students and mother killed in head-on crash

m A}$ CARMEL Middle School sixth-grader and his twin sisters, who were in eighth grade, died in a head-on crash Sunday night alongside their mother when the Tesla she was driving crossed into the oncoming traffic lane on Highway 156 in Hollister and ran head-on into a semi-truck.

The California Highway Patrol is investigating the Aug. 14 crash — which occurred shortly after 8 p.m. near Fairview Road — after initially reporting that "for reasons unknown," 55-year-old Lisa Biakanja turned her 2014 Tesla left over the double-yellow lines and ran into the front of a 2015 Freightliner.

A photo taken at the scene shows the passenger compartment of the electric vehicle mangled and flattened almost to the ground, with only the rear end still recognizable. Biakanja and kids Lucy, Leigh and Ben died at the scene. The driver of the truck, a 39-year-old woman from Madera named Araceli Murillozar, was taken to a hospital in Hollister with minor injuries, including some abrasions.

THE FORMER Pacific Grove woman who was paralyzed when the SUV she was a passenger in collided with a tree in Skyline Forest is making a dance drama with Walt Disney Pictures about the life-changing event and what followed, Disney told The Pine Cone Tuesday.

On Feb. 21, 2010, Chelsie Hill, then 17 years old, was a passenger in a Toyota 4Runner driven by friend Aaron Corn, 18, who was drunk. Corn crashed the SUV into a pine tree at about 30 mph, and Hill, who was seated in the rear middle seat and wearing only a lap belt, received catastrophic spinal injuries that left her paralyzed from the waist down.

'Highly talented'

Now 30 years old, Hill is executive producing "Grace," which the Hollywood Reporter said last week will be based on a "highly talented, disabled dancer." Hill — the

School mourning three County to spend \$15M on Laguna Seca repairs

As MOST of the tens of thousands of people here for Car Week know, Laguna Seca is an iconic racetrack revered across the globe. But for years, its maintenance needs have been badly neglected, including an unsafe pedestrian bridge and a worn surface that's generated complaints from professional and amateur racers. Late last month, the Monterey County Board of Supervisors voted to change that, authorizing \$14,902,198 to replace the bridge over the start-finish line and repave the track.

Last week, county parks chief Bryan Flores told reporters the work will be "one of the largest capital improvement projects the county has undertaken."

In April, the board agreed to spend \$9,725,000 on the long-overdue work at the track, where the bridge has been deemed unsafe — its capacity is now limited to ensure there aren't too many people crossing it at the same time and the track hasn't been repaved in 15 years. Its degraded surface generated criticism in the media following last year's IndyCar races.



At their meeting late last month, supervisors learned the costs would be far higher, thanks to supply issues, fuel costs and inflation. "Granite Construction was the lowest

Commissioners OK axing San Carlos eucalyptus

AGREEING THAT they don't like eucalyptus trees, the forest and beach commission on Thursday agreed to let resident Carol Crandall work with the city to cut down four of them growing on public property on San Carlos north of Fourth, as long as she also pays to plant new trees

Crandall, representing tenants in the Pine Terrace condo complex uphill and east of the offending eucalyptus, said in her letter to city forester Sara Davis that in past years, the city had pruned the trees at the residents' request, in part to preserve their views. In 2018, storms caused many of their branches to break, obviating the need for cutting that year. Four years later, they have regrown and continue to branch out over the street, so she requested that they be



"The cat was so friendly, she would let people pick her up," Lewis said. "She was trained to be a service cat and could walk

Mrs. Jones frequently strolled through the Crossroads shopping center and would also make her way to the Barnyard. "She'd always come back," she said. "It wasn't a problem until Lisa had to live under a tarp."

The pain of missing


It was just a few days into that situation when Mrs. Jones disappeared, according to Lewis.

The gavel falls

Verdicts, pleas and sentencings announced by Monterey County District Attorney Jeannine Pacioni

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
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Aug. 2 — The Honorable Mark E. Hood sentenced Mark Sandoval, 30, of Salinas, to 15 years in prison after he pleaded no contest to a charge of attempted murder and admitted enhancements for personally inflicting great bodily injury and using a deadly weapon. He had also previously pleaded no contest to unlawful possession of a concealed firearm.

On Dec. 21, 2019, Salinas police officers responded to a report of a stabbing at 450 Lincoln Ave., in Salinas. When they arrived, they observed John Doe, a transient adult male, suffering from numerous serious stabs wounds to his chest and torso. The injuries were life-threatening, and he survived due to immediate medical intervention.

Police canvassed the area and found video surveillance that captured the entire incident. Video surveillance showed Doe sleeping in the corner of a parking garage at 450 Lincoln St. The video showed Sandoval staring at him as he slept. Sandoval then looked around the surrounding area for a few minutes and returned to Doe. He stood over him, as he slept for a minute, and then suddenly stabbed him repeatedly. After stabbing Doe over a dozen times, Sandoval fled the area.

Sandoval was found by police the fol-

lowing day. He was in possession of a stolen, loaded firearm. Police determined there was no substantive history between Sandoval and Doe that would explain a motive for the attack. When police interviewed Sandoval, he would not make any statements regarding what happened with Doe but rather made multiple incoherent statements about his family.

The case was primarily investigated by Detective Alejandro Rodriguez of the Salinas Police Department.

Aug. 3 — Raul Lucas, 21, pled guilty to two counts of first degree murder while personally using a firearm for the benefit of the Sureño criminal street gang.

On Dec. 26, 2021, Lucas, a Sureño criminal street gang member from the city of Salinas, drove to King City. Lucas and three other Sureño gang members met up and drove to Sussex Way where they proceeded to shoot and kill Carlos Lopez, 20, and his girlfriend Salina Godoy, 18, who was 10-12 weeks pregnant, as they tried to exit their vehicle. King City street cameras captured the license plate of a vehicle believed to be involved in

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County won't seek obstruction charge against deputy DA

■ Federal trial in San Jose ends in settlement

A CIVIL trial in federal court involving a Monterey County District Attorney's Office prosecutor who accused his employer of discrimination, harassment and retaliation suddenly ended Monday when he agreed to quit his job in exchange for the county's vow to not seek criminal charges against him.

In September 2020, former deputy district attorney Rick Storms filed a law-suit against Monterey County, alleging it "engaged in a pattern and practice of discriminating against its disabled employees, including Mr. Storms," and that supervisors made "disparaging, demeaning and

belittling remarks" about his disability.

That disability, Storms said, was diverticulitis, a gastrointestinal disease which required him since 2015 to periodically seek medical leave, reduction in stress, relief from "extraordinary working hours and related pressures," and other accommodations.

Agreement

Storms filed the lawsuit in Monterey County Superior Court, but the case was transferred to United States District Court, Northern District. The jury trial began in a San Jose courtroom Aug. 8. However, on Monday, the sixth day of the trial, after the eight-member jury had heard all the evidence in the case and was close to starting deliberations, attorneys for the county and Storms reached a settlement, which immediately put an end to the trial.

"The settlement agreement was put on the record in open court and contained these general terms," assistant Monterey County counsel Jan Holmes told The Pine Cone Tuesday. "Mr. Storms agreed to dismiss his lawsuit and resign from employment immediately, and the county agreed not to seek a prosecution of criminal charges against Mr. Storms. Each side agreed to waive costs."

Specifically, Holmes said that the county agreed not to pursue an obstruction of justice charge against Storms. However, because a federal judge had not yet unsealed the trial transcript, Holmes said she could not elaborate on why the county was considering the criminal charge against him.

Those who testified at the trial included Monterey County District Attorney Jeannine Pacioni and former District Attorney Dean Flippo.

Storms claimed in his suit that his medical ailment "substantially" limited his "major life activities, including thinking, toileting, sleeping, concentrating and working."

'Disrespected'

But Storms, who was seeking an undisclosed amount in monetary damages, claimed that some of his supervisors and Monterey County itself did not do enough to accommodate his disability and retaliated when he requested concessions.

For example, Storms said that he was initially reassigned to a DA's office department so he could "rest and recuperate by virtue of a less intense assignment and workload." But that went away

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Security guard saves pedestrians

A 91-YEAR-OLD man who lost control of his truck while turning onto San Carlos Street last Thursday morning ran into the side of Foxy Couture, breaking a window and scarring the wall, and hitting a pedestrian while security guard Kevin Armstead pushed two others out of the

way, possibly saving their lives, according to Carmel Police Sgt. Michael Bruno.

Officers were dispatched to the crash shortly before noon Aug. 11 and arrived to find a black truck up on the sidewalk and wedged against the building near the front door of the consignment shop.

The driver, who was not injured, claimed the accelerator had stuck as he turned right onto San Carlos from Fifth, and the vehicle "aggressively accelerated," without him being able to slow or stop, according to Bruno.

"The vehicle came to rest

wedged against the front pillar and against the building and tree," he said. "The driver was adamant he did not confuse the brake and accelerator pedal."

Four to run for council, Potter unopposed

FOR THE first time in his lengthy political career, Mayor Dave Potter is running unopposed for office, so he can take campaign season off this year. Meanwhile, four city council candidates have qualified for the Nov. 8 ballot, most recently Ashley Stoddard and Parker Logan.

A fifth who pulled papers, John Tobin, failed to get enough signatures of registered voters in Carmel to make it onto the list

On running unopposed, Potter said, "It could say nobody's interested in the job, or maybe they think I'm doing a good job. I hope it's the latter, not the former."

Logan, 49, owns Sade's bar on Lincoln south of Ocean and lives on Scenic Road. He is a Republican and first registered to vote in Monterey County in September 2018.

Who signed

Signers on his nomination papers, which he turned in Aug. 17 just in time for the Monterey County Elections department to certify them, include restaurateur Ken Spilfogel, who pulled papers to run but withdrew after Stoddard said she would, and Frank and Susan Cardinale.

Tracy Henderson, who tried

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\$1.2 million grant boosts efforts to lower wildfire threat to homes

CREATED TO manage 18,000 acres of open space in the Santa Lucia Preserve, the Santa Lucia Conservancy recently received \$1.2 million of taxpayer money from Cal Fire to maintain or improve 20 miles of fuel breaks in the local mountains — which they contend will help protect more than 5,000 local residents from the threat of wildfires.

According to Cal Fire, a fuel break is a strip of land where "vegetation has been modified so that a fire burning into it can be more readily controlled" — in other words, a whole lot of vegetation is removed through controlled burns and mechanical mastication.

Fuel breaks are typically 20 to 30-feet wide. Not only do they work in stopping fires, but they also make it easier for fire-fighters to conduct backfires to deprive an approaching wildfire of the fuel it needs to keep burning.

20 miles of fuel breaks

Called the Palo Corona-White Rock Fuel Break Access and Enhancement Project, the work would "maintain 12 miles of the Palo Corona-White Rock Fuel Break" and "reestablish 8.67 miles of existing fuel breaks on The Santa Lucia Preserve."

Fire officials say the project could protect as many as 5,281 people and 2,885 homes. "By maintaining, reestablishing, and providing direct and durable access to one of the most important fuel break systems on the Central Coast, this project directly benefits not only the Santa Lucia Preserve, but the surrounding communities of Carmel Highlands and Carmel Valley," said Jamison Watts, executive director of the Santa Lucia Conservancy.

An environmental scientist who works for Cal Fire, Ginger Haight said the fuel-breaks have previously stopped or slowed wildfires that threatened communities, proving their value by "saving human lives, homes, natural capital, agriculture, and critical infrastructure in the region."


According to the Conservancy, fuel-breaks in the Santa Lucia Preserve "became a stronghold for firefighting efforts" during the 2016 Soberanes Fire, and kept the blaze from reaching many homes. "Cal Fire was able to suppress the wildfire before it could reach communities in Carmel Valley," the group observed.

Individuals, agencies and groups were involved in getting the grant and committing to the work, including Sen. John Laird, the Santa Lucia Conservancy, the Santa Lucia Preserve, Cal Fire, the Monterey Peninsula Regional Park District and local residents.

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
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All Saints getting safer access, better parking and artificial grass

CONSTRUCTION IS underway at All Saints Day School in Carmel Valley, where a slew of infrastructure improvements are being done, including one that is expanding the school's parking lot to make it safer for motorists to access.

"We're creating safer ingress and egress," Head of School Scott Fujita told The Pine Cone. "It's a pretty dangerous blind left turn on Carmel Valley Road. Of all the things that keep me up at night, this is one of them — I've wanted to get this done for a long time.'

Besides improving access to the parking lot, the project will also expand the size of it by about 30 percent. A portion of the lot that was unpaved is getting asphalt "because unpaved wasn't sustainable over the long haul."

The work will not only add parking spaces, but prevent backups of cars on Carmel Valley Road, a scenario that "isn't safe for anybody," Fujita suggested.

To make it possible for the school to stop using its outdated septic system, construction will include putting in pipes that

will soon be hooked up to sewer lines that the Carmel Area Waste Water District is extending eastward into Carmel Valley.

"Once the CAWD line makes it out our way, we can tie into it," Fujita explained. "The timing was perfect — to be able to get off our old septic system is another exciting development."

New turf means water savings

The upgrades extend to the school's athletic fields, where artificial turf will be installed. The measure will save a tremendous amount of water at a time and place where every drop counts. "It will cut our water use almost in half," Fujita estimated.

Plans also call for creating some more "outdoor shaded student spaces," in part because such spaces proved their worth during the pandemic.

Fujita said the project was "planned very holistically," and he's thrilled to see its details take shape. "I've been dreaming about doing this," he said.

The school official wouldn't say how much all the work will cost, but he noted that all of it is coming from private

Hiker rescued from Big Sur peak

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m A}$ HIKER with an injured leg was airlifted Tuesday from the Mount Manuel Trail in Big Sur. A California Highway Patrol helicopter crew located the man about three miles from the trailhead at Pfeiffer Big Sur State Park.

The hiker had made it about halfway up the 5-mile trail to the summit before suffering some kind of mishap, which made it impossible for him to stand up.

As the helicopter hovered near the

victim, a rescue technician from Big Sur Fire was hoisted down to the trail, "where he packaged the patient for transport."

A video of the rescue shows an injured man with a brace stabilizing his entire left

The helicopter delivered the hiker to Post Ranch Inn, which has a landing zone, and where a team of medics awaited.

Along with Big Sur Fire, the California Highway Patrol and the Monterey County Sheriff's Office Search and Rescue team responded to the incident.



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Summer trip to the 'other' Georgia illuminates a country at a crossroads

m V ISITING A place few of us know much about, Magnus Toren, executive director of Big Sur's Henry Miller Library, spent July in Georgia — not the state famous for its peaches, but the country that's notable for giving us the former Soviet dictator, Joseph Stalin.

Along the way, Toren skirted a war zone, saw breathtaking landscapes, was unwittingly used as a prop in a tourism commercial, met Georgia's prime minister, made friends with a pack of dogs guarding a monastery, traveled along one of the world's most dangerous roads, saw hordes of Russia tourists heading for the beach, visited Stalin's birthplace, drank wine and sang songs with nuns, attended a baptism in a famous cathedral and learned folk dancing from a group of Georgian teenagers.

But perhaps the most interesting thing Toren encountered in Georgia were the sentiments of many people he spoke with - Georgian and Russian — who expressed opposition to Russia's invasion of Ukraine.

Rooting for Ukraine

After flying from San Francisco to Munich to Warsaw to the Georgian capital of Tbilisi July 3-5, Toren rented an SUV and rambled around the country for nearly a month, staying mostly in AirBnBs.

Toren was visiting a particularly scenic region of Georgia near the Russian border in mid-July when he met a pair of Russian hitchhikers, Yevgeny and Maxim, who were traveling south. Like many Russians, they vehemently opposed their country's invasion of Ukraine, and one was even an anti-war activist.

"They spoke fluent English," Toren Told The Pine Cone. "Yevgeny had just done a 'marathon for peace' in Moscow. He ran a circle around Moscow, and then in lines traversing the circle, he made a perfect peace sign with his feet. He said the total distance was more than 30 miles. They both expressed their dismay at what was happening," he reported.

Georgia vs. Russia

Like Ukraine, Georgia broke away after the collapse of communism in the Soviet Union, declaring independence in 1991. Also like Ukraine, in 2008 it was invaded by Russia, and part of the tiny country is occupied by Russian forces.

Not surprisingly, many citizens of the fiercely independent nation are vehemently opposed to Russia's invasion of Ukraine.

"I saw lots of anti-Russia graffiti, along with many Ukrainian flags hanging from windows and tucked up on walls," he

Toren spoke with many Georgians about how they feel about Russia.

"The verdict is frustration, emotion, pain, anger, confusion and fear, all mixed into one," he reported. "The Russians are coming into Georgia [for business and tourism] more than usual because Georgia is one of the few places they can go abroad at this time. They have very mixed feelings about that — many have intimate relationships with Russia, including family."

Toren took a drive along the infamous

Road to Tusheti, which he said makes Highway 1 in Big Sur look like a straightaway through the Kansas prairie. It's cut into impossibly steep hillsides, lacks guard rails, climbs to nearly 10,000 feet, and has twists and turns that go on for hours.

He described the journey as the "most grueling, frightening and tiring drive of my life." "At one point I said to myself, 'I should not have done this,'" he recalled. "My nerves got the better of me."

When Toren finally reached his destination — a historic village known as Upper Omalo — he encountered a group of tourists who spoke some English. He approached them and asked if they were as scared as he was by the road. "No, we're from Russia," they all chimed in with smiles.

Strong nationalism

Toren returned home Aug. 2, limping from several pulled muscles, including one he incurred during a failed attempt to catch a flight in London. He had missed an earlier flight due to a airline strike, and he was coming down with a case of Covid.

Back home in Big Sur, he reflected on his trip, and what impressed him most about Georgia, its history and its people.

"The people have such a welcoming nature," he added. "They were curious about me and what I thought about their country. There's a very strong sense of nationalism in Georgia, which is understandable because they were occupied for so long and they recently went through a war. For the people, there's a national unity around being a country."

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
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
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Longtime MoCo Regional Fire officer hired to be new chief

David Sargenti, who has worked for Monterey County Regional Fire District for more than a quarter-century and ran it on a temporary basis after longtime Chief Michael Urquides retired last December, has been hired as the district's latest leader. He started his new job as chief Aug. 1.

Bob Murray & Associates, an executive search firm used by many local government agencies, conducted a nationwide search for Urquides' replacement, according to district officials, and netted nine highly qualified candidates.

"The leading candidates went through an extensive competitive process, including interviews with external panelists, all of whom selected David as the top choice for the position," Marisela Arreguin, who handles human resources for the district, said in the announcement of Sargenti's promotion.

'Excited and honored'

Formerly known as Salinas Rural Fire, Monterey County Regional merged with the former Carmel Valley fire districts in 2009 to cover 400 square miles. It provides firefighting and emergency medical services to more than 40,000 residents in the northern Salinas Valley, Highway 68 corridor and the communities of Chualar, East Garrison, Carmel Valley, mid-valley and the Santa Lucia Preserve.

Sargenti is a lifelong local, having graduated from Palma High School, Hartnell College and Monterey Peninsula College, and he started his fire-fighting career as a volunteer 26 years ago. He received double bachelor's degrees in fire administration and fire prevention technologies from Cogswell Polytechnical College and holds a Chief

Officer Certification from the California State Board of Fire Services. Sargenti has worked as the district's fire marshal, training officer and deputy fire chief, serving the past 19 years as a chief officer.

He said he is "excited and honored" to take the top role following Urquides' 16-year tenure as chief and that his goal is to support all who work for him while focusing on improving "services, staffing levels and community relationships."

Pete Poitras, president of the Monterey County Regional Fire District's board of directors, said Sargenti "clearly demonstrated the ability, dedication and a tireless work ethic to effectively lead our district

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P.G. city council removes 'women' from pro-abortion resolution

IN THE latest example of identity politics creeping into Pacific Grove city hall, the city council this week adopted a resolution supporting abortion rights for "persons who

can become pregnant."

In what was intended to be a rebuke of the Supreme Court of the United States' June 24 reversal of Roe v. Wade, the P.G. City Council Wednesday night adopted a resolution affirming the city's "commitment to the human rights afforded to all women and persons who can become pregnant."

The first two paragraphs of resolution omit the word "woman" in favor of the more ambiguous "pregnant persons." It passed unanimously.

Councilwoman Jenny McAdams, who proposed the resolution, said she wanted the words to make "Pacific Grove a welcoming, inclusive and safe community for everyone."

Council resolutions are nonbinding opinion pieces often adopted for political gain or to be symbolic. The resolution was on the consent calendar, and there was no public discussion before its adoption. Abortion access is already widely available in California.

Say what?

In response to the council resolution, P.G. resident Kirstie Wilde asked the council in an email message if the resolution was "scientific" and made the city "look plainly

McAdams responded to Wilde, first claiming that "trans women"— those who are born male but identify and live as female — can get pregnant.

"As some women identify as they/them, and trans women are able to get pregnant, that is the purpose of the inclusion of the statement in the resolution," McAdams

Asked about the statement, she told The Pine Cone, "Women who identify as they/them or are trans (women to men) may be able to get pregnant."

the murders. A search warrant was served at the residence associated with that vehicle where police located a firearm used in the murders. That murder weapon was collected by detectives and found to contain Lucas' DNA.

The Honorable Stephanie E. Hulsey accepted Lucas' guilty plea to the murders and will preside over the sentencing on Aug. 31. Lucas will receive 58 years to life in the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitations for the two murders. Lucas' conviction is considered two strikes under California's three strikes laws.

The case was investigated by King City Police Detective Juan Rodriguez and Sergeants Joshue Partida and John Dow with the assistance of the Salinas Police Department and the Monterey County District Attorney's Bureau of Investigation.

bidder, and on July 26, the board of supervisors approved the additional funding that was needed to increase the project," Flores said last Wednesday. "We're very grateful to the board for that commitment.'

After the last big event of the season – the Velocity International vintage races in October — the raceway will shut down in November for demolition of the decrepit start-finish bridge, which will be replaced with a steel version. Design work is underway for the bridge, with completion estimated for early next spring, according to Flores, while resurfacing the track should be finished in May or June 2023.

"This will carry us a decade more into the future of Laguna Seca," Flores said.

Ryan Bell, administrative operations

manager at WeatherTech Raceway Laguna Seca, said the management team held a pre-construction meeting Aug. 10, "which we were all excited about.'

He also said he didn't understand how highly revered the track is until he met a couple visiting from France who had stopped by to check it out. "I asked the guy if he was here to knock something off his bucket list," Bell said. "To him and his family, this is their favorite racetrack in the entire world.'

The conversation made him realize how important it is to maintain the facility, which the county owns, "because it's not just ours," he said. "The world loves this place."

Flores also commented that the work will ensure Porsche Rennsport — the largest Porsche gathering in the world that has been held at Laguna a handful of times every five or six years — will take place Sept. 28-Oct. 1, 2023.

"They are anticipating 80,000 people," Flores said.

"The bridge was a major negotiating component in getting Rennsport to come here," as well as in keeping Rolex, which sponsors the annual historic races being held this weekend, as a title sponsor.

'Community investment'

Rennsport generates about \$40 million in spending in the county, according to Flores. "It's a big community investment," he said.

While taxpayers are picking up most of the tab for the work, Laguna Seca manager A&D Narigi, headed by John Narigi, has pledged to raise \$1,634,459 in new sponsorship money for the project.

After the supervisors' 4-1 vote July 26 to approve the funding and grant the contract to Granite Construction, Narigi issued a statement.

"I will admit that I was very concerned

the increased costs that were completely out of anyone's control might negatively affect proceeding with the project," Narigi said. "The supervisors' questions and concerns for the increased funding were evident, but they also knew how important Laguna Seca is to the Monterey County economy, impacting our local retail and hospitality industries and the nonprofits which support operational needs during event weeks. Their support is the strongest voice the Laguna Seca Recreation Area has received and indicates their commitment to a bright, multi-use future for the park."

During construction, the campgrounds will remain open, "and there are many activities being planned that will utilize WeatherTech Raceway for both non-racing and non-motorsport events," Narigi said. "The paddock and Hagerty Marketplace will be open to a wide variety of activities that can be held while construction is

occurring.'

Pot growing businesses hit with big fines

THREE CANNABIS businesses and their former CEO were hit with fines totaling \$2.4 million for operating in Salinas without the proper licenses and permits, the Monterey County District Attorney's Office said this week.

On Tuesday, the DA's office got judgments against Salinas-based Fuji Farms, The Hands on Faith Association, California New Wave and their former CEO, Paul King.

Between 2018 and 2019, Fuji Farms operated a 75,000-square-foot outdoor marijuana cultivation operation but "never obtained" state licenses or local permits to operate.

"During the relevant time period of this case, the company harvested and processed thousands of illegal cannabis plants," according to the DA's office. "King always held himself out as the CEO and CFO of the company while it operated without licenses."

In 2019, prosecutors said Hands on Faith's temporary cannabis licenses expired. Shortly thereafter, King acquired the company and "continued cultivating and engaging in other cannabis activity without renewing the licenses and permits."

Investigators discovered the violations during routine inspections, and all the illegal marijuana was confiscated and destroyed.

Fuji Farms was ordered to pay \$375,760, while Hands on Faith Association paid \$2,038,424.20. Paul King is personally liable for the entire judgment based on his role as CEO in the company and his involvement in the day-to-day operations and violations, the DA's office said.

California New Wave ousted Paul King as CEO from all its companies, and its operations in Salinas are under new ownership, according to prosecutors. Additionally, California New Wave agreed to pay \$150,000 in civil penalties.

year, he applied to demolish it to make way for his residential and retail project, and while a historical consultant concluded the smaller building was not significant and the Carmel planning staff advised the historic resources board to agree to the demolition, the board narrowly voted against it.

A subsequent attempt to convince the city council to overturn that decision several months later failed.

In May, his architect submitted rough plans to move the little building to the east side of the restaurant. Architect Jun Sillano and Chris Mitchell, managing director of Pastor's Esperanza Carmel property development company, presented the idea Monday.

Kort asked the board to discuss whether the concept is viable or if there is no chance it would be approved. He noted that many of the reasons stated by the board for not allowing the demolition could apply to the proposal to move it, including that the "spatial relationships" between the two buildings are "in themselves character defining," that the small building was designed and built to be associated with the bank, that the community room "adds to the complexity and richness of the overall resource," that both structures are "one historic resource," and that moving the smaller one would "completely change" the appearance of the main building on the south side.

Another finding stated that new construction on Pastor's lots "would constitute an adverse effect on the bank complex and destroy the original concept as designed by two of Monterey County's most respected master architects."

'Orphan'

"What we're being asked today is to take this potential orphan of a building and see where it could fit so it would be out of the way of a future project on the other lots," board member Kathryn Gualtieri summarized.

Planning director Brandon Swanson explained that he and Kort were asking for "a thumbs up, thumbs down, red light, green light" on whether "there's any chance that shifting the community room behind the building in your opinion is an approach you would suggest the applicant explore, or is it just a nonstarter?

"The applicant made the request for this meeting to take the temperature of the board before they put too much effort into designing it and spending money on the plans,"

Mitchell said others had suggested moving the building See **HISTORIC** page 25A

It was unknown at the time whether intoxication by drugs or alcohol was a factor.

Carmel Middle School principal Dan Morgan, who sent an email to parents Monday notifying them of the tragedy and offering support for kids affected by it, said he spoke briefly with the victims' devastated father, Steve Biakanja, who has been a firefighter with the City of San Jose for nearly 30 years. He and the kids' mother were divorced, and she and their children lived in Carmel Valley.

"I had to contact him to ask if we could put something out," Morgan said, so the news didn't get around via social media, as often happens, and Biakanja numbly agreed to the request.

"The two older girls, Leigh and Lucy, had a small circle of friends and were rather introverted," he said, so their close friends are intensely feeling the impact of their loss.

Morgan said he didn't know Ben well, since he had just started school there a week earlier after attending Tularcitos, but he understood him to be more outgoing than his older sisters, with many friends who are now in mourning, as well

Morgan said teachers and staff, along with the school's grief response team, are taking care to help and support students who need it as much as possible, and are striving to maintain routines in spite of the shock of losing three

students in a single incident.

"Our job as the adults on campus is to try to normalize things as much as possible and provide routine while giving support to those in need," he explained. "We're still working with lots of students and lots of families on recovery."

Morgan said he and others at the school have been touched by the support the kids have shown each other.

"The first couple of days were a remarkable and beautiful showing of support for one another — lots of hugs and people offering support and walking friends to the office — and those kinds of behaviors are pretty special at the middle school level," he said. "It's been good to see how the students have responded to the tragedy in a mature way and kept kindness in their interactions."

Meanwhile, friends and colleagues of Steve Biakanja have set up a gofundme campaign to help him.

'Ease the burden'

"In the wake of great tragedy, San Jose Fire Station 16 is asking for your support to raise funds for Capt. Steve Biakanja as he navigates a new reality following the recent deaths of all three of his children in a terrible auto accident," his colleagues wrote. "The funds raised will be used to cover the children's funeral costs, as well as counseling, meals and various other forms of support for Captain Biakanja and his wife, Thuan."

Leigh, 14, "was a Sea Cadet who enjoyed learning about science and playing softball," while twin sister Lucy "loved animals, raising chickens and doves as a hobby,"

and Ben, 12, "leaves behind his collection of World War II memorabilia, an avid interest of his."


"With your help, we can do our best to ease the burden of this tragedy and to honor the memory of his beloved children," who are depicted in several photos on the gofundme site.

They had five children; Brook, Stormie, Dawn, Sunny and Trails, who all grew up riding horses and playing polo at Point Lobos, Pebble Beach, Carmel Valley and beyond. His admiration and friendship with his mother-in-law, Susan "Granny" Talmadge, was one of the highlights of his life.

After leaving the Army, Alex began what would be a long and successful career with Granite Construction Company in Monterey and Salinas. The DVD was sold in over 100 Peninsula retail locations and online.

His quest for perfection in the estimating and bidding process would keep his mind sharp and he loved going to his desk every day to figure out how best to build a project.

Always eager to provide us all with his daily life lessons, his words of wisdom from recent Internet finds, or his stories of what he thinks we should do next, he was always there to remind us to stay safe, and have a good time. In his last few days, Alex told his wife Jeanne that he would "Love her for Eternity" and told his son Patrick that "Grieving is the price we pay for a life of happiness." He was never not there, and although he may now be physically absent, the gifts he left in all our hearts will continue to remind us of his presence everywhere we go.

He leaves behind his wife of 46 years, Jeanne; their two sons, Matthew and Patrick (Grace and grandchildren Preston and Lucy); and his children, Stormie (Mike and granddaughters Elizabeth and Victoria and two great-grandchildren), Dawn (grandson Brandon), and Trails (grandsons Connor and Logan). Son Brook and daughter Sunny preceded Alex in death.

30 years in the making

The Grangers can trace their history back to 1992 when the Post Ranch Inn fielded its first team. Many were surfers, and a couple years later, most of them joined shortstop Marcus Foster when he started a team called the Roadhouse, later to be known as the Cold Water Tribe. Five years ago, the Big Sur Grange Hall took over the team's sponsorship, and the Grangers were officially born.

Softball in Big Sur is played "socko" style, a local variant of softball where teams pitch to their own batters, and each batter gets just two pitches. Unlike other local socko leagues, the Big Sur league permits only wood bats — and features an assortment of quirky rules to accommodate its uneven and lopsided playing surface, and the fact that there are a number of trees in the field of play.

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
ROGER ALLAN DAHL

could make more sense than pushing for its demolition.

But board chair Erik Dyar said that "would change the relationship entirely." He also took offense at being asked, calling it, "kind of negating what we said before and voted on, and disrespecting what the council voted to uphold."

Gualtieri similarly disliked it. "I don't see why we would go forward without an investigation into some other way to keep the building on the site," she said, considering they already decided it should be protected.

Board member Karyl Hall, the lone dissenter last May, reiterated that she doesn't consider the community room historic and therefore doesn't much care where it goes.

"It seems like a reasonable compromise," commented HRB member Kathy Pomeroy, the newest member of the board. "You'd still have the building, the owners of that corner lot would still have use of the building, and the applicant would be able to build their project."

Board member Jordan Chroman, who participated in the earlier discussions and then abstained, said he agreed with Hall but that the others made reasonable arguments. "Architects can be very innovative, and I would be open to listening to a proposal," he said. "Until we see an actual proposal, we don't really know what's in their mind, and we're doing them a disservice by just saying, 'No.""

Mitchell said he will return with more detailed plans.

In a message to The Pine Cone Wednesday, Wilde added, "On what planet can biological men who identify as women get pregnant?"

The resolution the council passed Wednesday erroneously states that Supreme Court justices in their 1973 passage of Roe v. Wade ruled that the United States Constitution "protects a pregnant person's" right to an abortion. The SCOTUS decision refers solely to a "woman's" right to have an abortion.

Peripheral issues

The city council and the city's "diversity, equity and inclusion task force" often weigh in on issues which have little or nothing to do with increasing affordable housing, developing financial stability and facilitating business recovery, some of the city's primary goals.

■ In January, the task force recommended to the city

council that it approve the replacement of one or more white-painted crosswalks in the city with a multicolored, rainbow-themed crosswalk to recognize gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgender people. There was also talk of other themes, such as a "Black Lives Matter" crosswalk. The city council did not consider the proposal, however.

- In May, at the behest of the DEITF, the city council apologized to "Chinese settlers, citizens, immigrants and their descendants, who came to the Pacific Grove before and after it became a city, and were victims of institutional racism, prejudice and discrimination." The move was done in response to the termination of the city's Feast of Lanterns festival, which members of the diversity task force viewed as "racist."
- In June, the DEITF changed the language in the city's special events policy to add "neurodivergent people" to the list of people who should not be discriminated against. In defining the heretofore little known term, the DEITF drew directly from Wikipedia: "Neurodiversity refers to variations in the human brain and cognition, for instance in sociability, learning, attention, mood and other mental functions."

LOU SPAGNA


February 14, 1937 - July 12, 2022

Nuclear or bust

FOR SOME people, the fight against climate change comes down to a simple acronym, SBS, which means, "stop burning stuff."

"Climate science and human society are complex, but SBS boils it down," said a group called Law Students for Climate Accountability. "If we're burning it (oil, gas, coal, wood, whatever), we have to quickly stop burning it."

Plenty of powerful people around the world agree, and a lot of big money is being dedicated to the effort to stop burning stuff. Just this week, President Joe Biden signed what Sen. Chuck Schumer called the "boldest climate bill ever," including spending \$370 billion to encourage people to install solar panels, buy electric cars and convert their homes to electric heat — all to help achieve the president's stated goal of eliminating the use of fossil fuels in the United States by 2050. Numerous other countries have endorsed the same goal. But is such a thing even remotely achievable?

Even with all the effort that's already gone into moving this country toward a solar and wind powered future, a quick glance at the numbers shows that we're still so dependent on fossil fuels, the idea of giving them up seems utterly impossible. Consider these truly huge numbers: According to the U.S. Energy Information Administration, in 2021 the United States used 135 billion gallons of gasoline, 47 billion gallons of diesel fuel, 180 million gallons of aviation fuel, 546 million tons of coal and 30 trillion cubic feet of natural gas, for a total energy production (from these sources) of 68 quadrillion British Thermal Units (1 BTU = the energy required to raise the temperature of 1 pound of water 1 degree Fahrenheit.)

The only way to stop burning all those fossil fuels would be to convert all the machines that use them to electricity, requiring not just a huge investment in the machines themselves, but also in all the equipment required to generate and deliver all that electricity, which has to come from someplace. To put it in perspective, consider that last year the United States used 23 quadrillion BTUs of electricity — or only 35 percent of the amount produced by burning the five fossil fuels listed above.

Obviously, it's impossible for the United States to "stop burning stuff" by replacing all those fossil fuels with windmills and solar panels. According to a study by Princeton University, it would take 225,000 square miles of solar panels just to replace the gasoline portion of our country's massive energy consumption. The State of California comprises 164,000 square miles, so imagine the EIR for that little solar project.

The inescapable truth is that unless our country makes a massive commitment to build nuclear power plants, it's not going to come close to "stop burning stuff." The bill signed this week by the president includes a few baby steps toward that nuclear goal, but 99 percent of it is about heat pumps, solar panels, electric cars — and pipe dreams.

Styles vs. styles

Dear Editor, Some residents came to us with con-

cerns about the recent "Design Traditions 1.5 Online Survey," sent out by the city for our Carmel Design Guidelines. They felt the survey was biased, as did we. Let's take a look. Here's question 2.2: "A new house can fit in, regardless

of 'style,' if it is subdued in its character, including size, form, materials, color, etc." (i.e., both modern and classic styles could 'fit' in the village)."

Let's try wording that a little differently: "A new house may not fit in because of its 'style,' including size, form, materials, color, etc. (i.e., some may feel that some

modern styles may not be compatible with Carmel character).

The first question suggests to the respondent that modern styles can "fit in," while the second question just asks if the respondent has any issues with style at all.

The survey question seems to lead the respondent to answer in a way favoring the

notion that it's not about "styles." Let's ask: Are there contemporary architectural styles that are NOT generally compatible with Carmel's village character?

It's almost as though specifically, the issue of architectural "styles" is being avoided. Why? We suspect it is because it is contentious, as the residents and visitors almost completely agree they want Carmel to remain traditional, and the majority of the city staff/planning commissioners are good with modern. In fact, visitors come to Carmel in part because of its traditional architecture, so support of modern styles is

very short-sighted, unless we don't think

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Speeding through federal bureaucracy still took 19 months

LAGUNA SECA Raceway held its first race in November 1957, but it was not the first auto race on the Monterey Peninsula. Those were held 50 years earlier on the 1-mile track built by Hotel Del Monte for horse racing near today's Monterey Fairgrounds. Then several decades passed and the annual Pebble Beach Road Races began on the roads of Del Monte Forest in 1950. After six successful years, the seventh annual meet in 1956 was marred by the death of Ernie McAfee, who crashed into a pine tree during the 33rd lap of the 50-lap race

The tragedy in April 1956 led Pebble Beach Company president S.F.B. Morse that July to cancel any further road races in Del Monte Forest. Knowing, however, that the races had been good for the local

economy, he was already at work on an alternate site with Maj. Gen. Gilman Mudgett, commandant at Fort Ord, about a site there. Prior commandant Maj. Gen. Robert McClure, had

retired in 1954 and had been hired by Pebble Beach as a "special representative." McClure made the perfect envoy to work with the Army.

Damage control

Someone locally tried to prevent approval of a racetrack at Fort Ord by going directly to Secretary of Defense James Dunton in Washington, whom promptly rejected the idea. Morse went into damage control with his political connections. On Aug. 3, he wrote to U.S. Senator Thomas

Kuchel, with a copy to Congressman Charles Teague. Kuchel, a Republican, served in Sacramento from 1937-1953, first as an Assemblyman from southern California, then a State Senator and then as State Controller, until Governor (and future Supreme Court justice) Earl Warren appointed him to the Senate to replace vice president-elect Richard Nixon. Kuchel was elected to the office in 1954 and re-elected in 1956. Teague, from Ventura, was in his

Can't possibly interfere

Carmel's Artists

"Sometimes, when I remember who I was when I was younger and look at the life I have now — my wife, my kids and my art — it doesn't even feel real," he said. "That can sometimes feel terrifying. The more things in life that you value, the

more you worry about losing those things.

Walsh saw few reasons for optimism as a child, teen and young adult, feelings he traces all the way back to the stigma of being held

back in second grade. "I found it so humiliating, being considered kind of dumb - double-dumb, really - when everybody around me seemed to be excelling," said Walsh, who grew up in Southern Vermont, minutes from the Mas-


sachusetts and New Hampshire borders.

Plus, there was this: Walsh's paternal grandfather had transformed from a penniless Belorussian immigrant into a self-educated writer for CBS News who was blacklisted during the witch hunts of the McCarthy era. Walsh's dad, Eugene, had aspired to become a writer, but fell in love with building things, and did that instead. He also became a good investor. His artistic mother, Lili, is a descendant of Mexican aristocracy.

"I wasn't an easy kid," he said. "I was kind of troubled and difficult, always the oldest kid in every class, but struggling every time I had to a math problem at the blackboard, and stumbling whenever I had to read aloud. I almost flunked the seventh grade, too."

'A place for rejects'

While his sister was graduating summa cum laude from Andover, one of the nation's elite prep schools, Walsh was in frequent trouble at a low-level boarding school, "a place for rejects, where people sent their kids when they didn't want to deal with them anymore."

After a year-and-a-half, he left, joined his parents in

high school, which also didn't go as planned. He wound up graduating from a charter school that was located in a strip mall, between a karate dojo and a Planned Parent-

"I spent a year right out of high school in Providence, R.I., as a prep cook at a supermarket, folding clothes at a laundromat, and working at a 7-Eleven, but I was in a bad place," Walsh said. "I was hanging out with a lot of rough characters, falling into bad scenes, and my mom finally suggested that I to down to Mexico, where her family

At 20, he ventured south of the border, where he stayed four years, living for a while with his extended family, and later with a girlfriend, gravitating toward hard street characters, including local gangsters.

"I had been hurting myself with a lot of self-destructive behavior, and it didn't seem likely to end very well" Walsh said.

"And then, completely unexpected, I came into a little bit of money from my mom's side of the family," he said. "That's when I started wondering how to get my life together."

Walsh and his girlfriend moved first to Vancouver, where he made a short-lived attempt at learning to be an animator. Then, at age 26, he ventured down the coast to San Diego, moving in with a friend at Mission Beach.

"I was feeling really out of place there — wasn't liking

it much — and then my mom gave me some acrylics and paintbrushes," he said.

For the first time, Walsh began painting, all by himself, learning by trial and error, hiding his work from everybody and slowly falling in love.

"The money I had received gave me the time I needed, so I decided to start painting all day, every day, on a fiveyear plan, and try to become good at it," he said. "And that

Validation from artists

Walsh, who never attended college and never took an art class, improved in painstaking increments — entirely in secret — and then, at 29, abruptly moved to Cambridge, Mass., where his sister, Rebecca, was living.

"She went to art school and became an illustrator. My brother-in-law was a sculptor. All of these people around them were artists. It just seemed smart to go hang around them a little bit," he said.

Walsh rented a studio in a building where he was surrounded by other artists who quickly began complimenting his work, regarding him with admiration. Nothing like that had ever happened before.

Nearby Boston was where Walsh met his future wife, a bartender who had moved there from Tampa. Lauren was in a relationship when Walsh was smitten, but years later, they crossed paths again, and haven't been apart since.

They've been married since 2013, and Lauren sells flowers most Sundays at Lovers Point from a 1980 Ford Courier that she calls Juni the Flower Truck.


"Art was the first thing that made me feel like my life had any value," he said. "The second thing was meeting Lauren. And the third thing was having children.'

In 2018, when the couple relocated to Pacific Grove, Walsh began venturing outdoors, expanding his repertoire to stunning landscapes and seascapes.

"Plein air painting has become a new passion, not just because I enjoy nature and the challenge of painting outdoors. I also like meeting the random people who come by, and stop to watch," he said. "I enjoy finding out where they're from and what they're about. And I like studying their faces as we talk."

castle, which the Russians took over during the war and eventually destroyed.

Born in 1940, a year into World War II, when her country was divided into four quadrants, occupied by Russian, French, British and American soldiers, Marty lived under Russian occupation until she was 15. It was 1955 when Chancellor Julius Raab, just two years into his eight-year

term, signed a treaty that led to the withdrawal of the four different from Aspang-Markt. allied countries.

'Russians were living in our house until I was 10," Marty said. "When I was 8 years old, a Russian soldier tried to kill my mother while she was washing their clothes. He held a gun at her chest and forced her to drink vodka, until a lieutenant knocked him down."

Marty recalled how the lieutenant then took her into his arms and gave her sugar cubes. Craving food, she ate them all. And to this day, she won't touch another sugar cube.

A promise kept

More than 70 years later, Helga Marty looks at the sunlight illuminating the garden of her house near Sunset Center. It is the sanctuary she and her late husband, world-renowned Swiss chef Albert Marty, bought in 1992. She feels grateful for her home in this storied village — which is not so very

Her husband thought the house was too small. Marty,

who has spent her life traveling the world throughout of his career and ever since, still finds it just



"My father always said, 'Read as much as you can. Learn everything you can to better yourself. Go out into the world and become part of it.' I loved studying geography," she said. "I learned every capital of the world and where the

highest mountain is."

She was 16 when she and her older sister moved to Switzerland to study nursing, a requirement to become a governess for newborns and very young children. The sisters joined an Austrian-German club, which met often at a nearby café. One afternoon, in came Chef Albert Marty, 10 years older, dashing, and just home on vacation. He had immigrated to America by way of Canada, to work with the legendary Victor Bergeron's Trader Vic's Worldwide restaurant and tiki bar chain.

Albert offered his phone number, address and, after a couple of coffee dates, an invitation to join him in Cuba, where he was headed to open a Trader Vic's in the Havana Hilton. It was 1958.

"I went to Cuba in January 1959, during the revolution," she said. "Nevertheless, I felt safe. I was in awe of the beauty of Cuba. We were married on Valentine's Day. Once I was expecting our daughter, Albert took me to Florida for her birth. I like to say Grace was made in Cuba but born in the United States."

When they got to Miami, Helga Marty became a Swiss citizen because her husband was. Thus, their daughter and, now, Helga's grandchildren, have dual citizenship. When officials cut up Marty's Austrian passport, she cried. And, her U.S. citizenship was still a ways off.

The couple returned with their baby to Cuba, where Albert cooked many meals for then-Prime Minister Fidel Castro, at whatever hour he wished. The politician held their daughter in his arms when she was 6 months old.

At home in the world

In 1960, after spending a few months in Washington D.C., the family began a peripatetic life because of Albert's career, which included assignments in Puerto Rico, San Francisco, the Bahamas, New York, St. Louis, Arizona and Fort Lauderdale.

"Most of the time we lived in hotels, which was very nice," said Marty. "Sometimes I would travel with Albert, but once Grace was in school, I stayed with her. I filled my time by playing tennis in the Bahamas and then Fort Lauderdale. I got so involved, I played four to six hours a day and became the doubles champion."

Once, when her husband came home for a visit, he invited her to an event, but she declined because she had a tennis tournament. "Is tennis more important than I?" he asked. "Yes."

In 1970, Albert became chef of the prestigious Sutter Club in Sacramento, and he and his wife became U.S. citizens.

"I am very proud of this," she said. "I treasure my American citizenship more than my Swiss. In this country, if you have two hands and ambition, you can become anything you want, except maybe president. In no other country in the world could you do that."

In the fall of 1973, the Martys moved to Tahoe where they bought the Swiss Lakewood Lodge at Homewood, built in 1919. Over the next 30 years, they became renowned among a worldwide following for his cooking, her management, and the family-like atmosphere they created.

"Prior to Swiss Lakewood, likely due to my childhood experiences, I was scared of my own shadow," she said. "Except on a tennis court, where I was vicious.'

Yet, when Robert Abplanalp, who perfected the aerosol valve, and banker Charles "Bebe" Rebozo, both confidantes of former President Richard Nixon, were dining at Swiss Lakewood, Abplanalp said to her, "Helga, never show you are unsure of yourself."

From then on, she said, "I became stronger. The restaurant and guests like that made me stronger. Now, I can meet anybody, and I pretty much have."

Father knew best

Over the years, the Martys served a colorful cast of customers, among them Barbra Streisand and James Brolin, who dropped in for souffles at midnight, as well as conductor Seiji Ozawa, opera singer Joan Sutherland, Austrian-American conductor and director of the San Francisco Opera Kurt Herbert Adler, Princess Marie-Christine of Belgium, Art Linkletter, designers Bill Blass and Oscar de la Renta, and Chief Justice Anthony Kennedy, as well as many senators, governors, actors and athletes.

"Albert was never very impressed by celebrity," said Marty. "To me, they all felt like family. We did keep a book where everybody signed in. It was like collecting autographs."

In the summer of 1996, on a lark, Helga decided to swim the length of Emerald Bay with a plan to raise sponsorship funds for charity. Starting with a sip of Champagne, which may have given her just enough bravado to battle the frigid waters, she swam the 2-mile distance. It became an annual event, and by 2002, she had raised \$106,300 for Alzheimer's research, lung and breast cancer, leukemia, multiple sclerosis, juvenile diabetes, and the American Heart Association.

The couple regularly visited their Carmel home until their retirement in 2008, when they moved full time to the city by the sea. Kidney cancer left Albert with just nine months there, however.

"Albert was an excellent executive chef who cooked for many dignitaries and won many awards," said his wife. "But he also was an excellent artist. He loved to do oil paintings of Carmel. He loved to sing and to dance. Before he died, I played opera and Swiss music for him. He loved that."

Helga Marty, still Austrian-blonde with a sparkle in her wide-set blue eyes, speaks a gracious style of English with the lingering lilt of her heritage. She continues to eat her way through Carmel restaurants, often with former guests of Swiss Lakewood Lodge, who visit or live in town, and to travel the world — just as her father advised.

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

Salinas artist livens up county government building with stylish mural

ADDING BEAUTY to a staircase at the Monterey County government building in Salinas, painter Jose Ortiz just completed a striking mural.

A resident of Salinas, Ortiz has created more than 70 murals throughout the county, including many in schools.

He also runs a local arts group, Hijos del Sol Arts, at Sherwood Elementary School in Salinas.

Ortiz' latest mural was commissioned by the Arts Council of Monterey County, which paid him \$10,000 to do the work. The money came from donations.

More murals are planned

While Ortiz incorporates contemporary themes into his murals — the new piece shows students with laptops — his style is reminiscent of the murals funded by the Works Progress Administration during the 1930s.

Ortiz also cleverly incorporated a pair of lights into his mural.

Jacquie Atchison, executive director of the arts council, called Ortiz' piece "amazing," and she said plans for painting more murals in the same building are in the works. "I think murals will bring some energy and vibrancy to a location that everyone walks through," Atchison told The Pine Cone. "Our county is very supportive of

the arts, and we want to make sure everyone understands that."

Atchison said 64 paintings or photographs are currently on display in the building, which is

located at 168 W. Alisal. Each year, the pieces are replaced by others that are selected through a jury process. The paintings on display are for sale, offering the artists a critical revenue stream.

The arts council is also organizing mural projects for three underpasses in Salinas' Alisal neighborhood. Caltrans is using taxpayers' money to pay three teams of mural artists a total of \$748,000 to create the art.

The money coming from this project is part of the \$1.1 billion that's been allocated "to clean up trash and debris, beautify community gateways and public areas along highways."

■ Museum seeks miniatures

The Monterey Museum of Art is accepting donations of original art for its annual fundraising show of miniature paintings Friday, Saturday and Sunday from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m.

The show is open to all museum members. Artwork can be no larger than 8 inches by 9 inches, and will be displayed both in the museum and on its web site.

The money raised will benefit the museum's many shows and programs. "The museum is grateful to all the artists whose participation enables us to raise funds to present dynamic exhibitions, conserve collection artworks, develop meaningful education experiences, and serve broader audiences," read a message thanking donors.

The show, titled "Miniatures 2022," runs from Nov. 17 to Dec. 11. The museum is located at 559 Pacific St.

by representatives of the chamber of commerce, gathered at Casa Munras in Monterey to create the Sports Car Racing Association of the Monterey Peninsula as a nonprofit organization. Gold was elected president and drafted the formal request from SCRAMP to Mudgett. For the following week, Gold organized a follow-up meeting, inviting other local chambers and businesses to help support the effort.

Morse wasted no time and drafted a letter with the background of the races and the need for them to continue to Lt. Gen. Robert Young, commanding general of the Presidio of San Francisco. Following the chain of command, Young would need to review and concur with any recommendation from Mudgett. Morse had McClure hand-deliver the letter to Young. Young replied on Nov. 3, with assurances that, "in the event there are no unfavorable legal angles to this matter, we will certainly forward a favorable recommendation to the Department of the Army."

On Nov. 12. Morse circled back with Kuchel and Teague, writing in part, "Both of the generals and their staffs have examined the site and think it would not only do no harm, but may be very beneficial." With approval needing to come from Washington, Morse added, "A word to the Department of Defense from you at this time would be very helpful.'


Gold soon informed Morse that the steering committee would like to make Morse honorary president of SCRAMP. Morse accepted on Nov. 19. The next day, he wrote a letter to D.C. attorney Bob Kline Jr. "It occurred to me that if you happen to know the Secretary of the Army, you might do us some good in connection with this matter." Kline did not know the secretary, but in World War II had served under the chairman of the House Armed Services Committee, who arranged a meeting.

Done in 19 months

Just a few weeks later, it was announced that effective Feb. 15, 1957, Mudgett would assume command of the U.S. Army in Alaska. SCRAMP would need to ensure that new commandant at Fort Ord supported the racetrack. Brig. Gen. William

> Breckenridge arrived in February from Germany where he had been chief of staff for the Army's 5th Corps. He was quickly brought up to speed and was supportive of the plan, but the process remained in Washington.

Moving with confidence, SCRAMP arranged \$90,000 to fund construction of the facility so they could proceed quickly once they got the go-ahead from D.C. This funding would be paid back over two years. Finally, in August 1957, SCRAMP announced a five-year lease had been signed with the Army. However, as the Army could not contract with a nonprofit, the cham-

ber of commerce signed the lease.

With it in hand, work began immediately and was completed in late October. The 1.9-mile track was paved with thick asphalt over a 5-inch bed of decomposed granite. It was 30 feet wide and extended to a width of 65 feet on the 3,700-foot straightway, which also included pit row and the start-finish line.

Just 19 months after McAfee's fatal crash in April 1956, the new Laguna Seca Raceway hosted its first race meet on Veteran's Day weekend, Nov. 9-10, 1957. In honor of tradition, the gathering was called "The 8th Annual Pebble Beach Road Race at Laguna Seca.'

The Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance, which began as an adjunct to the first Pebble Beach Road Races in 1950, continued in 1957, and in the years since, has been hosted annually near the 18th Green of the Pebble Beach Golf Links. Over the decades, additional events have been added to a week anchored by Concours Sunday, millions of dollars have boosted the local economy and charities, and Concours Week has become one of the premier automotive events in the world.



DARLENE MOSLEY was the chair of the forest and beach commission but hasn't been at a meeting in months, and commissioner Michael Caddell's term ended earlier this summer. Meanwhile, longtime member Kathryn Gualtieri is leaving the historic resources board.

As a result, officials are hoping residents and those living in and near town will apply to replace them.

"If you want to come and get involved — I've been championing that for a while — we have two openings on our forest and beach commission and one opening on our historic resources board," planning director Brandon Swanson said Friday.

'Stalwart, compassionate'

The FBC discusses policies and projects pertaining to the beach, forest and park, such as tree removals, work at Mission Trail park — and the much debated issue of benches along the Scenic Road pathway. A majority of the commissioners must live within the city limits, while some can reside in the sphere of influence, and applicants should be interested in and familiar with the city's parks and open space, its urban forest and the beach. The commission meets monthly on the second Thursday at 3:30 p.m. in city hall, which requires everyone to be masked and show proof of vaccination.

The historic resources board weighs in on projects involving historic properties and policies on preservation, and every member should be a resident in the city. (The exception would be that if a resident with the required expertise cannot be found, the candidate may live outside

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the city limits, as long as the majority are residents.) Candidates should be interested in and knowledgeable about the city's architectural, cultural and historical resources. The HRB meets on the third Monday of the month at 4 p.m. and has been conducting its business via Zoom due to the pandemic.

Gualtieri, who is transitioning off the board after years of service interrupted by a stint when she lived out of the area, "has been stalwart and compassionate, and is very impassioned by preservation of our historic resources,"

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
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Baseball was good prep for Wall Street firm's 'baptism by fire'

WHEN MONTEREY Peninsula native Nick Halamandaris discusses his professional career in the roughand-tumble world of Wall Street, he frequently mentions the lessons he learned and the callouses he developed playing baseball at the high school, college, and professional levels:

- He enjoyed some glory years at Stevenson School, where he helped the Pirates to the sectional playoffs in back-to-back seasons, and attracted attention from Major League Baseball scouts and NCAA Division I coaches.
- He struggled through an injury-riddled career at UC Berkeley, which — perhaps defying long odds — culminated with renewed interest from the Seattle Mariners, who signed him to a pro contract.
- And he spent a brief summer as a prospect in the Arizona Rookie League, where his banged-up body and baseball burnout conspired against him.

"I might have limped into that final portion of my career, but it is what it is, and I really don't have much regret," said Halamandaris, who was released by the Mariners in December of 2016 after batting just .105 in 13 professional games.

Getting on with life

"You really have to be as prepared as you can for an opportunity like that," he said, "but I wasn't as sharp as I could have been mentally, my body was kind of shot, and I really wasn't very interested in hanging on to baseball for the sake of hanging on. It was time to get on with life."

For the small-town kid from Monterey, that next stage

of life, at age 23, began with a gutsy move to New York City, where a relative offered him an opportunity to learn about the dog-eat-dog world of high finance from the

For Halamandaris, who had majored in literature, few challenges could have been further from his comfort zone.

"Bond trading is a hard game. Your decisions can cost money, and relationships are at stake with every move you

make. There are real stakes, without much room for feelings," he said. "That may seem harsh, but it's reality, and I think embracing that truth is half the battle.

"You can't really learn this business from a textbook you learn by getting punched around, taking your lumps, being accountable for your mistakes, and trying not to make the same mistake twice," Halamandaris said. "Just like in baseball, you have to be OK with the baptism by fire, try to stay positive, and just keep plugging until it starts to make a little more sense."

Glory days

Baseball also can be harsh and unforgiving, he came to learn. At Stevenson, Halamndaris surfed a tidal wave from 2008-2012, earning all-league and all-county recognition three straight years as a slugging first baseman for a 40-year coaching legend, Paul Wilcox.

As a senior, Halamandaris was invited to Pro Day in Seattle (where he slugged a home run during a live game) and Milwaukee (where he homered multiple times during batting practice). His dad, Dr. Gus Halamandaris, a local

neurosurgeon, was there in both big-league stadiums, watching his son rattle the seats.

The 18-year-old was selected by the Mariners that summer in the eighth round of Major League Baseball's amateur baseball draft, but had other plans: He also was being wooed by Division I baseball schools — most notably UC Berkeley, Wake Forest and Cal Poly.

"As soon as I got the offer to play PAC-12 baseball, it was basically Cal all the way," said Halamandaris, who received a partial scholarship from Cal coach David Esquer (now the head coach at Stanford).

Tough lessons

But hard knocks were on the horizon, in multiple forms. Over Christmas break in his freshman year, Halamandaris broke his thumb diving for a ground ball, an injury that required surgery and sidelined him for nearly two months. He managed to play 30 games that spring, but batted just

"The trees are in fair condition and will continue to provide meaningful benefit to the urban forest for years to come," he wrote. "The eucalyptus are growing at an angle but are not leaning."

He also noted the city will not allow pruning trees to improve people's views.

Not a fan

"I'm not a eucalyptus fan," commented commissioner Brian Sours. "My concern is they're leaning over the street and could be a hazard in a storm."

He also said the city allowed San Antonio Avenue resident Laura Overett to remove the groves of huge eucalyptus near her beach-side home north of Fourth, in part due to their risk of falling on houses nearby, not to mention their noxious effect on the environment.

"It's not a species that I'm in love with, and I think they're dangerous and they're dirty," he continued. "And continuing to prune these things will be an ongoing effort."

Commissioner Sarah Berling observed that the city itself has made multiple efforts to get rid of eucalyptus over the years, including a recent large-scale removal in Mission Trail park and along Fourth Avenue in 2001.

"I think it would be beneficial to remove them," she said.

She offered

Chair JC Myers said he would also support taking the trees out as long as they're replaced with something better, such as oak or Monterey cypress. Since the eucalyptus are public trees, he added, it didn't seem right to require Crandall to pay for them to be cut down.

Public works director Bob Harary remarked that Crandall had offered in her letter to cover the cost of their removal or pruning, though at the meeting, she worried that if the tab were "astronomical," she wouldn't be able to get the other Pine Terrace condo owners to contribute enough.

Ultimately, she agreed to pay for half the cost of the removal and all of the replanting, and the commission — which only has three members at the moment — unanimously agreed.



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
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

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ALERT: Dod's secretive Monterey **Regional Compatible Use Study**

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For 2 ½ years, consultants, Monterey staff, and two committees have met behind closed doors with Pentagon officials to discuss the future of our community -- "compatibility" and "encroachment" of local communities and the military, and changes the community must make in land use planning and rules to allow military expansion here. They excluded the public.

The secretive process violates Brown Act and study requirements to "involve the public". Only one pseudo-public meeting was held June 29 without public legal notice.

Unevaluated are the extensive hazards, damage, health impacts, and costs to our community from these facilities. Fort Ord is a Superfund site, causing cancer and death. PFAS and many deadly toxins are in the groundwater, soil, air, ocean, and drinking water (eg. Associated Press "What Lies Beneath" February 23, 2022). Many have been inadequately investigated. Local housing availability and affordability are also significantly impaired by the military and its housing stipends.

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


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

And the Cedar Lane sauvignon blanc "may be the best version we have ever made of this perennial favorite," Lallos said. "It is widely held that sauvignon blanc may be the best suited varietal for the sandy soils and warm climate of the Arroyo Seco AVA."

He noted that sauvignon blanc can be citrusy, grassy or tropical, depending on a number of factors, including where it's grown, which clones were planted, when it's harvested and what the winemaker likes.

"Mark and Will do a great job making ours, one of the most complex and aromatically pleasing you will find anywhere," Lallos said.



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

In the fall of his sophomore year, a line drive struck him in the shoulder and broke his collarbone. Two months later, on the day he returned to action, he collided with his right fielder while chasing a pop-up, tearing the medial collateral ligament in his knee. He recovered to play in 43 games that spring, batting .244 with 12 RBI, but reinjured his shoulder sliding into home.

That injury dogged him through a summer in the Cape Cod Baseball League and required surgery in the fall of his junior year. That spring, he batted just .209.

Halamandaris — healthy at last — prepared for his senior year playing summer ball in Walla Walla, Wash., where he broke through with a .330 average, hammering eight doubles, two triples and three home runs in 24 games - a harbinger of things to come. In his final spring at Cal, he batted .315, with 15 doubles, a triple, 5 home runs and 43 RBI in 52 games, and fielded .989 at first base and left field. Those numbers were rewarded with All-PAC-12 honorable mention status, and a rookie-league contract with the Mariners.

He also was named Scholar-Athlete of the Year for PAC-12 baseball.

"As a Division I player, you learn that there are people who love to compete and love to fight — they're gritty, and maybe a little bit nasty. It's more of a grown-man game," Halamandaris said. "Technique and fundamentals are important, but, as Mike Tyson said, 'Everybody's got a plan until they get punched in the face.

"Some guys are fine with getting punched in the face. Others don't like it and they quit," he said. "You have to take a step back and say, 'OK, how am I going to punch back?' Or, 'What adjustments am I going to make so I don't get punched?"

Preparation for life

What he came to realize, said Halamandaris, is that those experiences were preparation for life.

'In my experience, the people who come the furthest are those who survive those ups and downs, and become better for it," he said.

Halamandaris, who lives in Manhattan, remains physically active at age 28, playing in a high-level amateur baseball league in Brooklyn, dabbling in handball and pickleball in Central Park, playing rugby, and learning to box at a local gym.

He remains in frequent contact with baseball friends from Stevenson and Cal, and typically returns home about once a year to visit his parents, Gus, the surgeon, and Ksenija, a registered nurse.

"New Yorkers like to rib me about being from California, but the Monterey Peninsula was a special place to grow up," he said. "It's hard not to fantasize about moving back someday."

- -- Reform USFS eliminate timber industry ties and tree sales.

Celebration of a century of Le Mans starts now

EXT YEAR marks the centennial of one of the world's most important races

— France's 24 Hours of Le Mans — and the kickoff of a year of celebration starts here on the Monterey Peninsula during Car Week.

"Le Mans is one of the world's two most important races, and there's been sincere American interest in it," said consummate car guy, longtime auto historian and racer Joe Freeman, who will be judging Le Mans cars at the Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance. "The Indianapolis 500 and the 24 Hours of Le Mans are the ones that stand the highest" — because of their history, the talent

of the drivers and the overall excitement of the racing.

"Over the years, Le Mans has produced some extraordinary races and some extraordinary cars," he said.

The 24-hour race, which is driven on an 8.467-mile circuit of public roads and track in Le Mans, France, about 120 miles southwest of Paris, was created to test the endurance of the cars. While Formula 1 is a sprint race in which drivers go as fast and hard as they can in order to win, endurance races require a more measured — though still very fast — approach to keep the cars from falling apart. Most drivers compete in teams, taking shifts so they can rest — though some have attempted to go the full 24 hours on their own.

To kick off the celebration of the race's centennial,

previous Le Mans winners and other notable cars that competed will be featured in special classes at Sunday's Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance, while this year's Rolex Monterey Motorsports Reunion focuses heavily on the history of Le Mans.

Doing it properly

Barry Toepke, director of heritage events for WeatherTech Raceway Laguna Seca, said the idea of launching the year-long celebration during Car Week grew from a conversation he had with a former Laguna Seca GM who has connections in the French organization that

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
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A bouquet from the 'final flowering' of grand French cars

ID YOU say the car was knotty or naughty?" That question came up during a conversation with Peter Larsen, likely the world's foremost authority on Talbot-Lago Grand Sports cars, a featured marque at this year's Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance.

Larsen's been a member of the selection committee for Concours since 2017, and Talbot-Lagos were supposed to be shown at the (canceled) 2020 show. After the worst of the pandemic seemed to have passed, they tried for the 2021 show, but couldn't find enough owners and vehicles that could get into the United States, as most foreign travelers were not allowed entry at the time. Finally, however, the cars Larsen loves most will be on display here for all comers to admire.

Making their debut in 1947, 32 Grand Sports were built, and of those, 28 survive. Nine will be on the show

field at Pebble Beach. Larsen said that after World War II, in an age when socialism was making headway in many European countries, the French government disincentivized luxury cars by taxing them heavily, while encouraging mass production of Citroëns and Renaults. "By 1954, all the companies were gone — the entire French luxury business," Larsen said.

The complexities of France

The Talbot-Lagos came at the tail end of an era that began in the early years of the auto industry. Buyers would purchase a chassis comprising the drivetrain, suspension and wheels, then pay a coachbuilder whose business might well have dated back to the days of horse-drawn carriages — to build a custom body. As a result, Larsen said, "The cars on the field will all be completely different, and all of them will be unique, an expression of French high style."

He compared them to Italian cars, which he said are

"very beautiful and easy to understand. The French cars are more complex, more knotty. You have to look at them and see them from different angles." When asked for clarification as to whether it was "knotty" or "naughty," he paused and said, "Some of them are very sexy."

Even before the French government began levying extremely high taxes on luxury cars, Talbot-Lagos were expensive.

Larsen estimated that you could have purchased an apartment in France for the price, and added that he'd read it was the equivalent of 22 years' salary for an aver-

age worker.

Grand gesture

According to an April article that Larsen wrote for the Concours, the car "was destined for the grand cru sportsman and chic Parisian society in equal measure. It was a grand gesture, the final flowering in France of the great tradition of the truly custom and profoundly bespoke motorcar. This chassis was one of the last expressions anywhere in the

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
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


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Where to find the very best of the very worst

▼HE MONEY-BACK guarantee to those planning to attend the infamous Concours d'Lemons — a free event — is that your senses will be stimulated in unexpected ways.

But, rest assured, that new-car smell isn't likely to be one of them.

The Monterey Peninsula's annual showcase of some of the most gawd-awful motorized vehicles on the planet returns to the lawn at Seaside City Hall on Aug. 20, from 8 a.m. to 1:30 p.m.

"We're looking forward this year to having several flavors of the Citroen Deux Chevaux, a horrible little French car which was essentially France's answer to the VW Bug. They made 9 million of them," said Alan

Galbraith, who concocted d'Lemons back in 2009 as a counterweight to the highfalutin Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance.

"We're also expecting a Cadillac Alante, which is notable because the bodies were built in Italy, then were flown in a special 747 to Detroit, where General Motors equipped them with an absolutely horrendous drivetrain," added Galbraith, who refers to himself as "head gasket" of d'Lemons. "GM touted the Alante as a car that rolled off the 'world's largest assembly line, stretching from Italy to Detroit,' and lost a ton of money on every sale."

Expect the unexpected

The list of entrants is also expected to include traditional hoopties like Pintos, Vegas, Gremlins, Corvairs,

and Pacers — some waxed and pristine, others showing demolition-derby-type dents, scars, and grime.

Veteran d'Lemons aficionados also know to expect the unexpected.

The 2017 show featured a Honda with two front ends — two windshields, two steering wheels, two fully-operable engines — fused together and pointing in opposite directions. The car had no need for a reverse gear, because it never went backward — any direction was forward, except when it moved sideways, like a crab.

A highlight of Seaside's 2019 event was a drivable

"I've heard that a couple of guys are planning to bring homemade cars this year," Galbraith said. "I've

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
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
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Concours drawings provide big boost for local nonprofits

▼HE PEBBLE Beach Concours d'Elegance — the flagship of Car Week on the Monterey Peninsula — is one of the world's premier automobile events, and each year, more than two dozen awards are given to the most spectacular vehicles. But the winning doesn't stop there, and numerous charitable organizations benefit from the Concours long after the car trailers have left the Peninsula.

Since the Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance began in 1950, it has raised more than \$32 million for charities. In fact, one of its primary objectives is giving back to the community and supporting people in need. Fundraising proceeds are handled by the Pebble Beach Company Foundation.

A few select nonprofit groups — such as Montage Health Foundation and the Boys & Girls Clubs of Monterey County — can raise funds by selling tickets for a chance to win new vehicles and other gifts. The groups keep 100 percent of the charity drawing pro-

Mental health help

Montage Health Foundation, founded in 2017, is the philanthropic arm of parent company Montage Health — a network of medical services, doctors and Community Hospital of the Monterey Peninsula.

In the group's words, the "mission of Montage Health Foundation is to advance the vision and strategic priorities of Montage Health by inspiring and enhancing philanthropic support for Montage Health and its related entities. We make a difference through grant-making, volunteerism and philanthropic partnerships with community members and like-minded organizations."

This year, the group is selling \$100 charity drawing tickets for a chance to win a 2022 Mercedes-Benz A220 sedan. The proceeds will benefit Ohana, a children's behavioral healthcare initiative backed by Montage that provides hundreds of young people in Monterey County with mental and behavioral healthcare needs. Mercedes-Benz donated the vehicle, which is valued at \$41,100.

Montage Health spokeswoman Monica Sciuto explained how the funds from the ticket sales would help an Ohana program that brings mental health programs to schools.

"Montage Health Foundation's goal is to raise \$100,000 to increase Ohana's prevention and early intervention programming that brings counselors to local middle and high schools to teach mental wellness skill-building and offer support to students," Sciuto told The Pine Cone.

Thanks to grants from the P.B. Co. Foundation and the Montage Health Foundation, early this year, Ohana began providing a child therapist to work with students in Monterey Peninsula Unified School District middle schools.

"With additional funds raised at Concours d'Elegance, Montage Health Foundation plans to continue expanding the program to reach more students and more schools in the community," Sciuto said.

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Artist captures drama of racing on 2022 Concours posters

▼HIS YEAR'S Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance is commemorated in three posters created by British painter Tim Layzell, who has been making a name for himself as one of the world's top automobile artists since he was a teenager.

Besides designing the main poster for this year's gathering of classic cars, Lay-

zell also created poster art for the Tour d'Elegance — where 150 cars drive from Pebble Beach to Big Sur and back — and the Pebble Beach Retro Auto, a five-day display of car-related collectibles and memorabilia.

Fascinated by Fords

Layzell is passionate about classic cars, and he's fascinated by their history. For the main poster, he celebrates a

car that his grandfather loved, a 1941 Lincoln Continental. "My grandfather was obsessed by anything Ford, so I'm sure he would've been blown away to find out I was painting this subject," he said.

"Following up on the success of the Lincoln Zephyr, Ford Motor Company president Edsel Ford and his chief stylist E.T. 'Bob' Gregorie worked together to create the new Continental," explained

> Layzell, who lives in Bristol, England. "The coachwork was designed by Gregorie, delivering such elegant lines and simplicity in its detailing. It also had a very stylish roofline — be it coupe or convertible — which all adds up to make it one of the most elegant American production cars of all time."

Layzell's poster art places the car at the familiar site, and complements it with another stylish car — and one of its creators. "It is seen here in front of the Lodge at Pebble Beach with Edsel Ford standing proudly next to his creation, and behind, the equally fabulous 1932 Lincoln KB Murphy Sports Roadster," the artist said.

The artwork for the Tour d'Elegance shows a 1962 Ferrari 250 GTO zipping along Highway 1. Layzell called it "the benchmark of early 1960s GT racing."

"It was a particular pleasure to paint this car, as it's always been one of my favorites among the GTOs," he said. "I watched it race at Goodwood Revival in the late 1990s and it captured my imagination from there on."

The poster shows a Ferrari 250 GTO "blasting south down Highway 1," with an Aston Martin DB4 GT Zagato chasing it. "I really tried to capture the feel of driving this incredible car on this iconic road," the artist explained.


One-of-a-kind

For the Retro Auto event, Layzell painted the 1937 Talbot-Lago T150C-SS Figoni & Falaschi Teardrop Coupe cruising past the Lone Cypress on 17 Mile Drive.

"If you've visited the Pebble Beach Concours, it's likely that the shape will be familiar to you, as once you've seen one, you'll never forget it," he suggested. "Regarded as one of the most beautiful cars ever made, the car speaks for itself, with jaw-dropping coachwork that really captured the era in which it was made. With almost outrageous lines and proportions, it really is incredible to paint."

The distinctive car almost inspired Layzell to take up another profession.

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A Lincoln heads to the ball

'N 1920, Lincoln Motor Company founder Henry Leland introduced the luxury Lincoln L series. He continued to produce the series even after the 1922 bankruptcy of Lincoln, and its subsequent purchase by the Ford Motor Company.

Henry Casey, who owned one of the first Lincoln dealerships on the West Coast, purchased a 1922 Model L, a fancy seven-passenger touring car that became the centerpiece of his Portland, Ore. showroom.

brought the car to California, where he did a partial restoration in Newport Beach. He got the car running, repaired the upholstery and repainted the body, which had been painted once, to its original colors — shades of green with black fenders. Some 20 years ago, he gave the car to his sons, Michael and Tim.

'Tremendous thrill'

"Michael and I became the third generation of Caseys to own the car," said Tim Casey. "When we were kids, we'd see it in the garage and imagine that someday we'd restore it. And in 2008,

This is the quintessential Cinderella story of a once-cherished beauty that was banished to the garage, but ultimately rescued and restored in time to make her debut at the ball, a royal pageant known as the Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance.

"That car probably cost more than our grandfather's house, but somehow he bought it," said Tim Casey, who is escorting the Lincoln as it celebrates its centennial on the 18th Fairway. "Once the Depression started, my grandfather was unable to sell it, so he made it his daily driver, ferrying his family of five around town for eight to 10 years," and in 1933, he retired it to the garage and made his 5-year-old son, Paul, the designated driver of his make-believe "car fort."

Dealer's choice

Forty years went by, while the luxury Lincoln languished in the garage, losing

"My dad said his father bought the car for around \$3,500," Tim Casey said. "I don't know his exact impetus for buying the car in the first place except that for a car dealer, having a nice car like that

must have been enticing." In the 1970s, a grown-up Paul Casey we did. Michael and my father have both since passed, but the family legacy, our impetus to honor the car, continues."

Tim Casey, who lives in Santa Barbara with his wife, Louise, enjoys driving the car on sunny days and participating in his local Lincoln Owners Club. Dedicated to "early" Lincolns, the membership celebrates models built between 1920 and 1939.

In celebration of the Lincoln Centennial, the president of the club was looking for a 1922 Model L to showcase in their exhibit. Yet, when he saw Casey's car, he said it should be entered — not in his little exhibit, but in the Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance.

"This is all new to me," Casey said. "I've never shown a car at the Concours. I've never even been to the event. It's a tremendous thrill for my family to bring our Lincoln, which will finally have its day. I just wish my grandfather, my father and my brother were here to share in this."

Michael Casey left behind one son, and Tim Casey has two sons and two grandchildren, which means there's a good chance the Leland Lincoln L will continue to live on through subsequent generations of Caseys, without the threat of ever being parked as a playhouse again.

It's all uphill on Sunday at Laguna Seca raceway

URING ITS eight-month season, WeatherTech Raceway Laguna Seca sees motor-sports that include race cars, motorcycles, vintage automobiles and IndyCars. It's a crowded schedule of practice sessions, qualifying events and finals. But raceway officials have determined there's room for a new event.

Taking a cue from the success of the format at other venues, the final day of the Rolex Monterey Motorsports Reunion will be dedicated to the inaugural Corkscrew Hillclimb Community Day on Sunday, the same day as the Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance.

"The real purpose of it is to open up the park at a

very reasonable price to our local community," said John Narigi, the facility's president and general manager since Jan. 1, 2020. "Given the congestion, activity and what goes on during Car Week, we've scheduled a community day with a new event."

"Saturday has always been our largest day and will continue to be," said Barry Toepke, the raceway's director of heritage events and public relations. "But the question then is, 'What do we do on Sunday?' We have the track. We have a lot of automakers in town. We have a lot of participants who like to stay.


"We decided to have a party in the paddock for entrants, open it up and make it a low-cost day for the community who might not be going to Pebble Beach or other events."

In the Hillclimb, an expected field of 60 vehicles of diverse styles and capabilities will compete driving counter-course from near the start/finish line up through the iconic Corkscrew. The route will comprise about one-third of the 11-turn, 2.238-mile circuit.

Entrants will be timed while individually negotiating the uphill course, with one-minute starting intervals. There will be two sessions (with a break in between) followed by the "People's Choice Shootout," which will determine the winner (though, since it's an exhibition, no awards will be presented).

"We fully expect that people will be lining the fences to watch," said Toepke. "We'll see how it goes. We've



organizes the 24 Hours of Le Mans.

"We're the start, and they'll have various celebrations going on around the world, ending at Le Mans in 2023 — that will be the 100th," he said. "To feature that esteemed of a race, we wanted to do it properly. The weekend celebrates a century of speed."

Because of the theme, Toepke said some of the traditional racing groups won't run this year, but he believes mixing it up a little helps keep vintage racing interesting

"We quickly found out that celebrating a century of Le Mans has its challenges. We have four dedicated run groups that are eras of Le Mans," he said. "Obviously in those groups, there can be a huge speed differential."

'Truly stunning'

That's not much unlike the real thing. During the endurance race in France, different classes of cars based on engine size and other factors are running on the lengthy circuit all day and all night at the same time. Therefore, those in the fastest group will pass slower cars many times before the race ends.

For the Rolex Monterey Motorsports Reunion, a selection committee reviewed each entrant for authenticity, racing provenance and other criteria before deciding which cars could compete on Laguna's 2.238-mile track. "For the four Le Mans groups, we basically only accepted cars that ran at Le Mans or were eligible," Toepke said. "The selection is truly stunning."

In addition to the Porsches, Ferraris, Fords, Audis, Alfa Romeos and other historic Le Mans racers spectators will see on the track, an expansive heritage display will showcase some of the extremely special specimens that owners and museums no longer want driven because they're too precious to risk crashing.

Among them will be the 1929 and 1930 Bentley

Speed Sixes that won at Le Mans, as well as the 1931 Alfa Romeo 8C Spider.

"I think fans are really going to like the last Ferrari 250 LM that won in 1964," Toepke added. "That was the last Ferrari to win Le Mans overall."

The three Ford GT40s that won in 1966, 1967, 1968 and 1969 — their development and victories portrayed in the 2019 film, "Ford vs. Ferrari," starring Christian Bale and Matt Damon — will be on display, too.

"There are going to be 51 cars in there, ranging from the 1929 Bentley up to the 2009 Porsche 911 type 997 and the Audi R8 that won in 2005," he said. "It's an eclectic group — you will really be walking through the history of Le Mans."

Of course, such a celebration must have the right grand marshal, and this year's star is record nine-time Le Mans champion Tom Kristensen, who took his first win in 1997. He

became the winningest driver in 2005 and is now three wins above the previous record setter, Jacky Ickx, who won six times.

The Dane has mostly driven for German marques — Porsche, Audi and BMW — but had a year with Team Bentley. Kristensen and four-time winner Henri Pescarolo, who holds the record for most Le Mans appearances (33) but has never been to Monterey, will be onstage during the weekend sharing stories.

"The cars are fantastic — they're always the stars — but it's the people who drove them that can talk and tell the stories," Toepke said.

Other tributes include the Café Le Mans, which will be open to all and will serve Moët Champagne and small bites in a "café setting" in the paddock.

"We want to continue to create new experiences to keep people coming back," he said. "We're working hard on that this year."

New for 2022, the races at Laguna Seca are ending

Saturday evening to ensure no one who wants to be at the Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance on Sunday misses out on either experience.

On the grass in P.B.

Freeman, who has judged at the Concours more than 20 years, recounted some of the colorful history of Le Mans. In the late 1920s, the "Bentley Boys" won with their English cars, followed by a team of Alfa Romeos that took the checkered flag for four straight years.

After World War II, Ferrari victories gave way to notable top finishes by Jaguar.

"Jaguar wanted to get back in the game, and they won for five years," Freeman said. "Some of these cars will be on the field," including an aluminum-bodied XK120 and the C-Type and D-Type that followed.

Some of the key Ford GT40s will be there, too.



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


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A weekend of automotive wonder awaits

ONGRATULATIONS, YOU'VE made it to the pinnacle of the automotive world's "Holy Week" on the Monterey Peninsula.

Since 1950, racing, exhibiting and selling vehicles of all shapes and sizes have been part of this area's impressive cultural landscape, starting with a single-day road race through the forest of Pebble Beach accompanied by a justamong-friends show of the latest and greatest cars at the nearby Lodge. Not long after its inception, the Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance became a judged contest of collector cars and has since spawned similar events all over the world - though none match its majesty and significance. In the late 1950s, Laguna Seca was built to accommodate the racing that had begun in Del Monte Forest. (For the curious, the story of the origin of Laguna Seca, which is celebrating its 65th Anniversary, was the topic of the History Beat in last week's Carmel Pine Cone, which can be downloaded from carmelpinecone.com.)

Since those early years, so many associated events have blossomed that Car Week now spans 10 days and stretches from Seaside to Carmel Valley to Big Sur.

As the offerings have grown, so has The Pine Cone's coverage, with its must-read special sections two weeks in a row that anyone who cares about anything automotive should rush to pick up. A

highlight of those editions is our comprehensive calendar of Car Week's numerous amazing events.

Take your time to examine this detailed look at everything the Monterey Peninsula has to offer as it transforms into a car lover's paradise. era adobe for three days of art and autos. "Discover what happens when cars and art collide at Monterey Car Week inside the Porsche Zentrum," the pitch line goes. "From unique artist collaborations, hands-on maker spaces, and an inspiring speaker series, the Zentrum is the perfect stop for car and art enthusiasts alike. Come dream in color with Porsche."

The first session focuses on "Icons of Design" Aug. 18 from 11 a.m. to noon, with an exploration and celebration of the 50-year heritage of Porsche, including the restoration of a classic 1972 Targa. From 4:30 to 5:30 p.m., "The Perfect Match" will feature Sam Cabiglio and

Grant Larson "as they dive into the legacy of the iconic Gulf livery by showcasing a historic multi-race winning prototype and the inspiration behind a one-of-a-kind collaboration."

On Aug. 20 from 11 a.m. to noon, "Driven Ambition," presented by Wheels Up, will showcase "five powerhouse women" who will "share their stories of dream chasing, change making and future shaping," and from 4:30 to 5:30 p.m., "Value in Vintage" will explore the resurgence of vintage culture in autos and art in a "unique discussion of

"There are loads of famous stories about Le Mans," Freeman said, and one of his favorites involves grand prix drivers A.J. Foyt and Dan Gurney, who'd been hired by Ford to race at Le Mans in 1967.

"They were sprint racers — you run as hard as you can" until the race is over, Freeman explained. But in endurance racing, "you want to run fast, but you've got

to keep your car together."

Not inclined toward temperance in driving or much else, "they got together over drinks and decided to run the hell out of it," and that way, after the car broke, they'd be out of the race and could "go relax for the rest of the 24 hours," Freeman said.

"They went at it," he said. "And the car stayed together, and they won. Everyone was absolutely stunned."

Ford is bringing that GT40 — which remains the only car built in the United States to ever win at Le Mans with an all-American team of drivers — to Pebble Beach, according to Freeman.

With its iconic 917s, Porsche won six years in a row, from 1981 to 1986, and during much of the 21st century, so far, Audi has prevailed, with the exception of the Bentley that took the crown in 2003. With the arrival of the hybrid era, Porsche had victories in 2014 to 2017 but then gave way to Toyota, which has won ever since.

'Mixed bag'

All told, Freeman said, 14 notable Le Mans cars will be presented and judged in Pebble Beach on Sunday.

"It's a real mixed bag," he said.

Consider the Cadillacs of storied driver and innovator (and 1958 America's Cup winner) Briggs Cunningham, who was invited to bring two cars to the 1950 Le Mans and chose a Coupe de Ville and a roadster. The coupe stayed stock, but the roadster was "stripped to its bare chassis and, at the hands of a dozen aerodynamicists and metalworkers from nearby Grumman Aircraft, given a streamlined roadster envelope whose mass and imposing appearance earned its French nickname, 'Le Monstre'," John Rogers and Kane Gardner wrote in a history of Cunningham.

"I know a lot about Le Monstre, because I've pushed that thing around Lime Rock," Freeman said, referring to the racetrack not far from his home in Boston. "It's weird, is all I can say."

Ferrari will be represented, including a GTO, and the first two Bentley Speed Sixes to win, nicknamed "Old No. 1" and "Old No. 2," are scheduled to appear.

Just enough car

Old No. 1, incidentally, was almost destroyed in 1932 in a 500-mile race on the first high-bank race-track built in the world in Surrey, England. The driver launched himself and the car off the top of the high bank and over the wall. "He was killed, and the car was basically rolled into a ball," Freeman said. Woolf Barnato, one of the "Bentley Boys" of the 1920s who won three races for the factory team, undertook the Herculean effort of rebuilding the car.

"In subsequent years, the car was sold, and the guy who bought it sued because he said the car had been misrepresented, because basically there's not too much of the original car left," Freeman said. The court ultimately decided there was enough original Old No. 1 in the car for it to be billed and sold as such.

"I'm surprised we have the number of cars we do," Freeman noted, since many of the winners are being raced or displayed in France and elsewhere in Europe, and getting them shipped to the United States during the busy summer season can be tough.

In addition to seeing some of the most important cars in Le Mans history at Pebble Beach Sunday, fortunate aficionados and fans might be able to get into "Le Mans Legends," hosted by the Concours. At 9 a.m. Aug. 19, drivers Jacky Ickx, Tom Kristensen, Lyn St. James, Jochen Mass and Henri Pescarolo will speak at a forum moderated by British racing driver Justin Bell.

had a lot of interest. It could be the greatest thing or it could be, 'What are we going to do next year because it's failed?"

The array of cars that will take the corkscrew uphill includes a 1925 Bugatti Type 35, a 1922 Porsche 911 GT2 RS, and a 1976 Lotus 77 Formula 1 car formerly owned by Mario Andretti. Several Alfa Romeos, Chevy Corvettes, Ford Mustangs and a Tesla are in the field — not to mention a high-powered tractor-trailer driven by Bruce Canepa of Canepa Motorsports in Scotts Valley, who set the world record for large vehicles going up Pike's Peak in Colorado in 2002.

Great views

The movie, "Cars," will be represented by the Hudson Hornet driven by Paul Newman, who did one of the voices for the film.

"It will be quite the show," said Narigi. Similar events are held at the Goodwood Festival of Speed in England and at Pike's Peak, but the format has never been tried in Laguna Seca's 65-year his-

"The grandstand on the straightaway will be a great location to watch" said Narigi. "Up on the outside of the Corkscrew and in the camping area right there, will be great viewing locations. Basically, it's Turns 8, 9, 10 and 11, the straightaway and the start-finish line. There's nothing that really blocks anything."

A practice session starts at 8:15 a.m., and the competition is scheduled to begin at 9:10 a.m. with the first two rounds ending at 11:25 a.m. The final round is at 12:30, wedged between two longer sessions of Pagani Hypercar hot laps.

Said Narigi, "It's time to try something new. I think it will be a big draw, the way it is elsewhere. This year, we are trying to stay within the community. We just want to get some people to this park, to this racetrack, who I think frankly have forgotten about the place."

Free for early birds

In addition to the main event, the raceway will open at 6 a.m. and activities will start at 7 a.m. with a four-hour "Cars & Coffee" — enthusiasts showcasing their cars among the like-minded with a bit of caffeine to fuel the discussions.

Besides the Hillclimb, the raceway will feature several additional activities throughout the day, from a display of LeMans race cars and a Lucid Motors "performance experience." The paddock will be a showcase for many other vintage race cars. Food trucks, beverages and live music will also be offered.

The full day of activities has an early-bird incentive. Admission is free for those arriving between 6 and 7:30 a.m. After that, tickets will be \$35 apiece for adults. Children 15 and younger are free with a paying adult.

Tickets for Sunday's Hillclimb and Party in the Paddock are available at the gate or at WeatherTechRaceway.com.

"Before I became an artist, which was in my teens, I had aspirations to be a car designer, particularly a body stylist, and I often returned to this car as one of the most stunning pieces of automotive design ever," he added. "It is seen here driving around the beautiful 17 Mile Drive towards Pebble Beach, with the Lone Cypress tree looking out to the Pacific Ocean. It also features the owner's incredible 1930 Delage D8 120S roadster by de Villars and the Bugatti Type 35."

Born into a family of car enthusiasts, Layzell was drawing pictures of Bugattis and Alpha Romeos when he was just 3 years old. At 13, he won the British Racing Drivers Club's prestigious Young Motoring Artist Award for his painting of a C Type Jaguar at the 1953 24 Hours

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

also reached the L.L. Bean company, which, I'm told, has a couple of Bootmobiles — like the Oscar Meyer Weinermobile — that tour the country. I'd love to have a Bootmobile at this year's show.

Rare is common at Lemons. Ugly is more common. "I'm a car guy from way back — I attend all kinds of car events, from high-end concours, to auctions, to show-and-shines," he said. "But every year, without exception, somebody shows up with a car I've never heard of ... something I've never seen before. Sometimes they're spectacularly good, sometimes they're spectacularly bad. Sometimes they're both at the same time."

Silly categories, cheap awards

The vehicles compete for awards from The Dollar Store, or somebody's sock drawer, in categories called Rueful Britannia, Needlessly Complex Italian, Der Self-Satisfiedkrauttenwagen, Soul-Sucking Japanese Appliance, Swedish Meatball, Carrozzeria Iacocca and the Ill-Advised Kit Car.

The most prestigious presentations are for Worst in Show, Biggest Loser, Most Dangerous, the Rust Belt American Junk Award, and the highly competitive WTF Award.

Bribes are encouraged by a highly corruptible panel of judges, some with celebrity status, including Wayne Carini, host of the "Chasing Classic Cars" television series, Peter Brock, designer of the Corvette Stingray and Cobra Daytona Coupe, and Formula One driver David Hobbs.

Cars do not have to be operable. Some arrive on trailers, some are pushed onto the grounds, others roll up under their own power, with steaming radiators and smoking tailpipes. An actual rule — created out of necessity — is that anyone who brings a car must leave with a car, even if it isn't their own.

"My photographer just purchased a Volvo P18 station wagon, and he's trying to get it running so he can drive it from Ohio," Galbraith said. "I have advised him against that, because I want him to make it to the show."

A former Worst of Show winner, Mike Harrell, tried and failed to drive his HM Freeway to Seaside from Olympia, Wash., breaking down 10 miles from his home on each attempt.

"Mike keeps threatening to bring his DAF, a 1960s-vintage Dutch-made car, but I doubt that car will make it," Galbraith said.

Highly contagious

Concours d'Lemons originated on the Monterey Peninsula, but now has spread nationally — even internationally — like an acne outbreak on prom night. Versions have sprouted in Michigan, Tennessee, Connecticut, Florida and Australia.

And in 2022, the concept was licensed by Hagerty Insurance, a company specializing in insuring classic automobiles.

"They've bought up our events in Detroit, and Amelia Island in Florida, and the Seaside concours, as well as Gordon McCall's annual hangar party at the Monterey airport, which has been rebranded Motorlux," Galbraith said.

"Hagerty has the social media and client list to reach a much larger audience, and I now have the financial backing to make Concours d'Lemons even bigger and dumber."



The need for services for young people in Monterey County is great, and Montage cited worrying statistics from the California Department of Education showing a large percentage of high school students wrestle with mental health problems.

The foundation in past years has also used proceeds from the charity drawing to support cancer and heart care, scholarships for local residents pursuing healthcare degrees and other programs.

"Since 1961, the Concours d'Elegance has had a longstanding partnership with Community Hospital," Sciuto said. "Today, Montage Health Foundation continues that partnership to raise funds and awareness to strengthen community health."

Much needed

Montage is in the process of building the Ohana Center for Child and Adolescent Behavioral Health, a 55,600-square-foot mental health facility for young people anticipated to open in spring 2023 in Ryan Ranch in Monterey.

Ohana got a major kickstart in early 2018 when philanthropist Bertie Bialek Elliott, sister of famed investor Warren Buffet, donated nearly \$106 million to Montage Health Foundation, an amount that the organization said is one of the "most significant" philanthropic donations to healthcare in the nation.

"A significant portion of the gift will go to an endowment to provide longterm funding for Ohana," Montage said.

In an interview, Elliott noted the lack of facilities for youth mental services.

"It sounded like the kind of project to me that wouldn't happen if there wasn't a big gift to help fund it," she said.

Homework help

Another important local nonprofit, the Boys & Girls Clubs of Monterey County, has served tens of thousands of kids since it was founded in 1968, and is the only county group to do so consistently since then.

Its goal is simple, yet powerful: "Our mission is to inspire and empower the youth of Monterey County to realize their full potential to become responsible, healthy, productive and successful citizens," the group says.

The Boys & Girls Clubs of Monterey County's clubhouses in Salinas and Seaside serve 4,000 Monterey County kids with homework help, health and fitness programs, visual and performing arts and character and leadership development.

The group stands to collect an estimated \$200,000 from proceeds of a \$100-per-ticket Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance charity drawing, the winner of which gets the lease of a 2022 Lexus LC500 convertible for two years, vehicle or air transportation to Monterey, a two-night stay in Pebble Beach with a \$500 spa credit, and golf privileges for two at Pebble Beach Golf Links. Only 2,000 tickets are available.

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

so-called "zipper king's" car was the only one for which coachbuilder Figoni & Falaschi created a body. Above its cyclops headlight is a series of graduated chrome chevrons meant to resemble a zipper. It's slated to be on the show field Sunday, so you can make up your own

Larsen wrote, "Some Grand Sports turned out to be quite competitive and were rallied and raced enthusiastically by their owners. Others were laden considerably with voluptuous bodies. These extravagant creations blunted performance somewhat, but their lascivious beauty more than compensated for these shortcomings."

As Larsen said, the cars aren't just nice to look at they're fast. In fact, one of the Talbot-Lagos you can see this Sunday will be exhibited with other LeMans cars, as it won the legendary race in 1950. In 1952, a different Talbot-Lago was four laps ahead of the next closest car when — heartbreakingly — it had to retire because of mechanical problems in hour 23.

If you haven't figured it out yet, Larsen is like a kid in a candy store when it comes to the brand. It's not his only automotive passion, however. In addition to penning the sold-out two-volume work, "Talbot-Lago Grand Sport: The Car from Paris," (endorsed by Jay Leno as "the bible" on the topic), Larsen has written extensively about coachbuilder Jacques Saoutchik.

He also authored "The Kellner Affair: Matters of Life and Death," about the French luxury car business before, during and after World War II. Among other things, a synopsis of the book said it tells how members of that community "fought bravely against the Nazi occupation force in Paris ... how they formed a resistance group and gathered intelligence, how they were betrayed by double agents, and how they were executed in 1942," including coachbuilder Jacques Kellner and Walter Sleator, director of Rolls-Royce France.



Track officials this year decided to end the Rolex Monterey Motorsports Reunion on Saturday so the races wouldn't conflict with Sunday's Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance, but they couldn't just let Laguna go quiet.







Map of Sales 2020 - Present





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



The space also incorporates the latest high definition smart TVs and video facilities for those that like to watch sports, news, tv shows or movies when they are working up a sweat.













- An already awe-inspiring natural landscape has been enhanced with several pounds of mossy boulders and large floating flagstone steps, a beautiful Japanese zen garden, gracious footpaths and lighting, and a variety of garden plants, ferns, succulents, and grasses. Strategically placed viewing benches are interspersed among the garden paths and coastal trails to remind the observer, to live in the moment and a take it in the beauty of their surroundings it can't get much better than this!
- In the fun mixture of micro climates, one will find large stands of rare native white succulents (Dudleya farinosa), native (Limonium) sea lavender, and various sedums along the coast; several salt-tolerant flowering species such as Hebe's and Ceanothus; and a manicured garden with waterscapes and a Koi pond surrounding the entry. There is also a small greenhouse where orchids and other beautiful plants are grown and displayed.
