# PEACE PROGRAM CALLS For increased saving

Starving Millions Now Look to America's Open Pantry for Sustenance.

America's intensive food conservation program must not cease in order that we may continue our world leadership along humanitarian lines and serve all starving and demoralized peoples, not only of neutral countries, but the liberated peoples of those soyernments which no longer threaten the peace of the world, according to advices received from Food Administration officials at Washington.

Food has become the greatest "unarmed policeman" ever known. It is vitally necessary to save bloody anarohy from over-running a large portion of Europe. It is the tranquilizethe one thing that will make it possible for peace and reconstruction to prevail among those nations which have fought and bled for more than four years while conducting the most awful war human's has ever known. America has be ome the food reservoir of the world. Starving millions look to us for sustenance, and we are pledged to send it. More the 200

America has ) e ome the food reservoir of the world. Starving millions look to us for sustenance, and we are pledged to send it. More than 200, 000,040 people additional have been added to those to whom we agreed to send approximately 17,500,000 tons of food stuffs this year. Peace, now indicated by the signing of the armistice with Germany, as a possibility of the very near future, has not added one pound of food to the world's resources and no further crops in those stricken countries are possible until next spring and summer.

Our last year's food shipments aggregated about 11.700.000 tons. Our war program called for the exportation of 17,500.000 tons prior to June 30 next, while our prace program calls for nearly 20,000.000 tons. By comparing this vest amount with our average pre-war shipment of less than 5, 000,000 tons, it can readily be seen that to fulfill our pledge to aid literally millions of starving women and children, on whom America never made war, will mean greatly increased production. accompanied by intensive food saying all down the line; the absolute elimination of waste and extravagance in the kitchens and on the tables of the homes, and the substittion of home-grown products and perishables as much as possible for those staples which can be readily exported.

Saving from now on should chiefly be directed to fats of all kinds, dairy products, which include cheese and butter; meats, sugar and all other staple commodities. None is asked to sacrifice health or happiness in this new program of saving, but merely to exercise thought and gare in the preparation and use of foods which can be exported to the famished people of Europe, who look to us for their salvation and relief from hunger and distress.

While the war is over, the need for conservation remains in order that the American people may take their place as the "Big Brother" of the oppressed and the suffering, and the Government confidently expects that the new appeal to the humanitarian feelings of the nation will be as effective as was the food appeal based on the slogan, "Save Food to Win the War."

Food savings of millions of Americans during our first year of war enabled this ment to send enormous food shipments abroad for our fighting forces and the Allied Our savings in cereals—out of a short crop—amounted to 154,900,000 bushels; all of w shipped to Europe. #### Great Tibetan Industry.

By far the largest herds of musk deer are to be found on the southern shores of the Koko-Nor, and the supply of musk there (at Taochou) is larger than the quantity that comes through Sungpan. In fact, great quantities of musk do not come to Sungpan at all, but are sent east to Yuchow, in Honan, where a fair is held in the ninth and tenth moons, many of the Sungpan traders visiting this place. At Tachienlu musk is the most valuable export, practically every hong recking with 1<sup>s</sup>, and nearly all the Tibetans who come from the far interior bring some with them. The price of medium musk there is thirteen times its weight in silver.

#### Shark Leather Here.

From being an implacable enemy to man science is making the shark expiate its crimes by helping to reduce the high cost of living. For the tiger of the sea has now become a source of leather to c'othe millions of pairs of feet.

Experiments with shark leather indicate that it may be used for practically everything now made of cattle leather. It is even claimed that shark hides have one great advantage over cowhides in that the "splits" are amazingiv strong. A "split" is simply a peeling of the hide—something like the veneer cut from a slab of wood.

senting forty-three leading life insurance companies in the United States, it appears that a spinster lives longer than a married woman. Business women live longer than business men. A woman who takes an endowment policy lives longer than a woman who takes an ordinary life policy. It is not easy to explain why an unmarried woman survives a matron, nor why a business woman survives a busi-ness man, but the longevity of the endowment woman is believed to be due to the determination to live until the policy matures. Will power is hardly less important in many cases than physique, and must always be reckoned with.
