
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Pastor returns with new plans for The Pit

AFTER GETTING broadly criticized by the planning commission and various community members for their two prior proposed projects for The Pit at Dolores and Fifth, Monaco businessman Patrice Pastor and his design team submitted revised plans Wednesday.

According to Chris Mitchell, managing director of

After getting feedback from the city and the community, Patrice Pastor submitted a third proposal to develop The Pit at Dolores and Fifth.

Pastor's Esperanza Carmel LLC, the redesign by Monterey-based Wald, Ruhnke & Dost architects was inspired by planning commissioners' comments and feedback from nearly 160 people who reviewed the previously submitted plans — including the modern design the city approved for former owners Michael Draper and Bob Leidig that was never built because they ran out of money.

"So far, we have received 157 separate feedback responses, but we continue to receive more feedback each week, mainly by email as well as some in person, over the phone and by letter," he said. "The majority of people are fed up with the lack of progress on the project. We have had a lot of people approach us separately to offer their support and apologies, as a part of the community of Carmel, that the process is going so slowly for us."

Set to work

After Pastor purchased the blighted property in March 2020 for \$9 million, his design team submitted plans calling for a half-Tudor, half-Mediterranean-style complex with underground parking, ground-floor retail, apartments and condos upstairs, and an interior courtyard. But the planning commission disliked that proposal, sending the architects back to the drawing board in April 2021.

In March, in collaboration with Pastor's architectural team in Monaco, Henry Ruhnke presented

Laureles Grade murderer won't get new trial

A DEFENSE attorney's efforts to get a retrial for Joseph Sampognaro, who was found guilty in April 2021 of shooting his father to death in a barn on Laureles Grade and then fleeing in his dad's car, have failed. Tara Higgins had argued her client should get a new trial because one of his former lawyers had a brief affair with the bailiff, one or more jurors slept during testimony, and another man was found a year-and-a-half later with a gun similar to the murder weapon, which was never recovered.

Lots of evidence

In his June 28 ruling, Monterey County Superior Court Judge Mark Hood recounted the case against Sampognaro, including "extensive evidence of motive, threats to kill the victim, seeking the assistance of a friend to aid in the murder, eyewitness testimony of the murder, the defendant's immediate flight in the decedent's car with law

enforcement in pursuit, and the defendant's apprehension still covered with the victim's blood." Given the strong case against Sampognaro, Hood found that even if Higgins proved her allegations, a jury would be unlikely to find her client anything other than guilty of first-degree murder and other grievous charges.

The affair

Hood described a witness' account of the murder in September 2020 and detailed Sampognaro's attempted escape in his father's Corvette, which he subsequently crashed on Highway 1 in the Carmel Highlands with officers in pursuit. His motives for murdering his father were many, Hood said the witness told the court: His father had sex with Sampognaro's pregnant girlfriend while Sampognaro was incarcerated, he exchanged drugs for sex

Agencies laud new water supply but Cal Am cites costs

WHILE THE public agencies behind wastewater reclamation project Pure Water Monterey are celebrating an operational milestone, the company which purchases the purified drinking water and delivers it to its Peninsula customers is decrying the skyrocketing cost of the water.

On June 30, officials with the Pure Water Monterey project announced that it had completed its first "full fiscal year" of deliveries of purified water to Cal Am customers, according to Monterey One Water and the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District, which manage and operate the Marina facility. The agencies have a contract to deliver 3,500 acre-feet of water to Cal Am per year and put 173 acre-feet into reserves.

Reserves and deliveries

The government agencies began delivering water from the treatment plant in February 2020, but most of it went into the district's reserves, and deliveries of water to Cal

Judge tosses Verizon suit against city

 Γ HE CITY of Carmel did not violate federal telecommunications law when the council denied Verizon's bid to install a cell tower on a power pole near La Playa hotel last December, a U.S. magistrate judge decided last week when he dismissed the company's lawsuit against the city.

Last year, the planning commission and city council said the tower at Carmelo and Ninth would violate rules against telecom facilities in the residential district and would contravene restrictions on height, visual clutter, negative impacts on public and private views, and groundmounted equipment in public view.

In writing

But Verizon's lawyers argued that city officials failed to formally notify the company by a Dec. 17, 2021, deadline imposed by Federal Telecommunications Act of 1996, which amounted to a failure "to act within a reasonable period of time," a violation of Verizon's rights under the federal code. Notifying the company is a legal requirement to make the action "final," Verizon maintained. The company sued the city in January.

But representatives of the telecom giant attended those hearings and knew the final outcome, so their argument that the city failed to give them proper notice of the denial is a sham, the city's lawyers argued in federal court in March. All that mattered was that the resolution of denial was signed before the deadline and that it was available to anyone who asked for it.

In his June 30 decision, Nathanael Cousins agreed with the city's take on the case. He noted the Telecommunications Act requires a municipality's denial of an application to "be in writing and supported by substantial evidence contained in a written record," but he did not agree with Verizon's argument that city officials were required to

Baron says he will run for second term

CITY COUNCILMAN Jeff Baron, who unseated an incumbent when he was first elected in 2018 after serving on the forest and beach commission, said this week he plans to seek a second four-year term.

"I can vividly recall the excitement of sitting on the

dais for the first time back in late November of 2018, ready to get to work, but I can barely remember that last in-pe cil meeting back in early 2020 when we were wiping down the microphone and preparing to go into emergency shutdown," he said in his announcement. "It would be two years before we gathered again in the chambers to make the decisions that guide our community."

During his time on the council, Baron has made his positions known on many topics — including

Perfect Pairing

EVERY SINGLE guide dog she's had — six, to be exact — has been a German shepherd. Except Seymour. He's a prima donna. He's also a standard poodle.

Sandy Claws

Trained by Guide Dogs of the Desert in Palm Springs, one of very few such schools that train poodles, his person said, Seymour is super smart, very loyal and maybe even a bit of a clown.

"Seymour is perfect. He's the most protective and affectionate and expressive dog," his person said. "He communicates through body language. When he's on leash, he knows he's on the job, so he prefers it because it makes him feel connected to me. He never sits in a room by himself; he always has to be with me."

Seymour lies on the floor of their Del Mesa home, near the couch where his person sits, his head pressed against her ankle. When she moves, crossing her legs, he moves as well, lifting his head to rest his snout on her leg.

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Population grows slowly but county payroll gets much fatter

THE COUNTY of Monterey employs 1,000 more people than it did a decade ago and has the 12th-highest payroll of California's 57 counties, paying nearly a half-billion dollars in wages and outpacing counties with higher populations, according to new data by the state controller's office.

Controller Betty Yee last week published 2021 payroll data for counties and cities. It covers 666,421 government jobs statewide encompassing a total of more than \$53.15 billion in wages. Cities and counties self-report the information to the controller.

Fat payroll

According to figures released June 28, Monterey County government paid out \$496,925,625 in wages in 2021. Compare that to 2011, when the county's payroll was \$325,879,942. That's an increase of about \$171 million, or 53 percent, in only one decade.

Monterey County can now say it has California's 12th-highest payroll among counties. The ranking is the highest it's had since at least 2009. From that year to 2019, Monterey County hovered in the 14th or 15th place for payroll until 2020, when it inched to 13th place.

One reason for the beefed-up payroll is the big increase in employment. In 2011, the county had 5,073 workers. In 2021, that number was 6,140 — an increase of 1,067 workers, or 21 percent.

The boosts in jobs and payroll are not a result of population increases. In 2011, the county's population was 419,586, while in 2021, the number was 433,716, an increase of only 14,130 people, or 3.4 percent.

Meanwhile, Monterey County's 2021 payroll was more than six other California counties with higher populations.

Fresno County, which has more than 1 million people, had \$30 million less in total wages in 2021 and 2,700 fewer employees than Monterey County. However, Fresno paid about \$184 million more in health and retirement contributions.

Santa Barbara County, which has about 12,000 more people than Monterey County, paid about \$102 million less in county employee wages. Santa Barbara County had about 900 fewer employees than Monterey County, the data shows.

Sonoma County, with a population of 482,404, paid about \$91 million less in wages even though it has about 48,000 more people. Sonoma County has nearly 800 fewer public employees than Monterey County but pays about \$4 million less in total health and retirement benefits.

The total Monterey County paid out in health and retirement benefits has also increased, obviously, over the past decade. In 2011, the county paid \$90,213,130 for those things while in 2021 that number was \$128,962,636, an increase of 38.7 million.

Hospital costly

The Pine Cone asked county administrative officer Charles McKee several questions about the payroll report, including why Monterey County government pays more in total wages than a half-dozen more populous California counties, why the county has more workers than other counties with higher populations, and why, with such a small population increase over the last decade, Monterey County needs about 1,000 more employees than it did

McKee pointed to Natividad Medical Center, the county-run hospital, and the Monterey County Water Resources Agency, which eat up tens of millions of

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

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The gavel falls

Verdicts, pleas and sentencings announced by Monterey County District Attorney Jeannine Pacioni

June 13 — The Hon. Mark E. Hood sentenced Juan Hernandez Velasco, 39 and a resident of Greenfield, to 42 years in prison for committing three counts of a forcible lewd acts upon a child under 14 years old and two counts of lewd acts upon a child under 14 years old. All the offenses are violent felonies and considered strikes under California's three strikes law. Velasco will also be required to register as a sex offender for the rest of his life.

Jane Doe reported that Velasco, a family member, had molested her on many occasions for several years. Doe was around 6 years old at the time the molestations began. Velasco would molest Doe while her parents were at work. The molestations continued for several years until Doe bravely reported to her school counselor that Velasco had been sexually assaulting her. According to research into sexual assault victim behavior, it is very common for victims to delay reporting the sexual abuse, especially when the victim is a minor and has a close relationship with the perpetrator.

This case was investigated by Detective Armando Lerma and other officers from

Greenfield Police Department. Doe was assisted by district attorney victim advocate Sonia Buenrostro.

June 17 — Rene San Juan Cruz, 39, of Salinas, was sentenced to 16 months in state prison after pleading no contest to felony driving under the influence of alcohol. He also admitted that he has a prior felony DUI conviction, and his blood alcohol content was 0.2 percent or higher.

On April 9, 2022, at approximately 11:40 p.m., CHP patrol officers were driving south-bound on Sanborn Road north of Alisal Road when they observed a vehicle in the left turning lane of southbound Sanborn Road, with the driver asleep, the engine running, and the vehicle in drive. The officers contacted the driver, later identified as Rene San Juan Cruz, and directed him to put the car in park. Cruz had a hard time putting the car in park.

The officers told Cruz to open the door or the driver's window, and Cruz did not know how to do either. When Cruz eventually opened the door, he stumbled out

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Tattoo studio owner convicted of assaulting female clients

THE OWNER of a Monterey tattoo studio was convicted last week of assault against two female clients he was tattooing, but he was found not guilty of sexual battery.

Following a two-day trial, a jury in Salinas found Justin Dwayne Foss, 43, guilty of two counts of misdemeanor assault against two women in 2020 and 2021, according to county prosecutors.

On July 1, Monterey County Superior Court Judge Robert Burlison sentenced Foss to a 100-day jail sentence, one year of probation, and ordered him not to contact the victims.

According to court records, the jury found Foss not guilty of sexual battery, a more serious charge that could have sent him to prison. The DA's office said Foss is the owner of Gold Coast Tattoo Studio on the 600 block of Lighthouse Avenue in Monterey.

Boozing while tattooing

In both instances of assault against the victims, Foss had been "abusing alcohol" while tattooing the women, according to prosecutors.

On Jan. 24, 2020, Foss asked a female client to remove part of her clothing in preparation for a tattoo on her clavicle. But Foss went further, the DA's office said, and "made an attempt to unclasp her bra, grabbing her torso strap. Throughout the tattoo process, he persistently acted inappropriately."

Once Foss completed the tattoo, he began wiping off the victim's chest area, court documents filed in April by the DA's office show.

"While doing so, Foss stuck his hand down" the woman's "shirt, over her breasts, and paused on her nipple area," according to prosecutors.

The woman, who serves in the U.S. Marine Corps, told military authorities about the incident, and they informed local police.

Forced kiss

On Jan. 12, 2021, in a separate incident, Foss agreed to tattoo a woman's right arm and shoulder for \$300. Like the incident a year before, prosecutors said Foss was "abusing alcohol before, during and after the tattoo process."

"He made sexual remarks toward Jane Doe No. 2, including repeated attempts to get her to stay the night with him," the DA's office said. "While she was lying on the tattoo table, he made a sexual advance toward her. Feeling uncomfortable, Doe decided to leave, but Foss grabbed her and forced her to kiss him." Court documents said Foss also "tried numerous times to massage" the woman's breasts.

The woman "told Foss several times to stop touching her like that," prosecutors said. "When she said this to Foss, he would stop touching her and start chugging White Claw alcoholic beverages. Foss consumed approximately six to seven White Claw beverages while tattooing" the woman, according to prosecutors.

Because Foss was "extremely intoxicated and doing a poor job on the tattoo." the woman, with the help of a friend, used an excuse to leave Gold Coast Tattoo, and she left the business about four hours after she got there, court documents show.

The friend then called police and reported the incident to a dispatcher.

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


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HEARING SET FOR FORMER SHERIFF'S DEPUTY ACCUSED OF SEX CRIMES

FORMER MONTEREY County Sheriff's deputy Nathaniel DiMaggio is set to appear in court July 15 on felony charges

of raping an unconscious victim, sexual penetration with a foreign object while the victim was unconscious, oral copulation of a victim unconscious of the act, and possession of obscene matter showing a minor engaging in a sexual act.

DiMaggio was arrested at his Salinas home by deputies May 13 after a woman reported the rape May 9. The victim, whose name and age were not released, told deputies the incident happened in Carmel Valley May 8. After the patrol deputy who took the initial report concluded a crime had occurred, detec-

tives took over the case and investigated further, developing enough probable cause to search his home on Prestancia Circle in Salinas, the sheriff's office reported at the time. Deputies served the warrant and arrested DiMaggio, 43.

Protective order

A criminal complaint filed May 27 in Monterey County Superior Court lists the felony charges against DiMaggio and states he was aware the woman was unconscious when he committed the sex crimes. If convicted, he'll have to provide blood samples for HIV testing and must register as a sex offender. The complaint also states he possessed pornography that

he knew "depicted a person under the age of 18 years personally engaging in and simulating sexual conduct."

On June 1, DiMaggio, who is represented by defense attorney Juliet Peck, entered not-guilty pleas on all charges, while the judge issued a criminal protective order barring him from contacting the alleged victim in any way. The order remains in effect until June 1, 2025.

He's next set to appear in court July 15 for the setting of a pre-

liminary hearing, at which time the prosecutor and law enforcement will lay out the case against him and the judge will decide if there's sufficient evidence to proceed.

According to information available online, DiMaggio worked as a deputy in the jail from 2011 to sometime in 2019. He was also affiliated with Coastal Luxury Management, the company founded by David Bernahl and Rob Weakley to create and organize the annual Pebble Beach Food & Wine event.

Arrest warrant for knife shop burglar


THE 35-YEAR-OLD Aptos man who allegedly smashed the front window of Carmel Cutlery with a hatchet in the early hours of April 14 and stole several knives remains on the lam, while a judge last month issued a warrant for his arrest.

Thanks to clear surveillance video and the city's traffic cameras, police identified Kringen as their suspect in the break-in less than an hour after the alarm sounded at Stephen Owen's Dolores Street shop shortly before 6 a.m.

Officers alerted authorities in the Santa Cruz area, and the following Monday, they found Kringen, took him into custody, and turned him over to Carmel P.D. Police also towed the Mercedes he'd driven away from the burglary, and they reportedly found in it the stolen knives, hatchet and some of the clothing he wore during the break-in. But rather than being booked into jail, Kringen was taken to the hospital due to a medical issue, and he was later discharged.

On June 3, a judge signed a warrant for Kringen's arrest for second-degree burglary and vandalism over \$400, both felonies. Warrants were issued earlier for Kringen in four other misdemeanor cases involving theft, evading officers and possession of drug paraphernalia, and he failed to appear for a May 24 court hearing in one of those cases.

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Urologist faces malpractice suit

A SALINAS urologist accused a decade ago of giving patients unnecessary radiation treatments is the subject of a new lawsuit claiming he botched a prostate procedure that sent a patient to the emergency room and left the man with a "permanent disability."

In a civil complaint filed June 29, Arthur Thorne accuses urologist Aytac Apaydin and the clinic where he works, Salinas Valley Urology Associates, of negligence for a Jan. 25, 2021, "green light" treatment. GreenLight Laser is used to treat urinary blockage by non-cancerous enlargement of the prostate.

Thorne claims that during the surgery, Apaydin "negligently severed two" of his "arteries, causing massive internal bleeding," and that the urologist "failed to treat or diagnose the issue."

Immediately after the procedure, Thorne said he suffered from persistent internal bleeding and blood in his urine. He claims that while he told Apaydin about the adverse symptoms, the urologist didn't respond apropriately.

'Arduous recovery'

"Aytac Apaydin negligently failed to timely or adequately diagnose and treat Arthur Thorne for his injuries sustained from the procedure," according to the complaint, which also lists Thorne's wife, Lois, as a plaintiff.

"Thorne complained to Apaydin of his symptoms, but he ignored his complaints," according to the lawsuit, filed for the Thornes by Greenbrae attorney David Shape.

Thorne's complications from the procedure were so severe, he contends, that nine days later, he was admitted to the emergency room with severe blood loss and

and Santa Clara Counties.

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"underwent surgery to stop the internal bleeding, which ultimately saved his life."

"As a result of the defendants' negligence," the complaint goes on to say, "Thorne has suffered life threatening injuries, a long and arduous recovery, additional surgeries" and other problems, including "permanent disability due to defendants' failure to meet the standard of care required of medical professionals in similar circumstances."

The Thornes, who also name Advanced Medical Surgery Center as a defendant, are seeking damages exceeding \$25,000.

Previous allegations

Apaydin and Salinas Valley Urology Associates co-owner Steven Worsham were named in a 2012 Bloomberg News article alleging they treated prostate cancer patients with a \$2 million IMRT accelerator, even though other therapies would have been just as good or better and cost much less, according to reporter Peter Waldman.

In 2018, Apaydin and Worsham agreed to pay \$1.085 million to resolve allegations that they submitted and caused the submission of false claims to Medicare for image-guided radiation therapy that was referred and billed in violation of federal laws, including a kickback statute, which are intended to ensure that a physician's medical judgment is not compromised by improper financial incentives, according to a press release issued by the U.S. Department of Justice.


The DOJ also alleged that Apaydin and Worsham "knowingly caused" eight urologists in Monterey and Salinas to violate the federal statutes. Those urologist entered into settlement agreements and collectively paid the government \$900,000.

The two men, however, were not charged with any crimes.

Appealing or appalling? Blimp promoting 'Shark Week' soars over bay

■ Victim of P.G. shark attack recovering

m WO}$ WEEKS after a Monterey man was nearly killed in a shark attack at Lovers Point in Pacific Grove, a TV cable channel promoting a show about sharks flew a large blimp featuring a menacing, toothy great white over Monterey Bay.

The 128-foot-long blimp — painted like a shark and emblazoned with "Shark Week" and 'Discovery" — was

spotted all over Monterey Bay Wednesday afternoon. The 44-foot-tall blimp is part of a stunt by cable channel Discovery to promote its popular "Shark Week," which first aired 34 years ago.

July 1-30, "two 'Shark Week' blimps are roaming the coasts looking for the biggest 'Shark Week' fans," Discovery said on its website. "Follow the journey along the coasts of America and see the full cities list for a sighting near you."

The cable channel company, owned by Warner Bros. Discovery, also encouraged people who spot the blimp to share photos of it on social media. The blimp originated in San Francisco "with flyovers across Los Angeles, San Jose, Seattle and San Diego," according to Discovery. A Discovery itinerary said the blimp, which travels about 50 mph, would also be in Monterey Bay Friday, July 15. It's scheduled for two more Monterey Bay flyovers at the end of the month.

However, from a PR perspective, the timing of the publicity stunt over the bay couldn't get much worse, and an argument could be made that it's distasteful.

On June 22, Steve Bruemmer, 62, was swimming off of Lovers Point Beach in Pacific Grove when he was bitten by a shark and sustained serious injuries. Several people rescued Bruemmer, who lost multiple liters of blood and suffered deep flesh wounds. He survived and is recovering

Discovery has another blimp flying over cities on the East Coast, and it started a "battle of the blimps" competition between the coasts. The winning coast is the one that receives the most posts of the blimp on social media.

'Tone deaf?'

It's not clear if Discovery intentionally targeted Monterey Bay because of the P.G. shark attack, and the company did not respond to a message seeking comment. However, a local nonprofit is hoping to take advantage of the Discovery show.

In an email Thursday morning, the local chapter of the American Red Cross, based in Santa Cruz, announced a partnership with Discovery in a drive urging people to give blood.

"Join the American Red Cross and Discovery to get your heart pumping in July!" the Red Cross said. "We're teaming up for 'Shark Week' to encourage donors to give blood to help prevent a summer blood shortage after a steep drop recently in donations."

KENNETH CHALONER SCHLEY


"We're the lucky ones," he'd always say, and that's how Kenneth Chaloner Schley, Ken to most and Kenny to some, lived every day of his life until it ended, mercifully quickly but way too soon, on June 24, 2022. He was 79, set to turn 80 next March 25. People who didn't know his age usually thought he was much younger, thanks not just to his youthful good looks, but to his affable nature and outlook.

Ken was the youngest of four boys born to Viola Tuckerman and Grant Barney Schley in the Santa Ynez Valley. He never got to know his father, who died while transporting a B-25D bomber in April 1943, but his stepfather, a Danish cowboy named Sigvard Hansen, loved him like he was his own. Ken's youngest brother was born eight years after he was.

He spent his childhood on the family's sprawling Broken Arrow ranch, becoming an adept horseman who enjoyed competing in shows, playing polo and helping to move the family's herd of Charolais cattle. After attending local schools, he headed east to St. Paul's in Concord, N.H. There, among other important things, he was introduced to what would become his signature piece of apparel, the bow tie, which he learned to don quickly while dashing down the stairs in his dorm, always late for class.



California got him back when he enrolled at Stanford University, where he studied history, joined the Theta Xi fraternity and met his first wife, Susan Morse Osborne. He graduated in 1965. History was his major because he was ever intrigued by the human condition, but he was also an avid



His first real career pursuit was in racing cars. It's not surprising he had a love of speed and adventure, considering both his parents were pilots and exhibited much strength and bravery — his mother up until the age of 99.

He raced regionally and nationally from 1968 into the mid-1970s, first in a Mini Cooper C Sedan — a photo hanging in his garage shows him getting three wheels off the ground in this car — followed by an Alfa Romeo GTA and a Tui AM-29 Super Vee. He and his wife converted an old school bus, nicknamed Blunderbuss, into a camper and towed his cars all over the country from track to track. (One on occasion, they got stuck in an old stone tunnel and had to let air out of the tires in order to get all the way through.) Good friends and his little brother, Sig Hansen Jr., worked as his crew along the way. He took 1973 off from racing when his daughter, Mary, was born.

Ken tried a few different professions before landing at Kidder Peabody, the stock brokerage firm where he found his true calling. He savored the challenges and enjoyed building relationships and friendships as only he could, caring for his clients through the numerous ups and downs of the market while working alongside some remarkable colleagues. He planned to embark on the multiyear process of retirement on his 80th birthday and was proud of what he helped build with the Pacific Investment Group at UBS.

In August 1986, he found the woman who would be his true love and partner in life, Susan Christine Freeland. They married in September 1988 — when they could finally fit a visit to the judge into their busy work schedules — bringing her son and two daughters into his life and his daughter into hers. They lived together in Carmel until the opportunity arose to build a new house in the supplies around from the force years the

house in the sunshine, away from the foggy coast, in Pasadera. Theirs was the first constructed in the development, which debuted a golf course designed by Jack Nicklaus just in time for the 2000 U.S. Open in Pebble Beach.

Ken took joy from many things, but chief among them was golf, which he

played at every opportunity. In 1984, he joined the Cypress Point Club after his former father-in-law, Richard Osborne, sponsored him. There may be no one who took more pleasure in playing at Cypress and sharing it with friends and other enthusiasts. When he played badly, he laughed at himself, and when he played well, he celebrated.

His love of the game had him travel all over the world to play, but he also simply loved adventure. He made repeat visits to Europe and explored Australia, the UK, Japan, Antarctica, Iceland, the Panama Canal and other destinations. He and Susan completed their most recent trip to France in May. "Getting there is half the fun," he used to say, which might be why cruises were one of his favorite ways to travel.

While he no longer raced cars, he never lost his love of thrills, hitting the track on his motorcycle even in his 70s. He had another day on his Ducati tentatively planned for next month. He took meticulous care of all of his machines, including the 1969 Alfa Romeo Spider he bought new and many years later restored. He always drove with attention, skill and enthusiasm — and taught a lot of the younger people in his life how to drive, too.

A dear friend introduced Ken and Susan to Cavalier King Charles spaniels, and they were immediately smitten. Their first Cav, Dash, was his shadow, and Ken found a new joy in puppy class and obedience training, going on to compete. Demitasse, Daisy, Bonny, Millie and Jackson followed. At one point, he and Susan had four Cavaliers. Often, he took a dog or two golfing.

There aren't enough superlatives to describe him, and there aren't enough pages to summarize who he was. Words are inadequate.

He was a man of style and poise — and one of the few who could pull off a combination of pinks and lavenders topped with a pastel bow tie. He withheld judgment. Anyone in conversation with him felt like the only person who mattered. It wasn't uncommon for those who'd known him only hours to feel as though they'd known him for years. He had a ready, genuine laugh and a quick wit. He was always humble, giving credit to others even when he

deserved the praise. He never raised his voice. He had an extraordinary amount of empathy and capacity for love. He was thoughtful, kind — and mischievous. He was a bon vivant who loved good food, good red wine and good tequila, especially with good friends and those he loved. He made and kept lifelong friends through every chapter of his life — including three of his best friends, all named John. His nightly cocktail was a Manhattan. He loved jazz but knew Susan didn't, so he'd only play it when she wasn't there to hear it. They listened to country together, though. He enjoyed a good cigar, especially outdoors while listening to live music and drinking Scotch at the Bohemian Grove during summer encampment.

His affiliations are many and include the Bohemian Club, Cypress Point Club, the Pebble Beach and Tennis Club, the Club at Pasadera and the Old Capitol Club. He was a board member and officer for the nonprofit Laguna Seca Raceway Foundation.

Ken is survived by his wife of 34 years, Susan Freeland; daughter Mary; stepchildren Patrick Susemihl, Amy Susemihl and Katie Bennie; grandchildren Cameryn Susemihl, Damianna Jamison, Layla Jamison, Thomas Bennie and Colten Bennie; brothers Grant Barney Schley and Sigvard Hansen, many nieces and nephews, and the many friends for whom he was always grateful. He is also survived by Jackson, his faithful canine companion. He was predeceased by brothers Turner Schley and Wolcott Schley.

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After rehabbing sea lion, researchers keep tabs with high-tech tracker

HUMANS AREN'T the only ones in Big Sur who rely on high tech-devices. A young sea lion rescued by the Marine Mammal Center after losing his mother is back in the wild again — with a distinctive antenna protruding from his back.

The sea lion was just a pup when the Marine Mammal Center's Moss Landing field office received calls in August 2021 about a sea lion in distress at Pomponio State Beach in Pescadero.

"After being transported to the center's Sausalito hospital for rehabilitation, the animal was diagnosed with malnutrition and having been separated from his mother too early,' Giancarlo Rulli of the Marine Mammal Center told The Pine Cone. "The pup was initially tube fed a blended mixture of ground herring and water — AKA 'a fish smoothie' - by animal care volunteers before transitioning to freely consuming sustainably caught herring with other sea lions of similar age."

Released at Point Lobos

Named Sundance by those who work for the Marine Mammal Center, the young sea lion showed enough improvement to convince his caretakers to release him. "After several months of rehabilitative treatment and greatly improving in overall body condition, Sundance was released

Albert Ruel Grosnick, a longtime Monterey resident and dentist, was on vacation with his family in Spain when he was fatally injured in a car accident on July 2, 2022. Albert was 69 years old, and is survived by his wife of 46 years, Arminda Garza Grosnick; his children, Marisa Gillespie, Alicia Kanbar, Mark Grosnick; his

grandchildren, Rory Claire Gillespie, Jacob Gillespie, and Remy Kanbar; his sisters-in law, Margaret (Peggy) Fortuin Harray and Saundra Harray; as well as many beloved nieces, nephews, inlaws, God-children, and friends.

Albert (Al) was born in Turlock, California on April 16, 1953, to Emma Marie Smith Grosnick, an elementary school teacher, and George Albert Grosnick, a machinist. The family made their home in Stockton. Al had two elder brothers, John Merwin Harray, a Felton educator, and Richard Keats Harray, a Monterey attorney.

Al's youth in the Central Valley involved study, football, friendship, mischief, and most satisfying to Albert, earnest

work on the Smith family farm. Al originally desired to be a farmer, but chose the profession of dentistry after his Uncle Smith advised him to farm as a hobby, but not as a way to make a steady living.

Am didn't begin until September of that year. Fiscal year 2021-22, which ended on June 30, marked the first full year of deliveries under the agreement with Cal Am to supply the water to its customers, Monterey One and the water district said, and the agencies are praising the mile-

"We are very pleased with the performance of the Pure Water Monterey project," Monterey One Water general manager Paul Sciuto said in a statement. "We have built a terrific team here to support the program and I am proud of everyone's effort."

The delivered water represents 37 percent of all water supplied to Cal Am's customers in the Monterey Peninsula, according to the agencies.

"Plus, we now have an additional 1,207 acre-feet (about 393 million gallons) stored in the ground if needed in an emergency or shortage," water district general manager Dave Stoldt said. (One acre-foot of water is about 326,000 gallons.)

The purified water from Pure Water Monterey is put into the Seaside Groundwater Basin and withdrawn by Cal Am, which then delivers it to its Monterey Peninsula

More expensive

Asked about the milestone, Cal Am this week pointed to the skyrocketing costs of the water from the Pure Water Monterey project. Spokesman Josh Stratton provided Pine Cone figures indicating that the cost has risen almost 25 percent.

"In the previous fiscal year, Cal Am and its customers were charged \$2,808 per acre foot," Stratton told The Pine Cone. "Beginning this month, the price has jumped to \$3,486 per acre foot.'

Stratton also weighed in on a dispute between Cal Am, Monterey One and the water district over the failure of a large well, dubbed ASR-1, that the company had used to supply water to its customers.

The issue began last September when the State Water Board's Division of Drinking Water informed Monterey One, the water district and Cal Am that it would no longer allow Cal Am to use drinking water from ASR-1. The water agency ordered the well to be shut down.

Not long enough

The problem, it explained, was that treated wastewater injected into the Seaside Basin from reclamation project Pure Water Monterey was not being kept underground long enough to ensure it was safe. State regulations require that treated wastewater stay underground a minimum of two months before extraction for drinking water.

"The refusal by" the water district and Pure Water Monterey "to cease or reduce injection has resulted in a state-mandated shut down of this essential well, jeopardizing Cal Am's ability to supply adequate water to Monterey County residents," Stratton said.

Stoldt has characterized the issue as a "slight hitch" that would not affect water supply. Nevertheless, Friday, July 8 the water district board of directors is expected to discuss in closed session the possibility of "significant exposure to litigation" from Cal Am over the issue.

Stratton said Cal Am would "not violate" a state order limiting its pumping of the Carmel River, "so negotiations are currently underway to find a solution to restore the loss of pumping from the ASR-1 well." He added that Cal Am is "confident that a mutually beneficial solution will be reached," and that the issues related to the retention times "highlight" the need for a desalination plant for its Monterey Peninsula customers.

Bach Fest kicks off with free brass concert

A TWO-WEEK celebration of classical music that includes concerts, recitals, master classes, lectures and open rehearsals, the 85th Carmel Bach Festival kicks off Thursday with two concerts — one at Sunset Center and the another just steps away on the Sunset Terrace.

Since its early days, the festival has begun with a free brass concert — a tribute to the role brass instruments have played since antiquity in heralding the arrival of something important. This year's event, Tower Brass, is set to start at 6:50 p.m. on the Sunset Terrace.

"The musicians include two trumpets from the festival orchestra, all three trombone players, and percussion," said Sue Mudge, who directs the performance and plays trombone.

'Heroic and noble'

The ensemble's opening program includes Giroloma Fantini's Fanfares Prima & Seconda, Hans Leo Hassler's Alleluia from Sacri Concentus XXI, Rossen Balkanski's Dance, and Nicolai Rimsky-Korsakov's Procession of

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Ocean Avenue | Carmel-by-the-Sea | (831) 624-2403 Open Daily 9:30am - 5:30pm augustinaleathers.com for sex with a former girlfriend of Sampognaro's, he was a "distant and difficult" father who actively discouraged Sampognaro's efforts to get off drugs, and he took Sampognaro's unemployment benefits with promises to buy him a car but bought himself a boat instead.

During the trial, Sampognaro remained nonverbal. He did not communicate with his attorneys - chief public defender Thomas O'Keefe and deputy public defender Rachel Miller — and "frequently refused to speak at all in court, including at hearings before trial." O'Keefe was the lead attorney in the case, with Miller, who has less experience, presenting opening and closing statements and cross-examining minor witnesses.

But Miller was openly flirtatious in court and had an affair with the bailiff, which Higgins argued prejudiced her against Sampognaro. In being questioned about their relationship, both said it was brief, starting around the time of the trial

and ending after the verdict, and that they didn't discuss the proceedings at all while

O'Keefe testified he once reprimanded Miller for being overly casual with others in the courtroom when the trial was not in session, but no one other than Sampognaro's two aunts, who observed all of the proceedings, reported seeing inappropriate behavior.

"Both Sampognaros asserted the defendant hit himself when Miller allegedly flirted" with the bailiff, Hood wrote. "However, the defendant was known to frequently hit himself throughout the case, including before, during and after the trial."

Hood acknowledged the affair between Miller and the bailiff but found it didn't prejudice the lawyer, who successfully cross-examined witnesses to root out testimony in support of her client's case.

Napping?

Higgins' allegations that jurors slept during critical parts of the trial were also unsubstantiated, Hood found. The initial accusation that jurors had slept through some of the testimony, thereby depriving Sampognaro of his right to a fair trial, came after the verdict. An alternate juror "had 'a bit of a breakdown' as she disagreed with the verdict," Hood said, and that's when she reported two male jurors seemed to be sleeping at times, though she couldn't remember when.

None of the attorneys or jurors, nor the judge or bailiff, saw any members of the jury sleeping, Hood said in his ruling, and the Sampognaros who claimed jurors slept couldn't say which ones they were or when they allegedly napped.

Everyone who testified "admitted that they could not tell whether the jurors were, in fact, asleep," he said.

Hood also noted the jury was given frequent breaks to stand up and stretch.

Finally, the fact that another resident of the barn where Sampognaro was living at the time of the shooting was arrested a year-and-a-half later with a gun similar to what Sampognaro reportedly used was hardly enough new evidence to require a retrial, according to Hood.

"The defense has not made any effort to provide further follow-up on this weapon or link this weapon to the crime at issue," he wrote, and there's no evidence that the man who possessed it was "observed as the killer, had a motive, possessed the gun prior to the murder, or used it on the day of the murder."

No judgment should be set aside, or new trial ordered, "unless, after an examination of the entire cause, including the evidence, the court shall be of the opinion that the error complained of has resulted in a miscarriage of justice," Hood wrote, quoting the California Constitution. "In other words, error in a criminal case is harmless unless the defendant can demonstrate a reasonable probability of a more favorable outcome.'

"Here, there was strong, pervasive and credible evidence of motive, planning, threats to kill, attempt to enlist a coparticipant, opportunity, pursuit of a weapon, percipient eyewitness identification, flight, bloody matching shoe prints, and victim's blood on defendant, with little in the way of defense rebuttal," he wrote. "Against this overwhelming evidence, defendant has failed to show any deficient performance by the attorneys, much less performance so deficient it would warrant a new trial."

In short, Higgins "failed to undermine confidence in the outcome of the trial," so Hood denied her motion. "Defendant has not established any prejudice based on any of its individual assertions, and the cumulative effect is no greater."

Sampognaro is now set to be sentenced July 28. He remains in Monterey County Jail without bail.



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BARON

Baron has been a devoted and active member of the Carmel Climate Committee he has co-chaired with councilwoman Carrie Theis — who is not running for reelection — for the past couple of years. With the help of experts, community members and city staff, the committee produced "a thorough report of the challenges that Carmel faces in the new climate era, and the changes that we can make as a community to do our part to slow the production of greenhouse gases," he said.

At the outset of the pandemic, when residents were told to stay in their homes and businesses shut down, Baron and former city councilwoman Jan Reimers formed Carmel Neighbors to provide help to residents who needed assistance, whether it be getting food delivered, contacting their doctors or paying the bills.

"And through it all, and in spite of our occasional differences, the Carmel City Council managed to avoid the ill-tempered squabbling that pervaded so many other local councils during that stressful period," Baron said of the pandemic era that included layoffs, drastic budget cuts and other significant changes.

Not to say council members didn't have their differences of opinion. During the prolonged discussion of restaurants' temporary parklets, for example, Baron regularly sided with those who wanted to get rid of them. And when a hotelier applied for tax breaks for his historic buildings, Baron objected due to concerns over how the losses in property tax revenues would affect the various government agencies, including Carmel Unified School District.

But he has also gone along with the majority on various topics after airing concerns that suggested he might vote otherwise. When the council a year ago created a pension trust to help raise money to pay down looming public retirement debt, he worried it would be too risky and said he'd rather give more money to the state retirement system, instead, but he voted with his colleagues to support the fund.

Filing starts July 18

Baron said in his campaign announcement that this year's budget surplus will help the city get back on track with many delayed capital projects, including "the much-needed renovation of the police station, the reconstruction of Ocean Avenue between downtown and the beach (including some much-needed bicycle and pedestrian safety measures)," and getting an old tank out of Mission Trail park.

"One of my favorite projects, the Design Traditions 1.5 effort, an update of the city's zoning code and design guidelines that is sorely needed to protect the Carmel character of both the residential areas and the commercial center of town," is also on the list, he said.

Much work lies ahead, Baron said, so he'd like another four years at the dais.

The filing period for candidates interested in vying for the two four-year city council terms or the mayor's two-year term opens July 18 and closes Aug. 17. (If all the incumbents were running, it would close Aug. 12, but Theis will not re-up)

Mayor Dave Potter has already announced his plans to seek reelection, and resident Alissandra Dramov has said she plans to run for city council.

To qualify for the ballot, a candidate must turn in a petition signed by at least 20 but no more than 30 registered voters. According to a recent report, the city has 2.575 voters.

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

provide the decision to the company.

"Verizon's brief focuses on one argument: that the city incorrectly argues that the 'TCA allows [the city] to "issue" its written denial in secret and then conceal it from the applicant for months," he wrote. "In doing so, Verizon relies on its interpretation that the TCA requires 'both the written denial and the reasons be communicated to the applicant' to constitute a final action."

But, he said, the Supreme Court has noted the act contains "no verb at all to describe the conveying of information from a locality to an applicant," and therefore, no burden of notification exists. The city posted the resolution denying Verizon's application and video on its website, and the documents were available to anyone who filed a Public Records Act request, Cousins said.

Verizon argued the denial resolution was hidden from the company because it was stored on the city's internal server and wasn't sent to any company representatives, Cousins noted. "The court does not find that these facts prevented Verizon from accessing the denial resolution," he wrote. "Although the denial resolution was stored on an internal server, the public, including Verizon, was able to access it though a Public Records Act request," which no one from Verizon ever made.

Dismissed with prejudice

"Verizon further claims that the city secretly issued and concealed the denial resolution as evidenced by an email exchange where a Verizon representative requested the resolution and the city 'promised' to provide it when it was available but never did," he continued. "Verizon does not cite any authority to support its argument that the city's actions rose to the level of an improper concealment."

In fact, the company's representatives failed to follow up on the status of the resolution, and the email exchange actually proves the company knew about the document.

"Even viewing the evidence in the light most favorable to Verizon, there is no genuine dispute that Verizon had timely notice of the city's decision on its Carmelo application," Cousins wrote before granting summary judgment in favor of the city.

"Verizon's complaint only asserts two claims against the city, and both rely on a finding that Verizon did not have timely notice of the city's final action," he said. "Thus, because the court determines that Verizon did have timely notice of the city's final action, there are no remaining claims in the complaint."

He dismissed the lawsuit with prejudice, meaning it cannot be refiled.

Meanwhile, officials and lawyers are still working on updating the city's telecommunications ordinances to ensure they comply with federal and state law. The group of citizens that successfully fought against the Carmelo Street tower is involved, as well.

a whole new, beach-inspired design with more variation among the building styles, a courtyard visible from the street, and other changes. But the planning commission didn't like that proposal, either.

The new drawings show four separate buildings, rather than structures with shared walls, with two apartments on the ground floor adjacent to retail space. The second floor contains nine more units ranging from 664 square feet to 1,385 square feet, and a mezzanine level with upstairs portions of a few of those liv-

ing spaces. Each building would be differentiated by architectural style and materials, with brick, cement plaster, wood siding and stone.

"Working in partnership with Wald, Ruhnke & Dost, we are confident that the redesigned plans appropriately respond to the feedback received from the planning commission in the two previous meetings," Mitchell told The Pine Cone.

Lessons learned

Mitchell said that of the dozens of comments gathered over the past few months, the vast majority supported the Tudor/ Mediterranean-style plans, with 135 people saying they preferred that iteration.

Many also commented on the process and what Pastor and his team have endured.

"The Pit has been a blight on Carmel for what seems like eternity. We are fortunate that someone was willing to salvage this disaster," commented one. "If the city continues to allow this process to run the developer around in circles, we will be looking at the Pit for another eternity.'

Mitchell said residents

"overwhelmingly supportive of our efforts to rid the town of the unsightly hole in the ground and that we want to respect the architectural heritage of the town.

"They are also very much in favor of the fact we only want to build a high-quality building designed in a way so as to appear part of Carmel already, not to look

'We respectfully disagree'

Many responders said they did not want to see a contemporary design like the one approved by the planning commission for Leidig and Draper several years ago.

'We are not so uninformed as to believe that there are not people within the com-

> munity who would like to see more modarchitecture," Mitchell said. "However, we simply and respectfully disagree with this concept. We chose to invest in Carmel because we love it, and we would not want to taint its unique historic architectural heritage by building modern architecture."

Mitchell explained that Pastor

purchased the property because he disliked "having the hole in the ground," and he observed that the previously approved plans called for a "much more imposing and larger" complex than any of the variations Pastor has proposed.

Before the planning commission considers the latest plans, Mitchell said, the team would like to receive feedback from city officials and the community.

"Our goal is to have a very smooth next planning meeting," he said. "Therefore, where possible, we would like to address ahead of time any concerns or questions people might have."

WHEN A well-struck volleyball collides with a gym floor, a distinctive kind of thunder echoes off the walls. That's music to the ears of the girls who play for Sand City Volleyball Club, a handpicked travel team stacked with some of the best young players in Monterey County.

But the jaw-dropping ambience they experienced June 30 in Indianapolis, when they walked into the Indiana

Convention Center for the 2022 USA Volleyball Girls Junior Nationals, was on a much different level.

"It was a giant place, bigger than anywhere we've ever played before, and we walked in and saw hundreds of players on the floor, and volleyballs flying everywhere," said Addy Cremers, who plays the right-side hitter position for the Sand City 15 squad (all 15-year-olds) — the first team in the club's three-year history to qualify for nationals. "That part felt a little bit intimidating, because we suddenly realized how big the tournament actually was."

Fifteen thousand players, ages 11-17, on 870 teams from all over the U.S., played in 38 separate divisions on 81 courts in a tournament that continued through July 4.

"Just trying to find our court in that giant convention center on the first night was something I'll probably always remember. It was crazy," said Grace von Schack, a libero

Exceeding expectations

Sand City — seeded 40th among 48 teams in the Freedom Division for 15-year-olds, didn't expect to bring home a trophy, but they exceeded expectations, winning eight of 23 games in their nine matches to tie for 35th place in their division.

"I felt like the team played really well against competition that was just a little bit higher than the level we usually play," said Kit Moore, who shared head coaching duties this season with Jake Powell. "We've actually played better teams than we faced in Indianapolis, but our competition there was consistently solid. There weren't any easy matches."

Moore co-founded Sand City Volleyball with David Crabbe, Cary Tamura and Davis Onitsuko in 2019, when several players from this year's national team were 12-year-old teammates.

The pandemic deprived the club of its 2021 season, but the possibility of a successful 2022 season was foreseeable.

"I knew we had the potential to have this kind of season, and that's also something our coaches had been telling us. We've all worked hard and all of us wanted to accomplish great things," said Cindy Moreau, a setter credited with 215 assists. "Personally, I never really dreamed that we'd end up going to a huge national tournament, where college recruiters were everywhere. I never thought it would be as big as this."

Ranked 13th in NorCal

Sand City finished its regular season with a 22-11 record, ranked No. 13 out of 72 teams in Northern California's Power League — 11 spots higher than its preseason ranking. They were one of five NorCal teams selected to go to Indianapolis, and were surprised to be chosen.

We were at a practice, getting ready for a tournament in Utah, when we heard the news. Cary Tamura called all of us over to the end line, and I totally thought the coaches

were going to make us run," Moreau remembered with a laugh.

"When they told us we were going to Indianapolis, I was really confused — I don't think any of us understood what they were saying," she said.

Aleasha Kalinski, a middle blocker, wasn't at practice that day - she was home in Marina, preparing for a final exam at Santa Catalina.

"My phone rang while I was studying, and then I heard Grace screaming, 'We got the bid! We're going to nationals!"" she said. "I was completely shocked. I definitely wasn't expecting that."

For Kalinski, the news was bittersweet. Just days before, her family had booked a three-week vacation in Greece that conflicted with the tournament dates.

That was very much a bummer for me, but I was still very excited for my teammates," she said. "And I felt proud that I was able to help the team qualify."

Players from six schools


Eight of Sand City's 12 players reside in Salinas, and five will be sophomores this fall at Salinas High: Cremers and Indira Aguilar play right-side hitter, Cadee Guzman (383 assists, 54 aces) is a setter, Dylan Domingos (181 digs for Sand City) plays libero, and Natalie Mendoza (20 blocks) is a middle

Other Salinas kids are right-side hitter Elizabeth McCuistion, who made Monte Vista Christian's varsity squad last year as a freshman, outside hitter/defensive specialist Maya Giannini (237 kills, 265 digs), who attends Notre Dame, and outside hitter Ava Edwards (114 kills), one of three Sand City players who played on Stevenson's varsity as ninth-graders.

Edwards led Stevenson with 174 kills and was No. 2 with 128 digs last year. Von Schack, who lives in Carmel, amassed 321 assists last fall as the Pirates' starting setter, and Monterey resident Gina Da Silva ranked No. 1 on Stevenson's team with 21 blocks, and topped Sand City with 47

for Santa Catalina a year ago. Moreau, a setter and rightside hitter, is the only Sand City player at Carmel High, where she figures to contend for a starting spot this fall.

The social component of Sand City's club season was a major part of the attraction for the players, who developed strong bonds.

"Going to practice wasn't all about the volleyball for me — it was about seeing my friends," Moreau said. "I'm the only player on our team who goes to Carmel High, so I probably never would have gotten to know most of these girls."

Invaluable experience

Playing offseason volleyball for a club team provides players with on-court experience against high-tier competition, along with additional coaching, all of which typically gives them a significant advantage when they reach the high school level.

"There wasn't a single kid on the varsity team at Salinas High last year who didn't play club volleyball," Moore noted.

Moore has been head coach of Monterey Peninsula College's women's volleyball team since 2001. Powell, his co-coach, assisted Moore with the MPC women's squad from 2014-2017, was a JV and assistant varsity coach at Palma, and began coaching club volleyball in 2012, when he was an NCAA Division III standout at Newbury College (Brookline, Mass.), where he was team captain. And assistant coach Isabella Ultsch, added for the second

half of the 2022 season, played outside hitter as a junior last year at CSU Monterey Bay.

"Playing club volley-ball helps so much. In school, you have a limited amount of time, and your coaches can't put as much focus on it. It's more like a fun thing," Gremers said. "The level of coaching in club volleyball seems a lot different."

The rub, of course, is that club volleyball is expensive — unaffordable for many families — an issue the Sand City club, a 501(c)(3) nonprofit, alleviates by offering financial assistance to families that need it.

"We give scholarships to a lot of our players — we're always trying to provide for athletes who can't afford to pay," said Moore.

The vast majority of athletes who go on to play collegiate volleyball are veterans of club volleyball.

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




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Editorial

An editorial that wrote itself

WE HAVE long decried the arbitrariness and capriciousness inherent in the permit process, not only here in Carmel, but in many towns and cities across the state. Our recommendations for fixing it have always been the same: Make the laws regulating development as specific as possible, and whenever a permit issue is a close call, give the benefit of the doubt to the applicant.

But after reading through the 100-plus public comments in response to the various plans submitted for development of The Pit, we'd like to add a third principle: Listen to the people. Planning commissioners and their counterparts on other boards and commissions are to be commended for volunteering for such demanding jobs, but their enthusiasm can be mistaken for expertise. Likewise the regulars who make public comments at hearings. Too often, they're just speaking because they like the sound of their own voices. Journalism 101 is that you can get a better idea of public opinion by calling the first 20 people in the phone book than by writing down what's said during public hearings. In other words, the less someone seeks to be involved in the political process, the more likely their opinion is representative of what the man or woman in the street actually wants.

Here are some examples of what the people of the Carmel area had to say (via email in response to Patrice Pastor's experiences) about the planning process that has seen a modern building propose by Bob Leidig and Michael Draper approved for The Pit, but a Tudor/Mediterranean plan and Cape-Cod style plan submitted by Pastor rejected:

"Let Mr. Pastor build something, please. We just don't understand why Carmel is holding this up."

"My apologies to Mr. Pastor for the rude welcome to Carmel-by-the-Sea." "I'm really sorry the planning commission is making your project approval so difficult. I'm just happy you haven't given up."

"It is my sincere hope you won't lose patience. Everyone should be grateful for what you are doing to upgrade the crumbling parts of town."

"We have long observed the opinionated and insulting behavior of the planning commissioners and are frankly embarrassed by their unprofessional comments."

"I find the planning commission rejection of the proposed Tudor and Mediterranean design extremely baffling."

"The planning commission should be ashamed for approving the lifeless

"We are sorry that the city has been so unreasonable."

"It is way past time to move forward with the development of the eyesore known as The Pit."

"Hopefully the architect wannabees on the planning commission will get off their butts and approve the design."

"I am distressed at the decisions of the planning commission."

"If the city continues to run the developer around in circles, we will be looking at The Pit for another eternity."

"Those in charge should be ashamed of the way they have imperiously discarded and dissected your company's efforts."

"I am quite familiar with the city's planning process, including the need to satisfy the desires of an unpredictable planning commission and vocal special interests."

"It is such a shame that your effort to adhere to the standards and process of the planning commission resulted only in delay and added expense to your development efforts."


"I am embarrassed at the run-around your project has been subjected to."

"I don't think there is any legitimate reason why the planning commission should have rejected your design."

We repeat our recommendation that the planning process be reformed to require applicants to adhere only to objective standards, that genuine public opinion be sought and honored, and that any subjective considerations be decided, whenever possible, in favor of the applicant.

'Highly insensitive' Dear Editor.

I believe your article last week, "Foul scent leads sheriff to lonely death," was highly insensitive, disrespectful, sensational and, while technically correct, caused further emotional trauma to the family left to clean up after the shock of notification.

The sheriff/coroner had to use their database, as our sister intentionally left no contacts with Pacific Meadows. A blended family of Carmel natives, my brother and I were asked by the busy coroner to remove Marilyn's effects to allow the apartment to be left to the next client on the many-yearslong waiting list.

As we awaited the special pathologist's autopsy results we did so, which was a horrific task. The room was left with all the windows closed.

Marilyn purposely left no instructions, and after our mother died, changed her name and told no one of her whereabouts. Some people choose solitude and separateness, yet are not "lonely." Marilyn would be among the first to say karma is one's own making.

I am not sure what the point of the article was. There is a lack of low cost housing in this "affluent community," to be sure. To say, "not everyone is affluent," is a judgment, and certainly not dignified. Living on Social Security is not the same as being indigent. A big challenge to be sure.

As Marilyn was an artist, with a B.A. in art, it occurs to me to quote the motto of the Youth Arts Collective in Monterey. "Do Art. Be Kind."

Also, if someone seems to need a welfare check, by all means call someone.

I am also very concerned about the liability on these private roads if someone should get hurt or killed while

The day Commodore Sloat landed at the Customs House

I RECENTLY came across an August 1910 article in a newsletter for the old Hotel Del Monte about a visit to Monterey by John Spencer, the last man living, the newsletter said, who had been a part of Commodore John Drake Sloat's crew that landed at Monterey on July 7, 1846, to claim California for the United States. Spencer's account sent me inquiring into the veracity of his story.

According to the article, the adven-

ture-seeking Spencer, who was born in

Connecticut about 1820, made his way to

Honolulu as a young man after signing on

to a ship in New England. Upon landing

in Hawaii, he decided to give paradise a

try, but by 1845, he'd had enough, so when

Sloat brought the USS Savannah into

Honolulu harbor, Spencer signed up as

first-class seaman to work his way back to

New England. That was on Sept. 17, 1845.

He was in his mid-20s, and the facts seem

History Beat

In late February 1846, a lieutenant with verbal dispatches for American officials in California arrived at Mazatlán. Sloat put him on the USS Cyane, which delivered him with his messages to Monterey on April 17, 1846. The Cyane rejoined the Savannah in Mazatlán on April 30. Tailwinds and favorable currents made the trip south faster than going north.

On May 1, 1846, U.S. Fleet Surgeon William Maxwell Wood headed overland

with dispatches for Washington. Accompanying him was the U.S. Consul in Mazatlán, John Parrott. On reaching Guadalajara on May 6, they overheard Mexica military officers

talking about the capture of U.S. troops — which meant war — and found a newspaper account that verified the reports from April 24-25.

Racing the Brits

Now the challenge was getting the news to Sloat before the British admiral, Seymour, learned of it. Woods and Parrott continued onto Mexico City before dispatching a detailed report to Sloat in mid-May. In the meantime, Polk had received word from Taylor that hostilities had commenced, and on May 11 asked Congress for a formal declaration of war. Congress granted it on May 13, 1846.

Upon the first report from Woods, Sloat had sent three ships — Cyane, Levant and Portsmouth — to California to watch the ports and await orders. Sloat received Wood's second report on June 7. After taking on extra supplies, Sloat and his crew set sail on June 8. They were at full sail, and according to Spencer, "Sloat was a devil for carrying all the sail the ship had."

Seymour had taken the Collingwood south to San Blas to be nearer Mexico City. Upon the departure of Sloat, a British ship set off to alert Seymour. But Sloat had both a good lead and a faster ship. Of course, first class seaman Spencer knew none of

Dotson's two books about the writer — "Love For Ever Meridian: Finding Dylan Thomas in the 21st Century" (published in 2012), and the new one, "Singing in My Chains: Hearing Dylan Thomas at the

Birth of an Age" — were encouraged by Thomas' daughter, poet Aeronwy Thomas, whom Dotson met when she visited Monterey on a speaking tour in 2008.

"There are plenty of Dylan Thomas and there

biographies of Dylan Thomas and there also is plenty of criticism. These books are neither of those things," he said.

"Aeronwy (who died in 2009) wanted her father to be better understood — she felt his life and accomplishments had been mischaracterized, particularly in America — and she was on a quest to offer other perspectives. I also felt that, and feel that, and I'm working to complete that task."

Southern origins

Dotson's origins were in Kingsport, Tenn., a town in the Southern Appalachians developed shortly after the Revolutionary War, settled by colonial pioneers, the site of a famous Civil War battle, and important for its Cherokee history.

Dotson traces his earliest artistic inspirations to a backyard sandbox built by his father, a metal machinist for 45 years at the town's Eastman-Kodak plant.

Wonders of wet sand

"I was safe and happy there, exploring all of the things that can be done with wet


sand. That was the start of it," he said. "I also see continuity between my interest in making shapes out of materials, my father's interest in metals and chemicals, and even back to my great-grandfather, who had a blacksmith shop."

As a teen, Dotson worked at a local radio station and developed an interest in communications, which became his degree path at Northwestern University, where he also became enamored with philosophy, psychology, religious studies, and writing.

Teaching at Catalina

Dotson came to Carmel in 1974, pursuing an opportunity to take over management of Pilgrim's Way Community Bookstore. That plan never came to fruition, but three years later he was hired to teach at Santa Catalina School in

the above, or why they were racing north. The Savannah reached Point Pinos, and on July 7, Sloat sent one of his officers, Captain William Mervin, ashore to demand surrender from the Mexican commander Mariano Silva. Silva replied he did not have that authority, nevertheless there were no soldiers in town and he was leaving.

At 9:50 a.m. on July 7, 1846, more than 220 marines and sailors under Mervin's command went ashore. Spencer was among them. A little after 10 a.m., Sloat's proclamation was read in English and Spanish, and a midshipman raised the 27-star American flag on the pole at the Customs House.

Sloat's proclamation sought peace: "I declare to the inhabitants of California, that, although in arms with a powerful force, I do not come as an enemy to California, but, on the contrary, I come as their best friend, as henceforward, California

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JULY EVENTS

will be a portion of the United States, and its peaceable inhabitants will enjoy the same rights and privileges as any other portion of that nation.'

Sloat also issued very specific general orders to his men, making it clear that "It is not only our duty to take California, but to preserve it afterwards, as part of the United States. It is of first importance to cultivate the good opinion of the inhabitants [and] I scarcely consider it necessary for me to caution American seamen and marines against the detestable crime of plundering and maltreating unoffending inhabitants.

A little late

For the most part the men, including Spencer, stayed ashore and initially bunked in the military quarters known as El Cuartel, that once stood near what is called today The Stevenson House. By July 14, 1846, Sloat was able to report to his men there was a general peace in Alta California, with the American flag safely aloft in Monterey, Yerba Buena [San Francisco], Sutter's Fort on the Sacramento River,

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Sausalito, Sonoma and Bodega. On July 16, San Jose was added to the

July 16 was also the day the Collingwood finally made it to Monterey. Upon seeing the American flag over the Customs House, Seymour "slapped his thigh, stamped his foot and passionately exclaimed in disappointment, 'Then, by God, I am too late!"

Saturday, July 9, from noon to 3:30 p.m., the Sloat Landing and flag raising will be commemorated near the Customs House, as it has been nearly every year

Rulli said the Marine Mammal Center often relocates rehabilitated marine mammals to Monterey and San Luis Obispo counties due to their optimum sea lion habitats, and has satellite offices in Moss Landing and Morro Bay so its staff can quickly respond to animals in need.

Jung, 15 years as a writer, producer and director for the Carmel Bay Players, and 11 years in those same capacities with the Seventh Quarry Drama Group in Swansea, Wales, Dylan Thomas' home. Two short plays, co-authored by Dotson and Lisa Maroski, were staged by Seventh Quarry at Swansea's Dylan Thomas Theatre in 2012.

"I've always felt very grateful for any involvement with theater," said Dotson, whose play, "Without Why," was directed by Conrad Selvig at the Carl Cherry Center in 2007. "I've always had tremendous respect for theater people — the good-faith efforts of writers, performers and artists in all media. I'm grateful that my life has allowed me to connect with so many great souls, from Big Sur to



The world is crazy enough and now we are losing our sense of home. We are being invaded with the business of shortterm rentals. These rentals are no different than running a small hotel in a neighborhood designed for families. The situation of short-term rentals where I live has been an accident waiting to happen. Army brings life-saving transfusions to Hunter Liggett

FOR THE first time in California, transfusions of whole blood can be administered to patients who are far from hospitals, thanks to a new program that's up and running at Fort Hunter Liggett, a U.S. Army base in southern Monterey County.

Due to improved techniques, whole blood can now be warmed, cooled and stored in what are called "pre-hospital settings." Previously, whole blood — which is made up of red blood cells, white blood cells and platelets, all of which are suspended in a liquid called plasma — was transfused only at some hospitals. But the Army wanted to be able to transfuse whole blood in remote settings, where patient smay not be able to survive long enough to reach a hospital.

"The Army chose Fort Hunter Liggett because it's so remote," base spokesperson Amy Phillips told The Pine Cone. "It takes so long to fly patents to hospitals, and seconds make a difference."

The program also marks the first time the Army has

transfused whole blood in a remote setting.

"Having this system and the ability to provide whole blood to injured soldiers and civilians on Fort Hunter Liggett is a life changer," said Devon Haggie, a fire captain and the coordinator of Fort Hunter Liggett's emergency medical service.

Far from a hospital

After learning how whole blood could be transfused remotely and in pre-hospital settings, Haggie travelled to Texas last year and met with officials from the San Antonio Fire Department who pioneered the capability. While San Antonio has two trauma centers, officials recognized that an ambulance can't always reach them fast enough. Dr. C.J. Winckler of the University of Texas Health Science Center said the average ambulance ride is 28.8 minutes.

"Research shows if a patient is going to die from a gunshot wound to the chest or blunt injury, they are going to die in less than 30 minutes," Winckler said. "According to these numbers, the critically ill San Antonian suffering from a blunt or penetrating injury would die as we were transporting them to the ER or as we were wheeling them through the hospital doors."

Convinced by what he saw and learned in Texas, Haggie has led efforts at Fort Hunter Liggett to bring the program to the local military base.

"They told me stories of people being completely unresponsive and most likely going to die," Haggie reported. "And with one unit of whole blood administered, the patients are actually sitting up and talking while being wheeled into the trauma center. That alone is extremely eye-opening to me, and being so remote was one of the reasons I pursued this capability for the installation."

Dr. Nicholas Studer, a physician-scientist at the U.S. Army Institute of Surgical Research in San Antonio, said he was impressed with Haggie's determination to bring the technology to the Monterey County installation. "Mr. Haggie almost single-handedly enabled this capability for Fort Hunter Liggett," he said.

The director of the U.S. Army's emergency medical service, Dean Ross called Fort Hunter Liggett "the beta site" for developing ways to transfuse whole blood far from a hospital, and "our first opportunity to field a program that could have very substantive benefits to those that are injured."

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

Building a real estate career on a fascinating foundation

FOR 32 years, Pine Cone readers knew Paul Brocchini of Carmel Realty as the expert who provided local real estate market reports every quarter in the Pine Cone's "House Talk" column. With a comprehensive array of simple-to-read charts and lively narrative, he told everyone how real estate was doing, right in their own zip codes.

Earlier this year, Brocchini decided to move on from his writing career, but that doesn't mean that he retired. In fact, when The Pine Cone asked if Brocchini if he was going to give up the real estate game anytime soon, he said, "I refuse to quit."

Brocchini's been in the business since 1986, riding its highs and lows like a surfer navigating the waves. And, like many real estate agents, he came to it with skills acquired from other kinds of work.

Colombia, Vietnam

Brocchini was born in Oakland, the second child and only son of blue-collar parents. After high school, he went to college at Berkeley, where he met his first wife, Eleanor, better known as Nellie, who became his original partner in the "House Talk" column. His choice of school was almost purely economic, he said. "It was what we could afford. I got in and my first semester cost \$54."

After earning a bachelor's degree in Hispanic American studies (he also has a master's in Latin American history), Brocchini and his wife taught for a time, but he really wanted to work in the U.S. State Department's foreign service. When he was offered a government job at the U.S. Information Agency — perhaps best known for its Voice of America broadcasts — he and his wife moved to Washington, D.C.

He was posted to Colombia and served in Bogota and Cartagena for three years before being transferred to Sao Paolo, Brazil, but by the mid-1960s, Brocchini said about 70 percent of USIA officers worldwide were in Vietnam. He was sent to New York for training to join them but

decided to leave for the private sector. During the briefings he received, he said, "We got the real scoop," about what was happening in Southeast Asia, "and it was pretty grim."

During eight years in public relations in New York, he traveled to Mexico, nearly every country in Central America, Colombia, Venezuela, Ecuador, Peru, Bolivia, Chile, Argentina and Brazil.

Near the end of that time, he worked out a partnership in Rio de Janeiro, "to establish a mail order company that would write the history of Brazil in gold and silver through the creation of art medals, sort of a Franklin Mint of Brazil," referring to the popular company that sold all sorts

Welcome to Lloyd's, where shoes are all in the family

THE FIRST thing Tess Calhoon thinks about when getting dressed for the day is her shoes. She realizes she probably should consider the weather. Carmel Valley's warm sun, however, can make anyone forget about downtown fog or even rain. That calls for more suitable footwear. Fortunately, finding another pair isn't difficult.

As the co-owner, manager and buyer for Lloyd's Shoes in Carmel, Calhoon has plenty of options, which is probably why she has some 70 pairs of shoes lining her

Established by Lloyd Firstman in 1975 as a trio of shops in Pacific Grove, Monterey and Carmel, Lloyd's Shoes opened at its present location on Ocean Avenue in 1979. Calhoon's father, Jeff Greenberg, worked for Firstman in the Pacific Grove store — an emporium of shoes, clothing and home goods — in 1976.

Said Greenberg, "After a few months, I went to Lloyd and said, 'You're selling Frye boots and Clarks and Adidas, and I wear them. I think I can do a better job

with the merchandise mix.' He gave me a chance and started mentoring me, taking me to shoe shows. His mentorship grew into management and ultimately, I bought the store.

Greenberg was at a trade show when he saw the Donald Pliner collection. The shoes would retail for \$130, and the boots, for \$300.

"We took a chance on these beautiful shoes," he said. "They were a huge success. This showed that if we had at the right product, the price was a secondary issue. The quality, look and fit of the product could carry the price."

Greenberg began to look for more specialty shoe shows and ways of differentiating Lloyd's from department stores by seeking designers who would help him develop an identity and niche in the market.

"Now we do business with companies that let us contribute to the characteristics of the shoes, by choosing things like material and color, which enables us to have

A full Peninsula resume that includes golf, produce and boating gear

THRESHER ROLLE is a seventhgeneration Northern Californian on his father's side of the family — Thresher is his paternal grandmother's maiden name. He was born in Stockton, a city he said was established by her family, which was involved in creating the company that supplied water to the community. He was 5 years old when he moved to the Monterey Peninsula, where more of his family had been anchored for three generations. Nearly 40 years later, he considers this area his hometown turf.

"When my grandparents went to Africa in 1984 to work with the World Wildlife Fund, we moved into their Pebble Beach home, where we lived until their return. Two years later, when I was 7, we moved to Pacific Grove, where I grew up," he

Other than his college years at Chico State, where he studied communications, Rolle lived on the Peninsula and makes his home in mid-Carmel Valley.

Rancho Cañada

Although Rolle works as a sales executive for Interwestern Sales, a company in Monterey which represents manufacturers in a broad range of marine products and equipment, there was a time when he thought he might have a career in golf. He was in third grade when his grandfather put a club in his hand out on the driving range at Rancho Cañada (which became Palo Corona Regional Park) in Carmel Valley. He went on to take lessons through the AT&T Pebble Beach Junior Golf Association.

In 2004, Rolle took a job maintaining

golf carts at The Santa Lucia Preserve, but soon developed a broader interest in the organization's operations. Within three years, he became a purchasing agent for the facility.

"Sourcing food, culinary equipment, and supplies for resident services, as well as equestrian and golf supplies for the property was a big undertaking," he said.

of collectibles. Although in retrospect, he said the idea was "crazy for a young guy with a wife and three kids," he noted that "the beaches of Leblon and Ipanema possessed an irresistible allure." The company was called Ouro Preto, after a well known colonial town in Brazil.

The Barnyard


Brocchini and his family moved to Brazil for five years. He said that the company's greatest success was with a collection of coins called Brasil Imperial, commemorating the nation's former monarchy. He contacted the former royal family's descendants and the resulting public relations campaign created a remarkable

response, including inspiring a poll asking Brazilians if they supported a return of the monarchy.

Early in Ouro Preto's history, Brocchini said he discovered the works of a furniture and pewter maker named John Somers, who had a shop in Rio de Janeiro. The company branched out from coin sales to carry his works. But by the late 1970s, he said, both product lines "were running out of steam." Their oldest children were approaching high school age, so he and Nellie decided to try opening a retail store in Carmel to sell Somers' creations.

The Pewter Shop opened in the Barnyard shopping center in 1978, and the couple ran it for 15 years. The business also

exclusive shoes," he explained.

Stepping in and stepping up

Although she grew up helping her father in the shoe business, Tess Calhoon didn't plan on making a career of it. After graduating from Carmel High, she went off to Cal Poly, where she discovered "special events" was actually a course of study. Armed with a degree in the field, she established a successful career in event management for the Four Seasons in Santa Barbara and Montecito's San Ysidro Ranch.

Yet she began to think about her father's shoe store. The idea of working with him, of spending time with him and sharing the experience of running a business together, lured her home.

"I propositioned my dad one day, suggesting I come home and work for him for one year to see if I liked it. He was super into the idea," she said. "So, I moved back. I started as a salesperson. I had to understand shoes and how to sell them before slowly transitioning into a managerial role. I learned everything from my dad, and I loved it."

After working with her father for three years, Calhoon joined him on a buying trip to Italy. They went to factories where she saw shoes being made by people — mostly women — who had been crafting them for generations. She met with vendors and learned what makes a shoe artisanal, lasting, special — worth the investment.

"This level of understanding is what we share with our customers," Calhoon said. "Some people don't have something in mind, so we make suggestions. Others have a specific request, so we bring them that plus a few others we think they should see. I often hear, 'I never thought I'd get something like this.' But they do."

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Some customers are looking for the right shoe for an event or to match a dress. Some are on vacation and come to the store as if it's a tourist destination. Others study the selections and collect them like art. Some just want to see what's new.

Calhoon noted, "Our business is not back to where we were prior to the pandemic, but we feel so lucky to be where we are, in one of the most beautiful places in the world, where people still want to visit. We have really loyal customers from this area and from all over the country who make this a destination during their trip. So we try to create a special experience for everyone."

As a complement to their shoe assortment, Greenberg and Calhoon believe the strongest draw into the store is their loyal, longtime staff. They know the products, the

community and their customers. Besides, they love shoes.

"Brandie Anderson has been with us for more than 25 years and Kristina Miller, 22 years," Greenberg said. "Brandie, Kristina and Tess all came to us as single women and are now married with young children. They've all been an important part of the growth and stability of Lloyd's."

Calhoon is grateful she made the decision to move home and have the dynamic daily experience with her dad, and Greenberg is proud of his daughter.

"Tess is not just in the business, she's running the business," he said. "I'm her helper now. At some points, I step back in to offer my support, like when she had her baby last year. But truly, it's her business now. She allows me to still have a say in it, but the final decision is hers."

"Yet despite demanding hours, I very much enjoyed the experience."

In 2008, the company underwent a management change and a year later, Rolle accepted an offer to work with Robinson Fresh in Ryan Ranch, part of a global produce company, where he was involved in brokerage and supply chain management.

Flexibility

"I learned a lot about patience in that job, plus I got a working knowledge of how large supply chains operate. When buying for a facility the size of the Preserve, you're buying 6,000 or 7,000 kinds of items. In a produce firm, you may buy only 120 items, but at a much larger scale."

Rolle's role and experience with Robinson Fresh led to his current position as a manufacturers' representative

with Interwestern Sales, also based in Ryan Ranch.

Among many things, Interwestern sells marine supplies a nice fit for someone who considers himself a lifelong boater. But it seems to be the challenge and variety that he

"As manufacturers' reps, we deal with product marketers, digital marketers and sales reps in the marine, RV, and heavy truck industries. In the marine industry, we represent everything from parts for jet skis to aircraft carriers,"


"But the diversity of our product lines means there will be crossover into other industries. A construction company might buy plumbing or electrical supplies," he continued, and noted that the same cleats a marina might use to tether a boat could be sold to another company as "cool door handles." Rolle sells to manufacturers, wholesalers, and retailers. As he put it, for the same boat, he could sell to, "the company building the boat, the company supplying

had a wholesale division that sold Somers' products to other retailers. By 1986, however, in an effort to bring in more income, he turned to real estate, which he laughingly called his "career of last resort."

"I didn't have any real estate connections," he recalled, but through hard work and a strategy of using classified ads to build a client base, Brocchini eventually got his first sale, on Balboa Avenue in Pacific Grove, near the beach.

From those early days, he's built his own network in the business. Although he's interested in architecture, he said he's learned to leave his own taste out of the equation.

"What I think is immaterial. I want to put people into situations they really like. Everyone's different. You get into people's personal lives — buying a house is a major transaction that can take place over months or even years. In 36 years, I've never had a case of buyer's remorse.'

Not as risky as farming

Brocchini has nothing but high praise for his fellow realtors. "One of the joys of doing business here is that there are many talented agents with rich backgrounds in other fields. The depth of experience is a huge plus, whether one is working with first-time buyers or high net-worth

individuals." He noted that Mark Ryan, his real estate partner and collaborator in the "House Talk" column in recent years, was a farmer in the San Joaquin Valley for eight years. "You think real estate is a risky profession? farming!" Trv



of the vehicle with a strong odor of alcoholic beverages emanating from his breath. The officer administered several field sobriety tests, and Cruz's performance on each test was unsatisfactory. After arrest, Cruz consented to a breath test, which revealed that his BAC was .22 percent — almost three times the legal limit. This case was prosecuted by the Monterey County District Attorney's Office specialized DUI prosecution unit. Funding for this program was provided by a grant from the California Office of Traffic Safety through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

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

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
