with routine blood work that your doctor can order.

Chu said fear keeps people from gaining the knowledge that can save their health — and often their lives.

Don't be afraid. Talk to your doctor.

KNOW THE WARNING SIGNS OF DIABETES

The National Institutes of Health's Institute of Diabetes and Digestive and Kidney Diseases offers this list of signs and symptoms of diabetes:

- Being very thirsty
- Urinating often
- Feeling very hungry
- Feeling very tired
- Losing weight without trying
- Sores that heal slowly
- Dry, itchy skin
- Feelings of pins and needles in your feet
- Losing feeling in your feet
- Blurry eyesight


Remember, however, that some people have diabetes and have mild or no symptoms. The only way to know for sure is to see your doctor and have your blood tested.

TREATMENTS FOR TYPE 1 AND TYPE 2 DIABETES

According to Monterey endocrinologist James Chu, there are many treatment options available for people diagnosed with diabetes. Some of these include:

- Increasing exercise
- Eating a healthy diet
- Losing weight, if necessary
- Oral medications
- Insulin injections

What's important is to work with your doctor and healthcare team to follow the path that's right for you.

Helping hands is all in a day's work for some people

OUR HANDS say a lot about who we are. Think about it — First, there are each person's unique fingerprints. Then, the firmness of someone's handshake is often our first impression. The feel of a person's hands — whether they're calloused or soft — can show how physically taxing their work is.

In his book "Kitchen Confidential," Anthony Bourdain has a beautiful passage describing the history of his work as a chef from the scars on his hands. And in the holiday classic, "Miracle on 34th Street," much is made of the fact that Macy's store psychologist bites his nails.

Unfortunately, another thing our hands betray about us is our age. And since our hands are indeed what Monterey plastic surgeon David Morwood refers to as "a social organ," for some people, aging hands can impact their confidence.

But the consequences of aging go even further, as plastic surgeon Douglas Sunde — whose office is a

stone's throw away from Morwood's — pointed out. As we age, we lose fat in our hands. That leads to cold hands, more visible veins and bones, and increased bruising.

When you need someone to hold your hand, you only want the best.

Both surgeons perform what are called "fat grafts." Although it doesn't sound pretty, it's a simple procedure in which fat is removed from somewhere on the body where it's, um, excess, and injected into the hands.

Sunde explained, "After the procedure, people's hands are warmer and smoother." He added that the same

procedure could also be done on the face to restore a more youthful appearance.

In addition, Morwood pointed out that our hands are not always well-protected from sunlight, and sometimes they're exposed to chemicals, like household cleaners, that dry out the epidermis, the outermost layer of the skin. Remember that old commercial where a mother and daughter compare hands and don't see a lot of difference, thanks to using a certain brand of dishwashing liquid? There was a grain of truth in it.

For those kinds of issues, Morwood uses various kinds of lasers to remove sunspots or even do some dermabrasion to remove damaged layers of skin.

Arthritis is another painful issue for many people as they age. Sunde said that with today's microsurgical techniques, it's possible to replace many of the joints in the hands if they become too painful, just as someone might have a knee or hip replacement.

He noted that anesthesia's gotten much safer over the years, and that the techniques used today are less invasive. "We're better at pain control, too," he said.

Both doctors said it's important to make sure you choose a board-certified plastic surgeon to ensure the highest quality of care. After all, when you need someone to hold your hand, you only want the best.

Failing to plan really is planning to fail — Medicare, Medi-Cal, long term care and you

ON A sunny day, when turquoise waves crash onto the craggy shore along 17 Mile Drive and a cool ocean breeze is blowing, it seems as if all's right with the world. Picnicking, strolling on the beach, and examining healthcare options for retirement would all be great ways to spend the day.

If that last option made you think of a needle scratching its way across a vinyl record, you're not alone — but if you're old enough to remember vinyl records, it's definitely something you should be thinking about.

Getting the basics of Medicare, Medi-Cal, and long-term care insurance is a good starting point, but it's a complicated system, and it helps to have a guide.

Tamara McKee manages the Health Insurance Counseling and Advocacy Program at The Alliance on Aging. HICAP is a program of the California Department of Aging. McKee and a dozen other counselors receive training and support from California Health Advocates, a nonprofit agency.

As part of their outreach, McKee and her team members give 90-minute seminars on Medicare basics throughout Monterey County. People who still have questions after attending the seminars can make appointments for one-on-one consultations.

McKee says it's important to start looking at options before you turn 65, because there are time limits and there can be late enrollment penalties that apply to the various programs. She said, "Boomers don't want to associate with Medicare," but "you have to prepare for the unforeseen and

think about it just like homeowner's insurance or auto insurance."

McKee's conversation is laden with "mays" and "probablies," as she explains there is no one-size-fits-all approach to the government-run retirement healthcare program.

There are four parts to Medicare: A, B, C and D. Most people are automatically enrolled in Part A, which covers inpatient services, when they apply for Social Security. There is no monthly premium, but there are deductibles and co-insurance.

If you delay Social Security, you'll want to look into actively enrolling in Medicare Part A.

Part B covers outpatient services, and Part D covers self-administered drugs. Both of these programs are optional and have monthly premiums, co-insurances, copayments and deductibles. There are currently 32 different Part D plans offered in California, so it's important to evaluate them carefully to see which one makes the most sense with the medications a person is taking.

Part C, also called Medicare Advantage, replaces traditional Medicare Parts A and B and works more like

a PPO or HMO — the kind of insurance most people are familiar with from the workplace. Community Hospital's Aspire program is one example. These types of plans usually — but not always — include Part D coverage. Part C plans are run and purchased privately, but are approved and regulated by Medicare's administering body, the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services. McKee said it's important to re-evaluate Part C and Part D plans annually, as both circumstances and policies can change, and HICAP can help with that process.

Medigap refers to privately offered supplemental insurance policies that do what the name implies: Fill in

is that it covers long-term care. It does cover temporary skilled-nursing care, but only for 100 days, and only if certain criteria are met. Days one to 20 are usually covered at 100 percent, but there is a co-pay for days 21 through 100. Medigap insurance may help with the co-pay. After day 100, you’re on your own.

That’s where long term-care insurance comes into play. Deborah Juran is senior vice president with RBC Wealth Management in Monterey, focusing on wealth issues.

She said fewer companies offer long-term care policies, since the risk of insuring for an aging population with longer life expectancies is hard to quantify. The companies that still offer the policies are faced with increasing their premiums to cover costs.


A solution that is relatively new, according to Juran, is a hybrid life insurance and long term care plan with fixed premiums. Their plans aren’t cheap, but considering that the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services estimates that 70 percent of adults turning 65 will need long-term care at some point, they’re a good investment for those who can afford them.

Of course, long term care insurance isn’t the only way to plan for the future. Reverse mortgages, investments and just plain smart planning can also avert the financial problems

some gaps in Medicare Parts A and B, by helping out with co-payments and co-insurance. Benefits vary, so again, it’s important to evaluate and re-evaluate regularly.

McKee said that one common and important misconception about Medicare

He also uses a minimally invasive technique with no scalpels or sutures to restore receding gums, and uses the patient's own platelets to speed healing in many procedures, reducing down time.

6. Preventing gum disease may prevent stroke and heart disease. No, really. Research shows that people with high levels of some of the bacteria that cause gum disease also tend to have more atherosclerosis in their carotid arteries. That's the \$20 word for "hardening of the arteries" because of fat and other deposits.

Pechak provides patients with a handout listing studies that also link gum disease with diabetes, rheumatoid arthritis and pneumonia.

Of course, correlation isn't causation — but if things as simple as getting regular checkups, brushing and flossing might have even greater benefits, why not do them?

5. Dentists can detect bone loss in the jaw that often accompanies aging, which can cause teeth to loosen and fall out. It's important to be screened regularly because the bone loss may not have any symptoms until it's severe.

4. People take saliva for granted, but as you age, you produce less of it. In addition, Love said, there are many medications that reduce saliva production.

Saliva's important to oral health because it helps fight bacteria and helps move food particles away from teeth. As the amount decreases and gums recede, screening to prevent and detect root caries, or cavities, becomes more important. Early intervention can help to avoid painful abscesses.

3. You're never too old to have a beautiful smile. Lackey has a gallery in his waiting room with before and after photos of patients who've had chipped teeth repaired, straightened, evened out and whitened — and the results are remarkable.
2. Little problems are easier to fix than big ones. Love pointed out that many dental problems don't cause any pain until they become serious, so you can prevent painful dental conditions and the need for major procedures by going when you feel fine.
1. Little problems are less expensive to fix than big ones. Pine Cone readers are pretty savvy about managing money. If you can't force yourself to go get a checkup for the sake of your health, how about doing it to save cash that would be much more fun to spend on a Caraccioli sparkler or Lula's chocolates?

cardiovascular benefits as strenuous exercise. A good laugh can actually burn off calories. It also stimulates circulation and aids digestion.

In a study of patients subjected to prolonged hospitalization, laughter improved morale, decreased anxiety and restored a feeling of wellness and calm.

For many, laughter reduces stress better than vodka or Valium. Plus it's salt free, low calorie, polyunsaturated, you don't need a prescription, it doesn't cost a dime, and there are no harmful side effects.

For the chronologically advantaged, here's the best part: Laughter can actually slow the aging process.

How do you put more humor into your life?


Start with this 5-step plan:

1. Make a personal Humor First Aid Kit for yourself. Nobody knows what makes you laugh better than you do. Assemble a collection of everything that really tickles your funny bone. that so often accompany health crises.

Juran said the best way to ensure your financial future's secure is to find a qualified advisor who can assess your current situation, set goals with you, and coach you toward achieving them.

At the other end of the economic spectrum, Medi-Cal — California's version of Medicaid — is often the solution to long-term care needs. In fact, according to the California Healthcare Foundation, two-thirds of all nursing-home residents receive Medi-Cal benefits.

Mary Hiebner, who works at the Monterey County Department of Social Services, said if a person meets the needs test, which is tied to the federal poverty level, Medicare serves as their primary insurance, and Medi-Cal becomes secondary. She added that there are also programs to help out with Medicare Part A and B expenses.

A primary home is not considered in the needs test as long as the person intends to return there, Hiebner said, but the State of California could put a lien against it. The state can then attempt to recoup some or all of its expenses when the property sells, either before or after the owner's death.

Those are just the basics of the programs most people will have to make decisions about. If it's making your head spin, that's understandable — it's complicated. And that's why people like McKee's team at the Alliance on Aging are a great



SORTING IT OUT

GETTING THE FACTS ABOUT FIBROMYALGIA

FIBROMYALGIA IS frustrating. It's frustrating for the patient and doctor trying to pinpoint what's wrong, and it's frustrating to try to figure out which treatments in what combinations will help.

Carmel neurologist Alejandro Centurion, Monterey rheumatologist Neville Udwadia, and doctor of osteopathy Richard Bernstein from the Monterey Peninsula Orthopaedic and Sports Medicine Institute took some time out of their busy schedules to bring some clarity to this perplexing disorder.

Even with their expert help, and after more than 20 years of research, there are still some question marks when it comes to fibromyalgia, its causes and its treatments. It was first diagnosed in the late 1900s, although some researchers trace descriptions to the 1800s, and one doctor even suggested on his website that it might have been part of Job's troubles.

The textbook definition from the Mayo Clinic is, "a disorder characterized by widespread musculoskeletal pain accompanied by fatigue, sleep, memory and mood issues."

Common symptoms are widespread pain and exhaustion for at least three months, often with pain at specific tender points throughout the body. Bernstein said his patients describe their symptoms as "deep, aching squeezing pain; throbbing tightness."

It's often accompanied by what's called "fibro fog," a lack of mental clarity and an inability to focus. Sleep is also disrupted.

All three doctors said it's a "diagnosis of exclusion," meaning there's no specific test for it, so it's what's left after ruling out a long list of other conditions and diseases through tests and laboratory work.

Some of those conditions include multiple sclerosis, rheumatoid arthritis, endocrine issues, low thyroid, and lupus, all of which can also co-exist with fibromyalgia. "It's a mimicker of other things," said Udwadia. Centurion said, "The symptoms overlap," with those of many other conditions.

That's what makes it difficult to get a diagnosis and, adding insult to injury, there was a period in the not-too-distant past when patients' complaints weren't always taken seriously. Happily, that's changed in recent years.

Centurion said most people are diagnosed between the ages of 30 and 50, although it's been diagnosed in children and senior citizens, as well.

It sometimes comes on gradually and other times quickly, especially after a person sustains a severe emotional trauma, an injury or contracts a viral illness. Although the causes are not yet known, Centurion said genetics plays a role. A person with

fibromyalgia, for example, is eight times more likely to have an immediate family member who also has the disorder than someone who does not. That can be compared to lupus and rheumatoid arthritis, where it's only two or three times as likely.

Based on studies of twins, it appears the disorder is about 50 percent genetic and 50 percent environmental. It's also far more common in women than it is in men.



Menopause may be a risk factor as well.

Bernstein said a chemical in the brain called "substance p" is out of balance in some patients with

fibromyalgia.

It plays a role in transmitting pain impulses and may be responsible for increased response to painful stimuli. Also, serotonin, a chemical associated with calming and reducing anxiety, is often lower in people with fibromyalgia.


Centurion said improving sleep was the No. 1 priority for his patients. "If you can't sleep well, the pain won't get better."

Stress can make symptoms worse, so reducing it is also helpful. And though exercise may be the farthest thing from someone's mind when they're suffering from pain and fatigue, it's an important part of treatment. Patients are instructed to start out slowly, with low-impact activities like swimming, water aerobics, bicycling or yoga.

Bernstein especially recommended exercising in a heated pool. "If you stop moving, the muscles get tight and atrophy," he said, adding that the water makes people feel supported and safe.

The Food and Drug Administration has approved numerous medications that can be effective, but finding the right ones can take time. Bernstein said the long-term side effects and risks of painkillers like ibuprofen (Motrin and Advil), acetaminophen (Tylenol), and opioids have most doctors steering patients away from them.

MIREPOIX & EXOTIC MUSHROOM CHOWDER

Provided by Chef Kirk Larson of Carmel Valley Manor

Welcome everybody home with a savory fall soup! Mushrooms are delicious, and they're good for you, too. Chef Kirk Larson of Carmel Valley Manor sent photos of the finished dish that include a small grilled cheese sandwich made with Leerdammer cheese, a Dutch version of Swiss cheese available at the Cheese Shop in Carmel Plaza and in larger grocery stores. While Chef Kirk's version calls for exotic varieties of mushrooms, you can use whatever you find in your store or farmers market. "Mirepoix" refers to the mix of chopped vegetables that form the base of the chowder. This recipe makes plenty of soup, so you can have some now and freeze the rest for a rainy winter's day.

(Makes 3 1/2 Quarts)

Soak overnight in at least 4-5 cups of hot water:

- 2 oz. dried wild mushrooms. Chef Kirk used Dried Chef's Wild Mushroom Blend, Northwest Mix Mushrooms, available in larger grocery stores
- Olive oil for sauté
- 14 oz. mixed wild and/or domestic mushrooms, cleaned and sliced. Chef Kirk used 2 ounces each of Chanterelles, Hen of the Wood, Royal Trumpets, Beech, Abalone Mushrooms, Morels, and Ceps
- 2 T. finely chopped fresh garlic

- 2 finely diced shallots
- 1 T. fresh thyme leaves
- Fresh cracked black pepper and kosher salt to taste
- To finish the chowder:
- 2 oz. unsalted butter
- 1 leek (approximately 6 oz.) white part only, quartered, washed and drained thoroughly
- 1/2 large sweet onion, diced small
- 4 ribs celery, diced small
- 1 T. finely chopped fresh garlic
- 1/2 t. fresh thyme leaves
- 1/2 oz. porcini mushroom powder — you can make this by grinding up dried porcini mushrooms in a spice or coffee grinder
- 4 C. vegetable stock or broth
- 1 C. heavy cream (optional)
- 1/4 C. dry sherry wine (step away from anything labeled "cooking sherry")
- Fresh cracked black pepper and kosher salt to taste
- 2 1/2 oz. each of butter and all-purpose flour
- 6 oz. white carrots (not parsnips — use regular carrots if you can't find white), diced small and blanched "al dente"
- 3 Russet potatoes (about 12 oz. total), pared, diced small and blanched "al dente"

For the garnish:

Reserved sauteed mushrooms and freshly chopped parsley

To prepare the mushrooms:

Soak the dried mushrooms overnight in hot water. Remove the mushrooms from the liquid and squeeze as much excess liquid as possible back into the bowl. Slice the mushrooms into bite-size pieces and set aside.

Strain 4 cups of the soaking liquid through a coffee filter and add the porcini powder. Mix thoroughly to make a nice

mushroom stock.


Sauté all the mushrooms in olive oil until lightly browned and then add the onions and thyme. When the onions turn brown, add the garlic, salt and pepper. When you smell the garlic, remove everything from the pan and transfer to a bowl. Set aside some mushrooms for the garnish.

To finish the chowder:

Melt butter, add leeks and onions and cook until light brown. Add celery, garlic and thyme, and sauté a few more minutes, until you can smell the garlic. Add the mushrooms, stock from the soaking liquid and the cream, if you're using it.

Simmer until the leeks and onions are soft. Adjust the seasoning with salt and pepper, then add the sherry.

In a separate pan, combine the butter and flour over medium heat, stirring constantly until a thick paste, or roux, is formed. Don't let it brown. Whisk it into the simmering chowder a little at a time, until you like the thickness. Simmer for 15 to 20 minutes to cook out the flour flavor. Stir in the blanched carrots and potatoes, and season with salt and pepper one last time. Garnish with reserved sautéed mushrooms and freshly chopped parsley.

What does help? For some people, it might be muscle relaxants. In others, an antidepressant or an anticonvulsant — a drug originally developed to treat seizures — is part of the answer.

Centurion said, “Depression is very common in these patients because of the constant fatigue and pain.” It’s compounded by the fact that while some family members are supportive and understanding, sometimes a spouse or close relative is not as tolerant of the patient’s constant complaints.

From a psychological standpoint, cognitive behavioral therapy has been shown to help patients with fibromyalgia. The patient and a counselor, psychologist or psychiatrist work together to replace negative thought patterns with positive ones.

While a healthy diet is a good idea for anyone, it’s particularly important for fibromyalgia patients, as the disorder is sometimes accompanied by irritable bowel syndrome.

With medical science unable to provide definitive answers about causes or treatment, it’s understandable that some patients turn to alternative therapies — although they have little support in the way of large, randomized studies. But Bernstein noted that acupuncture has been shown to balance levels of substance p in the brain, and

he recommends it to his patients. UCLA’s Center for East-West Medicine also endorses acupuncture for fibromyalgia, based on its review of research literature.

There’s no way to predict fibromyalgia’s course. Some people experience dramatic improvement and even go into remission for years, while for others, it becomes progressively worse. It is important to note that it is not fatal, however.

With so many symptoms and possible treatments, the process of narrowing down what’s right for any one patient is like nailing Jell-O to the wall. But with patience, and the right practitioner, it is possible to find relief.






Figure 1: Notice the very small blood vessels surrounding each nerve.




Figure 2: When these very small blood vessels become diseased they begin to shrivel up and the nerves begin to degenerate.
