Carmel loses inimitable luminary in Denny LeVett

■ Hotel owner, showman was 87

THERE ARE only two types of people in the world: Those who met Denny and remember him, and those who never met him," observed former city councilman Bobby Richards, who worked alongside Denny LeVett for more



Denny LeVett could often be found in one of his collectible cars, impeccably dressed and accompanied by at least a few of his

than 20 years. "Nobody ever says, 'I think I met Denny, but I'm not sure."

LeVett, who died Monday at the age of 87, was just that memorable, whether it be for his real estate prowess, his distinctive way of dressing, his philanthropy, his community spirit, his sometimes bawdy jokes, his extensive col-

lections of cars and guns, or his way of lighting up a room.
"He was Mr. Carmel," said attorney and Carmel resident Tony Lombardo, a longtime friend.

Indeed, the impressions LeVett left on the city are plentiful and deep, from co-owning the historic Cypress Inn with the late actress, Doris Day, and operating several other local boutique inns, to building and renovating numerous homes, playing a large role in the business community, or being involved in city politics supporting many local causes, including animal welfare and children's charities. Many of his friends said they are heartbroken that he's gone.

'Gave his all'

"When he was engaged in something, he gave it his all. He was a person who fully engaged, and that's how he made such a big impact," said Paul Bruno, CFO and principal of Monterey Peninsula Engineering and a member of the Lincoln Club of Northern California, to which LeVett also belonged for many years. "He didn't just lend his name, he lent his brain, his expertise and of course his personality, which made everything fun."

The Lincoln Club is a group that supports limited government and fiscal responsibility, putting it right of center,

State agency to consider county's ADU plan

To COMPLY with a state law that makes it easier to build additional housing on lots where it already exists, Monterey County has loosened its regulations for allowing accessory dwelling units. The state's top coastal watchdog agency, the California Coastal Commission, plans to weigh in on the county's plan Friday in Redondo Beach - and, not surprisingly, some want more oversight for creating such housing while others are happy to have less.

Previously, county rules made it difficult for anyone to build an accessory dwelling unit. According to a coastal commission staff report, they were restricted in "various ways, including through blanket prohibitions, through

large lot requirements, and through numeric caps."

Coastal commission staff, which for decades staunchly opposed most new development along the coast, suggested there was some justification for the county's past stance.

'Resource constraints'

The previous approach was, "in part, due to bona fide resource constraints," the report indicates. "It is also a vestige of a time when ADUs were not seen as the type of development that should be encouraged, unlike today,

Council votes for street addresses

■ 100-year tradition comes to end with unanimous decision

m To}$ A round of applause from the audience, the Carmel City Council made history Tuesday night with a unanimous vote to create a standardized system of street addresses in town. The move comes after decades of debate over whether to maintain the tradition of not having house numbers and followed a citizen group's exhaustive effort to research the issue.

It also marked a profound shift in the tenor of the debate, with hardly anyone arguing in favor of retaining traditional directional addresses and no one on the council objecting, either.

Led by councilman Bob Delves and assisted by administrative analyst Emily Garay, a committee that included residents Nancy Twomey, Kevin Ruess and Paula Hazdovac spent six months researching all aspects of conventional address systems, from whether they're legally required at all, to what it would take to implement one and who'd be responsible for what.

Changing times

When it was settled in the early 1900s, Carmel was sparsely populated, and poetic names on the town's cottages sufficed for those heading to a neighbor's house or having milk delivered. The quirky tradition of solely relying on directional addresses — Camino Real 3 SE of Ocean, for example — persisted as the city and its population grew, and was eventually codified, with the Carmel Municipal Code stating, "Buildings and parcels shall be identified by a description of parcel location relative to the nearest cross-street intersection as determined by the community planning and building department."

And for decades, residents have argued, often strenuously, over whether to hold onto that unique practice or change with the times, especially as demands for verification of physical addresses and the use of technology to do so have increased. At a recent town meeting, for instance, two women sparred over their experiences: One claimed

\$3M home in valley to be used for senior dogs

FOR MORE than a decade, Peace of Mind Dog Rescue has struggled to find property to house senior pets in need of adoption. Recently, the group made an offer on what its leaders determined was "a perfect site" for such a facility at 8 El Caminito in Carmel Valley. The property is in escrow, but will its neighbors accept it?

The move by the group comes more than a decade after Monterey County Planning Commissioner Martha Diehl tried to establish the Carmel Canine Sports Center on 45 acres at 8100 Valley Greens Drive in 2014. The county board of supervisors later turned down the project after residents rallied against it.

Four-legged tenants

The facility that Peace of Mind Dog Rescue wants to establish will be smaller, but homes are located nearby. Slated to be purchased for a little less than its \$3 million asking price, the property features 3,614 square feet of living space and a four-car garage on about a half-acre. It's a short stroll from the shops, galleries and restaurants of Carmel Valley Village.

According to executive director Carie Broecker, the facility would provide 20 senior dogs with "round-theclock care, comfort and companionship."

"The dogs will be in a cage-free environment," she explained. "Somebody will be with them 24/7."

Broecker told The Pine Cone she recently walked through the neighborhood and introduced herself to residents. She said some suggested the group look for a place that's more rural, like Prunedale or Cachagua, but she said

that isn't practical. "We can't be way out in a more rural setting because

STR group to sue over county's new rules

TWO MONTHS after the California Coastal Commission voted 6-2 to approve Monterey County's tough new rules regulating short-term rentals in Big Sur and other parts of the county's Coastal Zone, a group representing the owners of rental units plans to file a lawsuit challenging the regulations.

The rules effectively ban short-term rentals in residential neighborhoods in Carmel Highlands and Big Sur unless a host is living on site.

Under the new rules, unhosted vacation stays are allowed in Pebble Beach, but only with a permit.

Inadvertent

Word of the pending lawsuit spread after the attorney for the Monterey County Vacation Rental Alliance sent out a questionnaire to members in preparation for a lawsuit and inadvertently contacted at least one opponent, who forwarded the correspondence to The Pine Cone.

It's not clear who, specifically, the legal action will target. Alliance president Dick Matthews declined comment but did confirm the group plans to take legal action regarding the new rules in the Coastal Zone.

In the letter he sent out to Alliance

members, attorney Shaun M. Murphy suggested legal action will move forward once the county starts enforcing the new rules. "In preparation for a potential request for a preliminary injunction from the court, we need to gather evidence to demonstrate the hardship that owners would experience if the county elects to enforce the short-term rental restrictions in the new ordinance,' Murphy wrote.

Filed suit last year

In his letter, Murphy asks vacation rental owners in both coastal and inland areas for detailed booking and financial information dating back three years, including how much money they've taken in, how much tax they have paid and how much revenue would be lost due to the new rules.

"What we need is specific information and actual dollar amounts, as opposed to general statements and summaries," he

"The coastal ordinance goes into effect on Oct. 23, so we also need information from coastal STR owners now," he added.

In November 2024, the Alliance sued the Monterey County Board of Supervisors and the county after the supervisors approved a set of ordinances regulating vacation stays in inland areas. The inland rules were passed Aug. 27, 2024, by a 3-2


Defensible space inspections way up

PINE CONE STAFF REPORT

MONTEREY FIRE Department boosted its inspections of homes and vacant lots significantly this year in its efforts to "enhance wildfire resilience," nearly quadrupling its number of visits.

The inspections — in which fire officials examine properties to ensure trees, vegetation, wood piles and other items are well maintained and located a safe distance away from structures — surged from 875

In Carmel alone, the figure rose from 195 in 2024 to 1.065 this year, according to the fire department, while 189 inspections were conducted in Pacific Grove last year, compared with 1,116 this year. The number of Monterey inspections grew from 491 to 1,278.

The gavel falls

Verdicts, pleas and sentencings announced by Monterey County District Attorney Jeannine Pacioni

Aug. 27 — A jury convicted Ira Ulyesses Bastian, 86, who lived most recently in Fresno, of two counts of first-degree murder for killing George Smith and Eva Thompson at The Smith's restaurant in Prunedale on Nov. 11, 1991. The jury found true special-circumstance allegations that Bastian murdered George Smith and Eva Thompson during the commission of a burglary and that he committed multiple murders in the first degree. They further found true allegations that he personally used a knife to kill both victims.

George Smith, then age 67, and his wife Anna Smith owned and lived at The Smith's restaurant, which was located on El Camino Real North in Prunedale, in 1991. Eva Thompson, then age 79, was Anna Smith's mother and also lived with the couple.

On Nov. 11, 1991, Anna Smith returned

home from running errands and discovered that her husband and mother had been brutally murdered. George Smith had been stabbed 11 times with a kitchen knife. Eva Thompson, who was physically disabled and unable to walk, was found slain in her hospital-style bed. She was beaten, strangled, and her throat slit with the same knife used to kill her son-in-law. George Smith's bedroom was ransacked and cash stolen from it. The knife was recovered in a laundry hamper in the restaurant hallway.

Bastian, then age 52, was a former employee of The Smith's restaurant, but he claimed to have not been at the business for more than a year prior to the murders. A pair of shoes provided to investigators by his

Man convicted for attacking officer, K9

A SALINAS man who kicked and punched a police dog and injured a police officer after knocking a convenience store cashier unconscious with a stick was found guilty of the crimes this week after a fiveday trial.

On Monday, a jury convicted Jaime Pompa, 31, for the July for assault with a deadly weapon, resisting an executive officer with force or violence, willfully harming a police animal, and resisting, obstructing or delaying a peace officer.

Beat clerk

Pompa entered the 7-Eleven store on Sanborn Road in Salinas on July 21, grabbed a beer from a refrigerator and began drinking it without paying. The clerk. Jose Antonio Gonzalez, tried to get Pompa to leave the store, but Pompa swung his closed fist at him, nearly striking the cashier's face.

Gonzalez grabbed a 2-foot wooden stick in self-defense, but Pompa disarmed him of the weapon and hit him with it numerous

times, striking Gonzalez's head and knocking him unconscious. The employee had a 2-inch cut to his scalp which required three staples. After the attack, Pompa left the

Fought

Officers with the Salinas Police Department dispatched to the scene searched for and found Pompa, who refused to surrender and instead challenged officers to fight him. Officer Eric Rodriguez released his police dog, Draco, on Pompa so officers could arrest him, but he punched and kicked Draco multiple times, prosecutors said. It's not clear if Draco, who underwent cancer treatment in 2024, suffered any injuries.

When officers went to try to cuff Pompa he fought with them for several minutes before he finally gave up and was taken into custody.

The criminal complaint against Pompa indicates he used force and violence against police officer Samantha Garcia.



Renovation helps homeless pets

A PET-CENTRIC upgrade to a Salinas homeless facility will undoubtedly please some of its residents and their four-legged pals. It could also prompt some people to seek shelter versus staying on the streets.

The Monterey County Board of Supervisors Tuesday OK'd a contract with company K&D Landscaping for a 45-by 12-foot concrete slab that's already been installed in a pet run area at the Salinas Housing Advancement, Resource & Education Center at 845 E. Laurel Drive, which offers temporary housing for more than 100 Monterey County people. The project cost \$40,000.

"These improvements allow for installation of kennels for pets who are staying with their owners at the resource center," a report to the supervisors said.

The center, which previously had four kennels, will have five more, which shelter officials were in the process of installing Wednesday. The enclosures are

weather-resistant, made of "high-quality alloy steel for durability" and have roofs and side covers, the department of social services told The Pine Cone.

Social services expects the project to be completed Friday.

More options

The City of Salinas and Monterey County partnered to build the facility, which opened in 2021 and offers temporary shelter until residents can find long-term housing.

County spokeswoman Maia Carroll said homeless people with pets who need emergency housing sometimes don't accept help because they don't want to leave their animals behind.

The extra kennels "give more options for people in that predicament," Carroll told The Pine Cone Wednesday.

Support, love

Similarly, the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals reported that a 2017 study showed that 48 percent of homeless adults with pets said they'd been turned away from shelters because they did not allow animals. Another study by the National Alliance to End Homelessness indicated that 22 percent of homeless people said they'd avoided shelters because their pets were not allowed to be with them.

"As with housed persons, the companionship, support and unconditional love provided by that pet is invaluable," the

Increase in discarded animals, SPCA says

m T}$ WOULD seem obvious, but SPCA Monterey County is reminding pet owners that dumping animals on the side of the road is not only inhumane, it's illegal in California.

The Salinas nonprofit and Hitchcock Road Animal Services said that there's been an increase in people abandoning their pets, for whatever

"California law explicitly prohibits the abandonment of animals, which can lead to substantial penalties, including fines and criminal charges," the SPCA

explained. "Beyond legal implications, abandoning a pet places the animal in grave danger, exposing them to life-threatening situations such as starvation, injury or death."

Discarded animals also go through intense stress and anxiety when left in unfamiliar environments, further threatening their safetv.

During one week in North Monterey County, Hitchcock Road Animal Services, the county pound, fielded multiple calls for

animals, mostly dogs, abandoned at areas near Old Stage and Crazy Horse roads. It took in several animals from that location safely, however, there were several that couldn't be caught and fled before they could be helped.

> There are much better ways to part ways with pets, the SPCA said.

"We understand that circumstances may arise that make pet ownership challenging," the nonprofit said. "However, help is always available. Before making the heartbreaking and illegal decision to abandon your beloved pet, we encourage you to reach out to local

shelters, rescue organizations, or community resources for assistance. These organizations can provide compassionate support, including options for rehoming, temporary foster care, or financial assistance for pet care."

Both animal welfare organizations take in pets when their owners no longer want them or can't take care of them.

High-tech NPS buoy taps wind, solar

m A}$ 62-FOOT-LONG buoy moored off the Monterey coast is collecting a wide range of data, monitoring surface and undersea domains, and relaying information via cellular networks, according to the Naval Postgraduate School, which built and deployed the buoy in collaboration with Ocean Power Technologies and AT&T. Anchored in 230 feet of water, the buoy is powered by wind and solar and is expected to last at least three years. It's been in the water since July.

"The technologies on the buoy are commercial off-the-shelf systems. When combined, they provide oceanographic and meteorological data and sea-shore communications 24/7, enabling '5G at sea' applications and enhanced maritime domain awareness," NPS said.

'Multi-hop'

The buoy is serving as a demonstration 5G base station that could revolutionize maritime communications, which are typically limited to VHF radio frequencies and expensive satellite communications. It's using AT&T 5G and is equipped with a Starlink antenna.

"Future 5G maritime networks can utilize a 'multi-hop' concept where signals are passed from buoy base stations, one ship to another, and to shore with a data link enabling real-time access to ship systems, weather and navigational updates, and more efficient operations through remote control and automation," the school stated.

Tracking vessels

The buoy and its sensors also allow for real-time tracking of maritime vessels on and under the ocean.

The data it's collecting include meteorological information like wind speed and direction, wind stress and turbulent heat and water vapor, carbon dioxide concentration, air and humidity, sea surface temperature, incoming and outgoing solar radiation, water current speed and direction, water temperature and salinity, and temperatures every meter from 8 meters to the surface. In addition, passive acoustic sensors track tagged great white sharks and other species.

"Study of the sea in support of naval warfighting has always been a focus of NPS to ensure combat advantage 24/7 in





Gov signs safety bill for batteries

Battery Storage facilities in California will have to adhere to stricter safety standards under a bill authored by Democratic State Sen. John Laird and signed this week by the governor.

On Monday, Gov. Gavin Newsom signed several bills authored by Laird, including the Clean Energy Safety Act of 2025 — SB 283 — which requires stricter guidelines for battery storage operations like the one at the Vistra Energy plant in Moss Landing that caught fire in January. The incident destroyed the plant, endangering nearby facilities, filling the air with toxic smoke and forcing about 1,500 people to be evacuated.

"California must prioritize safety at every step when expanding battery storage," Laird said Tuesday. "SB 283 ensures that future battery storage facilities are developed with safety and the community in mind and that our fire officials are involved in every step along the way. I thank Gov. Newsom for signing this bill to

protect first responders, local communities and the integrity of our renewable energy transition."

No more Moss Landings

Earlier, the senator, whose district stretches from Santa Cruz County to San Luis Obispo County, said, "We must take a look at our existing battery storage facilities to make sure we do not experience another Moss Landing."


The legislation, which takes effect Jan. 1, 2026, mandates that at least 30 days before companies submit applications to the California Energy Commission and local jurisdictions for battery storage plants, they must certify that they discussed system design, fire mitigation and risks to safety with fire officials.

It also requires that before a battery plant goes online, it must undergo an inspection by fire authorities or the State Fire Marshal.

The bill states that as part of the next update to the California Building Standards Code, expected in July 2026, the State

Fire Marshal will review and consider provisions that restrict the location of energy storage systems to noncombustible buildings or outdoor installations.

"By strengthening safety standards for battery storage facilities and ensuring local fire authorities have a seat at the table through the meet-and-confer process, this law puts responsibility where it belongs — on the owners and operators of these facilities — and helps prevent disasters before they start," Brian K. Rice, president of California Professional Firefighters, said Tuesday.

BIG CHARGES FOR MAN ARRESTED IN P.G.

A CASTROVILLE man arrested in Pacific Grove in late August on drugs and weapons violations has been charged with seven felonies.

Nolberto Alaniz was taken into custody Aug. 29 after

Pacific Grove Police officers responded to a car crash near Forest and Bishop avenues at 9:45 a.m. While officers were searching Alaniz's car, they found drugs and a loaded gun.

Alaniz is now facing numerous serious charges, including possession of a drug while armed with a loaded and concealed handgun. Police said he had a Glock .380 firearm.

"It is further alleged that during the commission of the offense, Alaniz was not the registered owner of the firearm," according to the Sept. 16 criminal complaint



Sept. 16 criminal complaint filed by the Monterey County District Attorney's Office.

Prosecutors also charged him with possession and transportation of cocaine and prescription medicines clonazepam and diazepam, a generic for Valium, for sale.

"Alaniz did unlawfully possess for sale and purchase for sale a controlled substance, to wit, cocaine," the DA's office said, adding that the type of drugs he had for sale can be laced with the powerful synthetic opioid fentanyl, and if someone "dies as a result of ingesting a fentanyl-laced product, you can be charged with manslaughter or murder."

While Pacific Grove police reported initially that officers found in his possession suspected methamphetamine and psilocybin, which are hallucinogenic mushrooms, the DA's office has not charged him with having those drugs.

Alaniz, who has a previous felony conviction prohibiting him from having firearms, pleaded not guilty to the alleged crimes. His case is set for a Nov. 14 preliminary hearing — when a judge will decide if there is enough evidence to bring him to trial on the charges — in a Salinas courtroom.

Alaniz was treated for injuries he received in the crash and was taken to jail but was released within days.

Denny Le Vett Jan. 15, 1938 - Oct. 6, 2025

It is with profound sadness that we announce the passing of Denny LeVett on October 6, 2025 at the age of 87. Beloved husband, father, grandfather and iconic figure in the hearts and minds of all who knew him, it is a daunting task to capture in mere words the full life of Denny LeVett.

A groundbreaking real estate maven, pilot, author, antiquarian, philanthropist, comedian, trusted political adviser, and so much more, Denny's keen insight led him to early investments in Palo Alto, California, the birthplace of Silicon Valley, and to an elite roster of boutique inns and properties in the storybook village of Carmelby-the-Sea, including a partnership with legendary actress Doris Day in the elegant and dog-friendly Cypress Inn.

Born Dennis Albert LeVett to Frank K. LeVett and Eloise Mayburn LeVett of Iowa Falls, Iowa, Denny discovered what was to become a lifelong passion for collecting guns when he was just nine years old, going on to accumulate the largest collection of Colt Patersons in the world, now featured in major museums across the country; including the Autry Museum of the American West in Los Angeles; and the Buffalo Bill Center of the West, in Cody, Wyoming. His lifelong love of history prompted a lifelong collection of antiques ranging from toy soldiers to vintage comic books. Known by all for his love of the color red, Denny was also very proud of his red Ferrari collection and of the diverse assemblage of vintage cars that he showcased each year during Car Week in Carmel-bythe-Sea, where he was both presenter and namesake of the Dennis A. LeVett 'Best of Show' Award for the annual Concours on the Avenue competition. You could also say that Denny was a collector of jokes. If he heard a funny one, he'd write it down. "Tell us a joke, Denny," and he would whip out his list. Often called upon as a master of ceremonies for public events, he'd act out those jokes in his big booming announcer voice and hold the room spellbound.

Blessed with unmatched entrepreneurial spirit and tenacity, Denny went on to amass a real estate empire that stretched from lowa to California to Lake Maggiore, Italy; including apartment buildings, commercial structures, boutique hotels and inns such as the Cypress Inn, Vagabond Inn, Lamplighter Inn, Monte Verde Inn, and Casa de Carmel Inn in Carmelby-the-Sea; the Benbow Inn in Garberville; the Laning Chateau in Palo Alto; and homes he designed and built from the ground up that remain a testament to his vision. Of their 32year partnership in Carmel's Cypress Inn, Doris Day has called it "the longest relationship I have had with any man!" Indeed, when Denny, as sole owner of Carmel's Cypress Inn agreed to partner with Doris Day in 1987, it helped put it on the map. The Mediterranean inspired hotel, designated a historic landmark in 2003, is a mainstay for both tourists and locals alike, beloved for the timeless elegance of its architecture, its cozy living room featuring live music, and its dog-friendly approach; complete with Yappy Hour and Doggie Bar.

A philanthropist to the core, Denny's generous donations to museums, charities, civic causes, and most especially, animal welfare, are renowned in his community, for although a collector of guns, Denny's big heart made it difficult for him to hunt game for food or sport.

In 2016, the Dennis A. LeVett Cardiovascular Care Center was unveiled as a result of his generous donation to the Palo Alto Medical Center. Over his lifetime, Denny has been the recipient of numerous awards and honors, too countless to remunerate. He has also served as President of the Lincoln Club of Northern California, and as Chairman, Trustee, and member of many distinguished advisory boards and councils.

And let's not forget Denny "the pilot" – whose ardent passion for aviation has afforded him more flying adventures in his plucky Skymaster, Cessna 182, and favored Cessna 414 Chancellor than the Wright Brothers!

If you are lucky enough to live in Carmel-bythe-Sea, then you may have been lucky enough to see Denny LeVett walking down the street, always dressed meticulously, maybe in the pink suit he chose that day with a yellow tie and matching satin handkerchief, placed carefully in his chest pocket.

Denny is predeceased by his younger brother Bill; his parents Frank and Eloise; and his Grandparents A.J. and Marie Strutz, the former a tremendous influence on the course of his life. He is survived by his wife, Jeanne Cox LeVett; his daughters, Amanda and Kate; his son-in-law, Casey Crayne; grandchildren, Liam, Henry, and Camille; and the children of his late wife Karen, Barbara Rowe and Aime Carroll. He is also survived by his four poodles, Hyden, Strutz, Bear and Cotton, whom he loved like family.

As for traffic, Broecker noted that a consultant did a study "which found that we would have very little impact" on it.

The property is zoned for a dog kennel, she said, but "escrow is contingent on us getting our use permit." She reported that the previous owner has given the group "many months" to sort any issues that might arise with the county or neighbors.

According to Broecker, the group's permit "is under review," and no hearing has

EVER SINCE Leidig/Draper Properties excavated the 16,000-square-foot property at Dolores and Fifth and then abandoned the project in 2019, its neighbors — the Carmel Foundation's Haseltine Court senior housing complex to the west and the Carmel Art Association to the south — have suffered cracking, sagging and other problems.

No one has accepted blame for the damage, however, and after years of unsuccessful efforts to get the former owner/developers, the former contractors and/or their insurance companies to cover repairs, both nonprofits have resorted to spending their own funds on the necessary work.

The Carmel Art Association announced this week it needs to raise \$400,000 to shore up its building — which was built by M.J. Murphy and is historic, according to artist and CAA member Joaquin Turner — and fix its sagging floors and cracking walls and ceiling.

Soil study

A January 2020 study by a soil engineering consultant, GeoForensics Inc., concluded the work in The Pit caused the damage on the northern side of the gallery, including sagging of as much as 2 inches. The art association blames the driving of pilings into the ground next to its building and says the contractor dug holes underneath its foundation.

"We have been ignored for seven years," Turner said this week, including by public officials who declined to visit the site at all or promised to help and then failed to follow through. "We haven't been able to get anywhere with the city, anywhere with the developer or anywhere with the developer's insurance company. They aren't even acknowledging us anymore."

Jeff Becom, the association board's president, said Leidig/Draper "made it extremely clear they were not going to take responsibility unless they were forced to," and that suing wasn't an option for the nonprofit, given its limited resources and no assurance of a positive outcome.

Pull the trigger

He also said a person working for Patrice Pastor, who purchased the property for \$9 million in March 2020, initially said the new owner would stabilize the association's building while undertaking shoring work at that side of The Pit, but those plans evaporated after that person left Esperanza Carmel and it took three years to get plans for Pastor's project, a mixed-use complex called Ulrika Plaza, approved by the city.

Every time there's been a reason for hope, new CAA member Polly Osborne said, fixes have been put off in anticipation of assistance, only to have the offer fall through. But further delays will only worsen the problems and drive costs up as materials and labor get more expensive, so the association has decided to pull the trigger.

The association had a soil engineer and a contractor draw up plans for shoring up the gallery and has them

the ambulance always has trouble finding her home, while the other insisted it never has when responding to hers.

Emergency responders rely on technology to get them to the right location as quickly as possible, financial institutions and government agencies run addresses through globally accepted systems to verify people's physical locations, and delivery companies use technology, too, when figuring out where to drop packages. More and more, residents and business owners have encountered problems when trying to use their directional addresses to accomplish everything from directing firefighters to their homes, to obtaining insurance, setting up utilities and getting medications delivered.

Thousands of communities and millions of people solely receive mail at post offices — so that doesn't make Carmel special, Delves said — but they also have

universally recognized physical addresses that are verifiable via the U.S. Postal Service's address management system, which Carmel doesn't. That's unique.

"The U.S. Postal Service manages the address management system, the national safe source for address verification, and our traditional numbering system is not compliant with AMS," he said, and because of that, most of the technology that uses that system "ignores you."

Not legal

It's also not legal, the group confirmed. City attorney Brian Pierik reiterated that the directional system also doesn't comply with various state codes, and public safety officials reported that not having house numbers adds anywhere from 30 seconds to three minutes to response times during emergencies.

After running various iterations of directional addresses past the postal service and learning the AMS would accept none of them, Ruess developed a prototype system for numbering houses, complexes and commercial buildings that the USPS said would, according to Delves. Numbers would be assigned starting on the northern and western edges of the city and run from single digits to four digits.

Delves said he conferred with the utility companies and came away with "a high degree of confidence" they will embrace a standardized system and will do their part to

Monterey County and the USPS are the principal entities that will be involved in implementing a new system,

according to Delves, with the county updating its GIS map, tax and assessment records, voter registration and other critical data.

Traditions that would be preserved, he said, include mail delivery to P.O. boxes and the post office maintaining the status quo, as well as free boxes for property owners and no need to change billing addresses.

Concerns include costs, effort and enforcement

Assigning numbers, meanwhile, will provide AMS-compatible addresses for deliveries and emergency responders and will require the installation of 4-inch-tall digits visible from the street — though homeowners can choose their designs and placements — and integration into Google and other maps and databases.

It will also mean eliminating the obsolete language in the municipal code via adoption of an ordinance. The transition could be completed by the end of June 2026, Delves

Following workshops in late August and early September that were attended by dozens of residents, Delves said common questions involved costs, the level of effort required by residents, and enforcement.

He said he doubts the costs would be significant and that it will be up to individuals to determine which entities they deal with should be advised of the change. Insurance companies, for instance, would want to know, while Netflix probably won't care.

As for enforcement, education and outreach will generate compliance and some level of uniformity, Delves speculated, and he doubted anyone would be going around measuring numbers to make sure they're the proper dimensions.

Councilwoman Alissandra Dramov asked how Google maps will incorporate the data, and while Delves said the app sweeps the internet regularly to update addresses, a local contact found by Ruess could make it happen more

"And then they can call Apple maps and say, 'We're ahead of you," he joked.

After Delves' presentation, members of the committee spoke, including Twomey, who had been a proponent of maintaining the status quo when it came to addresses.

"But I also hear the issues and have experienced some of the issues with our home," she said. "I am sensitive to the challenges. I also knew I wanted to be part of the solution."

While she appreciates the town's traditions, increasing reliance on technology and the impacts on emergency response are driving the need for conventional street addresses, she said.

"It was essential for me personally to understand what's involved in implementing this, who the stakeholders are, what we need to do and what the city needs to do,"

And now, armed with all that information and knowledge, Twomey noted, the council can make an informed decision, and the city and its residents "shouldn't pick what laws we respect and what laws we don't."

"If you move forward, you've got my vote, big time," she said, adding that the way people can honor tradition is by naming their homes, as many have done, and retaining those names.

Widespread support

Several members of the public thanked the committee for its efforts and comprehensive research and said they support the change.

"I appreciate your thoroughness, your openness and your willingness to change your mind," former councilwoman and house-number proponent Karen Ferlito

For public safety and other reasons, resident Connie Hess said, "I encourage you to vote for numbers on our houses that can be verified.

Fire captain and paramedic Nate Smith, who lives on Torres Street and recently won the right to put a metal roof on his house, said he always jokes that "there are two things that firefighters dislike equally: the way things are, and change."

"My guess is our little town feels similarly," he said, but making it easier for rescuers to find the right home as quickly as possible is critical.

Two speakers opposed the change, including Dan Zeller, who said he's worried about "unintended consequences" and speculated, despite assurances to the contrary, that adding house numbers could lead to home mail delivery and the closure of the downtown post office.

Of the 10 emails sent on the topic, only Zeller's was in opposition.

Councilwoman Alissandra Dramov said she, too, was swayed by the committee's findings, and while she's loyal to the mission of preserving the village's charm, "in this case, that's not enough.

When they want to

The city must comply with the law, Dramov acknowledged, and she encouraged people to continue using their directional addresses when they want to, such as when receiving deliveries from local businesses that are familiar with them, and to name their houses.

"While I hoped we could find some compromise for keeping the traditional system, the reality is we can't," she said. "I am on board."

Councilman Jeff Baron, who has long advocated for house numbers, said the council should offer residents the opportunity to weigh in on how house numbers will be assigned and said a lot of outreach and education should be undertaken before the change is implemented.

"A hallmark of Carmel is we've never felt the need to do things another way just because others were doing it," councilman Hans Buder said. Nonetheless, "its time has come."

"I just think we need to do this," Delves agreed.

Mayor Dale Byrne did not comment, but the vote in favor of a resolution "directing staff to return to council with a comprehensive street address program that includes a process to begin implementation of an address identification system and an ordinance repealing relevant city municipal code sections" was unanimous.

more seats in Congress during the 2026 mid-term elections.

If approved California's new map would be in place for the 2026, 2028 and 2030 congressional elections.

Voters took the power to draw maps away from politicians in 2008 and 2010 when they amended the state constitution

with ballot measures establishing an independent commission — with members evenly divided between Democrats and Republicans — to draw political boundaries.

Flipping the script

Prop 50 has forced members of both parties to flip their recent positions on redistricting. California Democrats were adamantly opposed to Proposition 11, the measure that created the current redistricting process in the state. Since then, they've come around to the idea of the independent commission, authoring numerous pieces of legislation to make it more powerful.

Meanwhile Republicans, who originally embraced Prop 11, have become less enamored with the independent process in recent years. Over the last decade, lawmakers

Republicans opposed all 10 bills related to the commission in the state legislature. In July a piece of legislation came up requiring Merced County to adopt an independent redistricting commission to draw the lines for its supervisor districts. Republicans didn't like it.

"If they think gerrymandering is going away with independent redistricting committees, that's not happening," said Riverside Republican Kelly Seyarto during a hearing ahead of the bill's

The vote came down along party lines, with Democrats in favor and every Republican recording a no vote, or not voting at

The Merced bill required the composition of the commission to reflect voter registration in the county, which is 40 percent Democratic and 30 percent Republican, rather than requiring equal representation. But it is not the only example of Republicans rejecting the independent commission for legislative districts.

'How convenient'

In 2023, Los Angeles Democrat Isaac Bryan introduced a bill to require local government entities in large cities and counties to adopt independent commissions; it, too, passed along party lines, a fact Bryan brought up on the assembly floor ahead of the vote to put Prop 50 on

"Every Republican in this House voted

against it. How convenient to switch your tone when you are now on the line," said the Los Angeles Democrat.

But Bryan is a prime example of the pot calling the kettle black. The lawmaker, who once espoused the virtues of independent commissions, is now one of the most visi-

ble proponents asking voters to override the non-partisan process this November.

Dem solidarity

Democrats, who pushed independent commissions in the past, insist Prop 50 is essential to checking President Donald Trump's power. So powerful is their lockstep, key voices in the cam-

paign to protect the power of the citizens have been talked into changing their tune.

Common Cause, which calls itself a 'pro-democracy" organization, was one of the biggest backers of the 2008 and 2010 measures that created the California independent redistricting commission, and was quick to denounce Gov. Gavin Newsom's partisan proposition when he unveiled it this summer. The group even held press conferences criticizing gerrymandering efforts in both California and Texas, but has since reversed course, opining that California's Democratic Party efforts are OK, but a similar push by Texas Republican isn't. How handy.

The League of Women Voters also got themselves turned around on the issue. Following Newsom's proposal to put redistricting on the ballot, the League released a statement calling California's independent commission the "gold standard." The organization's president, Gloria Chun Hoo, also wrote a sharply worded op-ed in the Sacramento Bee criticizing Newsom's plan.

"At a time when Americans already



have a deep mistrust of government, the last thing Californians need is a return to the days of backroom redistricting deals and political gamesmanship," Hoo wrote at the end of July.

But just a week later, the organization formally declined to take a position on Prop 50, citing the need to align with other chapters of its organization.

Days later the league filed suit in Texas over unfair maps and followed up with a federal lawsuit in September. It has made no legal claims in California, however.

Campaign spending

Prop 50 is already the third most expensive ballot measure in California history, with the campaigns supporting and opposing it having raised \$215 million. The war chest for Yes on 50 is the larger one by far.

Newsom has managed to raise \$138 million, with about 40 percent of it coming from small donors giving less than \$100. Most of the small contributions are coming through the House Majority PAC, a Democratic organization that fundraises for congressional races. Half of those donors are from outside of California, showing just how important the race is to national politics.

Other big donors to the Yes campaign include billionaire George Soros' Fund for Policy Reform, MoveOn. org, The California Teachers Association and the National Education Association. Newsom also transferred \$2.6 million he raised for his 2022 gubernatorial campaign into the Yes on 50 bank account.

No on 50 has raised about \$77 million, most of it coming from two big sources. The Congressional Leadership Fund, a Republican Congressional Super Pac, gave \$42 million and Charles Munger Jr., a supporter of the original ballot measure to create the independent redistricting commission, gave \$33 million.

Polling on Prop 50

The political landscape in California has shifted this year, taking a baby step to the right. Since February, the Republican party has gained 48,000 new voter registrations, while just 190 voters became registered Democrats. A far larger group of people, 82,000, switched to no party preference in 2025, signaling a shift away from partisan politics altogether.

Despite the changes in registration numbers, 45 percent of voters remain registered Democrats in the state, giving

the Yes on Prop 50 an edge.

A Cook Political Report poll last week showed 50 percent of California voters were in favor while 35 percent were opposed to the measure.

Similar findings came out of other recent polls, including one from Emerson College with 51 percent of voters supporting Prop 50, and another from co/efficient showing 54 percent of voters in favor. The measure requires a simple majority to pass.

Anti-Trump fervor is running high in California and the Yes on 50 campaign is being run as a referendum on the President, rather than focusing on the new map and the implications of undermining the power of citizens. No matter how you look at it, Prop 50 is an issue of fairness. Supporters say it's a defense of democracy while those against it argue two wrongs don't make a right. In the end it will be up to Californians to decide which side is fairest of them all

Maybe the drivers were cat people?

SERVICE ANIMALS seem to be everywhere these days — coffee shops, concerts and even grocery stores. But a Monterey County disabled man claims in a new lawsuit that a driver for a major rideshare company kicked him out of a vehicle mid-ride because he had a dog with him.

James Marshall Isbell alleges in an Oct. 2 lawsuit that he booked vehicle trips from rideshare giant Lyft through company Callthe-Car to go to his medical appointments and that during each request he informed Call-the-Car — which he also names as a defendant — that he would have his service animal, Nina, with him. Each time, though, Isbell said the Lyft drivers refused to take the pooch.

Kicked out mid-ride

"On at least one occasion, Isbell was kicked out of a vehicle mid-ride and left stranded in a public location" after the driver saw that a dog would be riding along, according to the complaint, which adds that he missed medical appointments because he was denied service.

Isbell said Lyft refused more than once to accept the dog.

Lyft "repeatedly denied transportation services to Isbell on at least four separate occasions in 2025, and potentially more, solely because he was accompanied by Nina," according to his lawsuit filed in Monterey County Superior Court.

Isbell said he suffers from several disabilities, including post-traumatic stress disorder, severe migraines, brain injury, and a "severe debilitating mental impairment." His disabilities substantially limit life activities, "including concentrating, thinking, sleeping, caring for himself, working, learning and the operation of major bodily functions, including neurological and brain function."

He suggested Nina has helped him by detecting signs of anxiety and PTSD episodes, recognizing when he is trembling and shaking, redirecting his thoughts and snapping him out of PTSD flashbacks.

Furthermore, Isbell said his dog is trained to "retrieve emergency medication when Isbell is experiencing migraines and provide therapy and grounding."

Isbell claims both companies trampled on his civil rights under California law because they violated the federal Americans with Disabilities Act by refusing to take him and his service dog.

CHOMP doc's vaccine reminders

WHILE YOU'RE dusting off the ceramic pumpkins and digging out the turkey platter, don't neglect another important preparation for autumn.

Dr. Martha Blum, medical director for infection prevention at Montage Health and Community Hospital, is urging locals to take precautions as cold and flu season approaches. As winter weather arrives and people move indoors, viruses like the flu, Covid, and RSV spread more easily. But, Blum said, "While most of us will get a respiratory illness at some point, the good news is that we're not powerless,"

Safe, effective and free

"Vaccines won't guarantee you won't get sick, but they're your best bet at avoiding severe illness, long recoveries, and hospital visits. They're safe, widely available, and often free," she noted.

Her recommendations include:

- Flu shots are for everyone 6 months and older, and should be done annually. Blum said that early fall ideally September or October is the best time to get
- Those 65 or older, or who have a chronic health condition, should get an updated Covid vaccine. Others may be eligible, too Blum recommends checking with your doctor, especially if it's been more than six months since your last dose. She noted that, while Covid doesn't have a "season," updated vaccines have often been released in the fall.

- People 75 and older, or between 60 and 74 with certain medical conditions and those who are pregnant may qualify for the RSV vaccine. That season picks up in late fall, Blum said.
- Pneumococcal vaccines protect against pneumonia, which often follows viral infections. Adults 50 and older as well as younger adults with chronic conditions should discuss this with their doctor.

Common sense

"Getting vaccinated is a smart move for your own health, and it also helps protect the people around you, especially babies, older adults and those with weakened immune systems," Blum noted.

She reiterated that regular hand-washing — or, in a pinch, using sanitizer — wearing a mask to protect yourself and others, allowing a little extra personal distance from people, and taking steps to remain healthy, like getting enough sleep, eating well and exercising, can all help keep you well.

Improving indoor airflow by cracking a window, running a fan or using an air purifier can also be useful.

"Viruses love stuffy air," Blum said.

Finally, stay home when you're sick. If you have symptoms like high fever, chills, body aches, fatigue, sore throat, and a cough, you should get tested for Covid. Antiviral medications are available and work best when taken early.

Blum said to try to rest, stay hydrated, and avoid contact with others until you've been fever-free for at least 24 hours.



Editorial

Give it time

THE NO-GROWTH movement in California may have come to a well deserved end, but some of its most useful tools are still kicking around.

One of those is the transparently phony tactic of pretending a building is historic, not to protect something that actually is, but to attain a selfish political goal.

That's exactly what happened to cartoonist Gus Arriola. For months back in 2001, his name was bandied about by Carmel's zealous preservationists. His long-running comic strip, Gordo, was such a ground-breaking achievement of American culture, the preservationists said, and his insights into the trials and triumphs of Mexican immigrants were so important to the formation of 21st century California culture, that a home he lived in for 11 years could not be altered or torn down, despite the wishes of the family that owned it long after Arriola had moved on.

Never mind that the decrepit home had been declared unfit for human habitation. Never mind that it was an ugly eyesore detested by its neighbors. Because of Arriola's genius, it had to be protected, the zealots cried.

But then a major problem cropped up with their campaign. Gus Arriola was still alive, and as soon as he got wind of them campaign to block changes to his former home, he spoke up to say that throughout their campaign — from the planning commission to the city council to the California Coastal Commission to the state office of historic preservation — nobody seeking to protect Arriola's old home went to the trouble of asking him about the house, his life, his work, or anything.

It must have been a very strange feeling to have your creative accomplishments cited as the justification for turning your former home into a shrine by people who didn't actually have any interest in you or what you thought.

And when Arriola did speak out about the home he lived in from 1959 to 1970, he said it wasn't particularly important in his life, had nothing to do with his work or the development of his famous comic strip, and should not be turned into a government-protected "historic resource" because of him. While he was very proud of his work, he completely disavowed the idea that the old home at Camino Real and 13th was historic, and he said the people who owned it in 2001 should be allowed to demolish it if they wanted to.

Nevertheless, the supposedly revered man's views about his own life were ignored by numerous high level officials. Prodded by Carmel's band of preservation activists, the coastal commission decided that the home must not be torn down, and the State Office of Historic preservation agreed. However, based on the Arriola's irrefutable testimony about his own life, the city planning commission decided the old home could be demolished, which it was in late 2001.

We always thought this type of ridiculous situation was an only-in-Carmel type of thing. But novelist Philip Roth, it turned out, ran into something similar with an article on Wikipedia about his 2000 novel, "The Human Stain."

In 2012, Roth said he discovered a "serious misstatement" about one of his books on the internet encyclopedia, where an article claimed Roth's book was inspired by the life of a writer and literary critic named Anatole Broyard. Roth said this was not true. "The Human Stain" was actually inspired, Roth said, by his friend Melvin Tumin, a professor at Princeton.

According to an article Roth penned in The New Yorker in September 2012, the false claim "entered Wikipedia not from the world of truthfulness but from the babble of literary gossip — there is no truth in it at all." Nevertheless, when he contacted Wikipedia, a site admin responded that he, Roth, "was not a credible source" on his own work — and told him to find a secondary source.

"I understand your point that the author is the greatest authority on their work," a Wikipedia administrator told the author — "but we require secondary sources."

For years afterward, Wikipedia continued to claim to know whose life inspired Roth's novel, regardless of what he said.

Carmel may have taken more than a year to come to its senses about the preservationists who wanted to protect Gus Arriola's home, but it took Wikipedia more than two decades to take Roth's word for what his own book was about.

The lesson from all of this is that if you're going to lie about somebody, it's better if you wait until they're dead.

Who is in charge? Dear Editor,

The Pine Cone has recently published a couple of informative editorials regarding the city's vague rules on development. This subjective enforcement of these rules has hurt all of us, if not directly.

There have been many articles on Patrice Pastor and how's been forced to deal with these vague rules. They have been painful to read, and I hope that one day he succeeds.

But the problem of vague rules is not limited to Carmel. If we need to crown a champion of vague rules, it would be the California Environmental Quality Act. She is Medusa, and every snake head has a mind of its own.

After the disastrous fire in Los Angeles, executive orders were introduced to expedite the rebuilding of people's homes and their lives. CEQA restrictions were standing in the way of the permitting

process.

Fire experts reported that one of the contributors to the fire's rapid spread was failure to reduce the dead wood and underbrush on the surrounding hillsides. CEQA restrictions had prevented this fuel reduction for many years.

With this information, Gov. Gavin Newson issued an emergency executive order bypassing the CEQA restrictions, allowing fuel reduction mitigation to move forward. Not just in L.A., but throughout the state

My neighbor is planning on a complete teardown of his existing home, not just a remodel, and building a new one on that property. Monterey County has determined that CEQA requirements can be waived, and the permits are in the works. It looks like the governor's orders are working!

However, on an adjacent property, there are grants approved for removal of dead wood and underbrush for fuel reduction. There are water pumps, tanks and other infrastructure in the area. Our Firewise chapter in Carmel Valley has been working with Monterey County Regional Fire on these fuel mitigation grants. We are into our third year of delays due to CEQA's vague rules and regulations, inspections, and attorneys. The fire hazard remains.

Carmel Valley Firewise groups know that a fire is in our future and wonder if we will be doing cleanup before — or after.

With that in mind, one must ask the question: "CEQA, who is in charge?"

Measuring success in city government

THE PURPOSE of city government is simple: to make daily life work in ways that are safe, fair and forward-looking. It's not about hours in meetings or the number of reports we generate. Success is measured by results residents can see, feel and trust. In Carmel, it's also about protecting what makes our village unique.

This week's city council meetings showed what that looks like. Thanks to the efforts of a highly effective workgroup, we directed staff to craft a plan for numbered street addresses. This will improve public safety and help first responders reach the right place faster while also making daily life more convenient. We allocated part of the water district's increased supply so

residents can advance projects that require additional water credits. We also approved consulting work to help adopt objective design and development standards which will safeguard neighborhood character while meeting state law.

■ Forestry and the firehouse

Beyond that, we invested in forestry equipment to keep our urban forest and our crews safe. A modification to our fire-house required for our new fire engine was approved, and we added project management services to keep pace with our ambitious capital program.

Some decisions were challenging, some

How moving here led to toting a camera through the Andes

WHILE MOST of the rest of us sank slothfully into our sofas, TV remotes in hand, Carmel resident Thomas Hierl, 72, his wife, Karyn, and their 35-year-old son, Alex, spent part of their summer in Peru's Andes Mountains, hiking the 26-mile Inca Trail to Machu Picchu.

The magnificent images he breathlessly captured while ascending 8,200 feet above sea level were well worth the four-day, mostly uphill trudge for Hierl, a fine-art photographer.

The Lost City of the Incas — as Machu Picchu is sometimes called — a 15th-century citadel, is celebrated as one of the most iconic symbols of Incan civilization and is believed to have served as an estate for Incan emperor Pachacuti.

"But I'm not going to book that trip again next year," Hierl guaranteed with a grin. "You're going up and down steps for four days, and the elevation made that very tough."

For Hierl, an avid hiker and backpacker, the search for breathtaking vistas in sometimes in hard-to-reach locations has been a quix-otic quest since 2011, when

he retired from a career in the semiconductor industry.

Moonscape

One of those images is part of an exhibition that continues through Oct. 30 at Pacific Grove Art Center (568 Lighthouse Ave.), featuring the work of 50 members of ImageMakers of Monterey.

"It's a photo of a place near Hanksville, Utah, they call the Moonscape Overlook," he said of his photo of a woman standing on a ledge that towers over a barren, greyand brown-colored badlands known as Skyline Ridge. "The drop from that spot is several thousand feet, and it looks like the moon.

"I got up really early to catch the morning light, saw that overlook, and thought, "Wow, it would be really great for the photo if somebody was standing out there," remembered Hierl, who isn't fond

of heights. "Then a van pulled up, two young women said, "Good morning," to me, and one of them scampered out there. Problem solved!"

Otherworldly vistas

During the same camping trip, Hierl took his four-wheel-drive camper truck 10 miles off the paved road into the Bentonite Hills to capture a drone shot of the colorful, otherworldly landscape near a place known as the Mars Desert Research Station.

The location was chosen because the area closely resembles the surface of Mars. Research crews at the station are typically a mix of scientists, astronomers, physicists, biologists, geologists and engineers.

"The colors there are amazing, and they're all natural," Hierl said. "I've been experimenting with a drone just to get abstract pictures like that one."

He captured intimate shots of a grizzly feasting on salmon in a stream at Alaska's Katmai National Park.

The most beautiful place he's photographed, said Hierl, might be Norway's Fulton Islands, a spot he visited with Karyn in March. He was also beguiled by the scenery in Iceland.

Hierl was raised in New Jersey and shot his first photos as a 7-year-old during a vacation in Yosemite Valley.

As a high school student, he took pictures for the school newspaper and year-

book, processing them in a darkroom he put together in the family's basement.

He earned an electrical engineering degree from Cornell University and spent his career in the semiconductor industry.

Hierl and Karyn met 40 years ago as members of a bicycling club.

"I scheduled a Saturday event that I called 'Tom's Surprise Ride,' because I didn't know where I was going yet," he remembered. "She showed up for that, so, turns out she was 'Tom's Surprise." Karyn homeschooled all three kids.

Their son, Alex, earned an English degree from Santa Clara University and intended to become a journalist, but he changed plans after a family vacation to Costa Rica enticed him to



its executive director, Megan Range, said. When LeVett was nominated to be the organization's chairman in 1999, he flew home from a visit to China, accepted the honor and then flew back, Bruno recalled. He served as chairman from 1999 to 2001.

'Devoted member'


"As our chairman and a devoted member, Denny inspired generations of local candidates and elected officials. Ask our members what they'll remember most, and they'll say his wicked sense of humor — jokes that stayed with you long after he told them," Range said. "We will miss his counsel, his kindness and that unmistakable, genuine laugh."

Former Monterey County Bank CEO Charles Chrietzberg enjoyed a 40-plus-year friendship and business relationship with LeVett, whom he first encountered as a member of the Sheriff's Advisory Council.

"He's one of the shrewdest real estate investors I've ever met, and I've met a lot, between Texas and here," he said. "He had a knack for locating a property and visualizing what he could do with it to make it better.'

Indeed, while he had intended to become a commercial pilot, LeVett was led to real estate by a professor at

the University of the Pacific in Stockton, according to Richards. And he was good at it. Starting in Palo Alto, LeVett "bought one house, sold it, bought two, sold those, bought four," and so on, going on to create an empire that included numerous residential and commercial properties in Palo Alto, in his home state of Iowa — he was born in Iowa Falls — in Carmel, and even in Italy.

"Denny once told me that he regretted every piece of property he ever sold, but the truth is that people who bought his homes knew they were getting quality construction at fair prices," commented attorney and former councilman Gerard Rose, who met him when LeVett and business partner Chris Tescher brought a development proposal to the city in the 1980s. "And Denny made it his practice to work with neighbors to make sure that everyone's needs were met without taking negative advantage of the privacy of adjoining lots."

Inn swap

LeVett discovered Carmel after acquiring the Benbow Inn in the Humboldt County community of Garberville. He began visiting the Monterey Peninsula and would stay at the Vagabond House at Dolores and Fourth. The then-owner of the Carmel hotel would visit the Benbow, in turn, and each loved the other's property so much that they arranged a swap, according to Richards.

"That was his first deal here," Richards said. Forms in the city's property files link LeVett to the Vagabond House starting in 1979.

"After he got the Vagabond, he fell in love with Carmel," Lombardo said. But LeVett was especially fond of the Cypress Inn, which he bought in 1986 with Doug Dusenbury, Ben Heinrich and Dick Albers. Two years later, Day and her son, Terry Melcher, became his new partners in the inn, which LeVett said he'd loved since seeing an ad on the back of a Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance program 15 or 20 years earlier.

They made it a haven for locals, visitors — and their dogs — and their partnership lasted until Day's death in 2019. LeVett was often found dining with friends or doing business at one of the tables there in Terry's Lounge.

"That was his special place," Lombardo said. "He said

Doris Day told him he was the only man she'd been partners with who hadn't stolen from her."

Rose said LeVett "promised that the Cypress Inn would always reflect his family's fervent interest in retaining the hotel as a place that was animal-friendly and a place that made locals as well tourists feel at home in our village."

It was while working at the Cypress Inn as a part-time bartender that Richards met LeVett in the late 1990s. Richards had been caring for his mother, who was living in a nearby convalescent home, and after she died, he told LeVett during a lunch at the Beach Club in Pebble Beach that he was planning to quit and move away.

"He threw his drink down and said, 'That's the stupidest thing you've ever said. Why would you ever leave this place?" Richards recalled. He explained he wanted to get back into real estate somewhere more affordable, and LeVett countered with an offer Richards couldn't refuse. "He said, 'I want you to manage all my properties."

Richards was in. They went on to buy a hotel together and partnered in residential deals, growing closer all the while. While exploring opportunities, they also traveled - Richards recalled walking through an Iowa Walmart with his impeccably attired mentor, and on another occasion making a stop at Taco Bell while driving through Palo Alto in LeVett's Bentley.

"He was my boss, he was my friend, he was my mentor, he was my partner, but we never ever had a fight. I respected him totally," Richards said. If he disagreed with one of LeVett's ideas, he'd object twice — and then do as LeVett said, which almost always turned out to be the right decision.

'Unique and inspiring'

Pine Cone publisher Paul Miller recalled that in 1996, when he was trying to make up his mind whether to buy the newspaper, LeVett was one of the few who told him to go for it.

"He knew how important good journalism could be to the town, and he was very encouraging and supportive, and he remained an irreplaceable friend to me and The Pine Cone until the day he died," Miller said. "Sometimes he'd get a little hot under the collar about something going on at city hall or something that was in the newspaper, and he'd never hesitate to let me know, but it was always good natured. He was unique and inspiring."

LeVett embraced the courage of his convictions and occasionally offered impassioned testimony at city hall, including in defense of Car Week events. A devoted collector — including a selection of red Ferraris — LeVett was a huge proponent of the former Concours on the Avenue, which named its Best of Show award after him.

"He was so comfortable and he took such pride in the way he dressed and his uniqueness — not everybody could get away with that," Richards said. "I loved the way he was always the life of the party, he was gracious about it, he knew it, but he was still humble in a way. He was wonderful."

His appreciation of history prompted LeVett to amass vintage comic books, toy soldiers, and guns, which he began collecting at the age of 9. He went on to compile the world's largest collection of Colt Paterson revolvers, which are exhibited at the Autry Museum of the American West in Los Angeles and the Buffalo Bill Center of the West, in Cody, Wyo.

Richards had the pleasure of accompanying him to the dedication at the Autry.

And while he didn't become a pilot, LeVett still managed to indulge his love of flying at the stick of his Cessna 182 and his favorite, a Cessna 414 Chancellor.

Richards said he's sad not just for his own loss, but for Carmel's. "I will always be so incredibly grateful to him. He was a super special guy to me, and next to my dad and my brother, he was a big deal in my life," he said. In fact, Richards knew LeVett far longer than he knew his father, whom he lost when he was 22.

"Denny had the ability to make everyone he met feel like he was their best friend," Rose said. "And in Denny's case, it was heartfelt and legitimate."

"He's going to be a loss to this community," Chrietzberg said. "There's no question about that.'

LeVett is survived by daughters Amanda and Kate, and wife Jeanne. He was predeceased by his former wife, Karen. The family is planning a celebration of his life and

where they are generally recognized as a relatively benign small housing type incidental to existing residences."

The county's new rules will make it easier to build accessory dwelling units, according to staff.

'Desperately needed'

"The proposed amendment would expand where ADUs are allowed to include all zones that currently allow for single-family residences," the report continues. "Minimum parcel size requirements would be eliminated and ADUs would be allowed in North County, unincorporated Carmel and Big Sur without numeric limitation."

The county plan includes some area-specific rules, including a "length of tenancy requirements in Big Sur to encourage longer-term housing available for workers.'

In all, coastal commission staff contend the county's plan "adequately balances" concerns raised by both sides and "should provide for critically needed housing in a manner protective of the region's extraordinary resource values."

Lucas Handy, South Coast representative on the Big Sur Multi-Agency Advisory Council, is backing the county's plan.

'Our community is in the midst of a critical housing crisis," Handy said. "Service workers, small families, and longtime residents are being displaced as property values rise, and absentee ownership increases in our community. Removing the restrictive cap and allowing ADUs under the staff's proposed framework is extremely essential — it would create desperately needed housing for our local workforce and families while maintaining the environmental safeguards that protect this treasured coastline.'

But Big Sur resident Trey Kropp is concerned the new rules will remove a needed layer of oversight by taking the local land use advisory council out of the review process.

"The shift to the administrative track effectively removes review by the land use council from the process," Kropp said. "In Big Sur, that means the community loses its only meaningful avenue for early input on ADUs."

Big Sur resident Heidi Hopkins supports the relaxed rules, but not if they're used to create short-term rentals.

"Big Sur faces an excruciating affordable housing shortage," Hopkins wrote to the coastal commission. "My support


for the amendment is contingent on the amendment also prohibiting the use of ADUs for short-term rentals. Short-term rentals are among the activities that exacerbate the current housing shortage."

Also chiming in is Patte Kronlund, president of the Community Association of Big Sur, which endorsed the county's plan.

"This amendment contains practical

changes in policy that will benefit both the Big Sur community and the millions of people who visit Big Sur each year," added Kronlund, who noted that it will "allow for an increase in available housing stock while maintaining all existing coastal resource protections."

any climate and in all weather, from seabed to space," NPS said. "Understanding and accurately predicting operational environments remain critical to effective force planning, readiness and warfighter resilience that NPS enables as a center of academic excellence for the Navy and DOD."

The oceanographic and meteorological data will be available to other institutions that study Monterey Bay, according to the Naval Postgraduate School.

"The Monterey area is home to a wealth of important scientific and marine laboratories, which are invited to utilize the data collected by the buoy for collaborative research," it said, including the U.S. Coast Guard, National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, Naval Research Lab, Stanford University, Monterey Bay Aquarium Research Institute and the Western Flyer.

The above-water portion of the buoy measures 29 feet high and is painted in high-vis yellow to distinguish it from navigational buoys, which are typically red, green or yellow. It's located 5 miles north of NPS and about 3 miles offshore at its closest point to the coast.

surprising. After careful discussion, we voted for an ordinance to prohibit pickleball at Forest Hill Park while studying sound-mitigation options. Staff was also directed to prepare a resolution to wind down the Mills Act program. Designed in the 1970s to encourage historic preservation, it was felt it no longer fits Carmel's high-value real estate market. Council believes there may be better ways to help owners of historic homes reduce costs and streamline improvements.

Each action reflects a council that listens, weighs options and balances immediate needs with long-term sustainability. Residents participated throughout - exactly as it should be. As mayor, I couldn't be prouder of our dedicated staff, our thoughtful council and commissions, and the positive, constructive engagement of our community.

City government works best when we all work together, and Carmel is proving how powerful that can be.

■ Public safety at new level

Perhaps the most important advance this week came in public safety. As of Wednesday, Monterey Fire officially is managing not only our fire service. but also our ambulance operations. That means faster response times, advanced paramedic support on every engine, and the backing of a larger, fully staffed department. Carmel residents and visitors now benefit from one of the most capable emergency response systems in the region. Combined with future street addresses, we've raised the bar significantly.

On their own, these decisions addresses, water allocations, design standards, quiet neighborhoods, forestry, preservation policy and emergency services — may look unrelated. Together, they define how success should be measured: not by one big project, but by a steady stream of choices that improve quality of life, enhance safety and preserve Carmel's character.

Success isn't abstract. It's a chainsaw safely removing a dangerous limb. It's an ambulance arriving more quickly. It's peace and quiet. It's a visitor or delivery driver finding the right house. It's knowing when to act decisively — and when to pause and study before moving forward.



Jurors were shown photographs of Garcia's injuries received in the fight with Pompa, including a cut to her left eye and injury to her hand.

Pompa also "did willfully attempt by means of threats and violence to deter and prevent" Rodriquez from arresting him and "did knowingly resist" Rodriquez "by the use of force and violence," the complaint says. Both officers testified at the trial.

Other violent crimes

Despite the violent nature of the July incident — and a criminal history which includes battery on a police officer Pompa is facing a maximum prison term of five years and eight months.

According to court records, Pompa pleaded guilty to felony assault with a deadly weapon in 2022. While the court does not indicate a defendant's immigration status, Pompa initialed a box on a court form acknowledging that if he "is not a citizen of the United States" his guilty plea would result in "automatic deportation" from the country. He faced four years in prison for the assault, but it's not clear how much time he spent behind bars.

In September 2023, he was charged with battery with injury on a peace officer, resisting arrest, destroying someone else's vehicle, and battering two other people. While some of the charges were dropped, he was convicted on other charges and sentenced to two years in a state prison in Kern County.

Monterey County Superior Court Judge Rafael Vazquez, who presided over Pompa's trial, is set to sentence him Dec. 4.

Teaching kids to read Dear Editor,

An article on the front page of last week's Pine Cone asserted that phonics-based reading instruction was used in California classrooms before the 1980s but since then has "fallen out of favor." This left readers with the impression that phonemic awareness has not been used as the foundation for emergent literacy instruction in our Monterey County schools for the last 40 years.

As a former director of teacher education at CSUMB and as a faculty member in the education department from the earliest years after its founding to 2021, I want Pine Cone readers to know that:


■ The California Commission on Teacher Credentialing has not, and would not, accredit a teacher training institution in our state that does not include evidence-based reading instruction grounded

in phonemic awareness.

- The teacher training programs of your local university, CSUMB, have been, and continue to be, accredited by the commission.
- As a faculty member, I visited classrooms throughout our county to observe reading instruction from 1998 to 2021 for the supervision of student teachers of CSUMB. I observed phonemic awareness instruction in the classrooms and school districts I visited.
- During the eight years of the G.W. Bush administration (2001-2009), underperforming schools in our county were required to adopt and implement phonics curriculum programs.
- The Monterey County Office of Education provided in-service phonemic awareness instruction for our county's teachers throughout the years of the Bush administration.

These observations are my own and are not official statements of CSUMB, its administration or faculty.

Revamped playoff scheme raises hopes for field hockey teams

HERE'S A brief, albeit bleak history of the Monterey Peninsula's legacy in the Central Coast Section field hockey playoffs, along with some reasons to believe much better times could be ahead:

The Peninsula school with most appearances at CCS, Stevenson, is 0-6 there since 2003, including losses in 2019, 2022, 2023 and 2024. The Pirates are almost certain

to qualify again this fall.

Monterey has played in the CCS playoffs five times, in 1997, 2002, 2007, 2011 and 2021, falling in the first round each year.

The Carmel Padres made their first CCS field hockey appearance in 2022, becoming the first — and only — Peninsula team to advance when they battled Homestead to a 0-0 tie in regulation, then won an overtime shootout, 3-2. CHS figures to qualify again, for the fourth consecutive time

Santa Catalina made CCS for the first time in 2024, losing 1-0 to Presentation.

Long overdue change

But there's a glow on the horizon. For the first time in the five-decade history of the sectional field hockey playoffs, the CCS tournament will be separated into two brackets — Division 1 and Division 2 — a change designed to keep good teams at small schools from being matched up with great teams from huge schools in first- or second-round games.

"I think that gives us a lot more hope and optimism that we could win our first-round game, at least," said Carmel coach Andrea Smith. "We won't be in the same bracket with everybody else anymore."

Three schools from the Pacific Coast Athletic League

will earn postseason berths, something that's only happened one previous time, last year, when Stevenson, Carmel and Catalina all went.

Stevenson (7-0 PCAL, 9-5-1 overall through Monday) and Carmel (6-1, 8-4) hold the inside track on postseason qualification, with Monterey, Hollister and Salinas in a skirmish over a possible third playoff spot.

Carmel played at Stevenson on Wednesday for the second time this year. The Pirates won the first one, 2-1 at Carmel, in early September.

Greenfield (1-4) and Santa Catalina (0-7) appear to be out of contention.

Most likely to succeed at CCS is a Stevenson team that graduated just four players from a squad that won the 2024

PCAL crown with an 11-0-1 record. The list of returning Pirates begins with center defender Lucy Aiello and forward Georgia Bonifas — both first-team All-PCAL players last year — plus second-team all-leaguers Molly McAfee, the center midfielder, and left-side defender Sydney Holland. All are seniors.

Balanced attack

"Our lineup has a very strong middle spine, and the other part of that skeleton is our right middle, Mary Zewert, another senior," said Pirates coach Rosanna McCormick.

A balanced attack centers around junior veterans

Bonifas was the league's Defensive Player of the Year - with Ducker, LeTowt and Schipper on the second team.

Seniors Sophie Smith, Savannah De Coursey-Hughes, Katie Vandendriesche and backup goalie Gigi Thoreaux, along with junior Paige Skinner, also are formidable members of the deepest roster (26 players) McCormick has coached since coming to Stevenson from Monterey High.

Explosive scorer

Through Monday, the No. 1 scorer in high school field hockey in California was Carmel senior Ava Staehle, who had carpet-bombed her opponents with 32 goals in just 12 games. Her scoring proficiency ranks fourth in the nation — but she's No. 1 in the U.S. among players who have played fewer than 13 games.

And Staehle, by the way, is multitasking this fall as a running back, receiver and defensive standout on the Padres' flag football team, where she leads the team in interceptions and flag pulls (the game's version of tackles).

"Flag football coach Phil Johnston and I have had some fights over Ava, but her priority is field hockey. So, she misses games — but not my games," said Smith, whose star is a four-sport jock at







also gave her something concrete to hand off to contractors.

Boyle, 54, became a certified interior designer in 2013, a process that involved qualifying through education and experience and passing an exam. She opened her own business that year, when her first child was about a year old. "I wanted to give my son the same illusion I had about my parents — we 'don't work' because we're always home."

Shawn is her "biggest cheerleader," she confirmed. They met on a building project in which he worked in the environmental division and she was part of the architec-

Their boys, 11 and 14, "know I'm a designer who mostly wears boots — cute boots — to work," Boyle said.

Early on, when one son had to stay home from preschool because he was under the weather, Boyle had a meeting she couldn't cancel, so she took him to the job site. She put a little blue hard hat on him, and he played - under a foreman's watchful eye — on a mound of dirt while she talked shop.

"He found a 2-foot piece of rebar," she said, and when she put him in his car seat to head home, she saw he'd fallen fast asleep, clutching the metal rod like some kids

Self-employment has made it possible for her to volunteer in her kids' classrooms and chaperone field trips. Initially, she built her business by networking with realtors and joining community organizations, but now, most of her clients come from realtor referrals and word-of-mouth from happy customers.

Their satisfaction with her work is fulfilling for Boyle. And, she said, she recently relished working with clients who "didn't care about the current trends — their entire home was about what brings them joy."

Form and function

An interior designer — a term that's only been around since the 1930s — looks at structure and functionality, "moving a wall, having a window instead of a door," and the like, explained Boyle. It's pretty personal, too, she

"People have to tell me their deepest, darkest secrets," Boyle half-joked. She asks questions like, do they really use those chef-y appliances in the kitchen, or should they be stored elsewhere until they're needed?

And if you've ever been flummoxed by a corner cabinet with inaccessible space, she's a kindred spirit. "Only a toddler can get into some of them," she said.

Boyle's own Pacific Grove home, built in 1949, had a kitchen that wasn't terribly functional, with shallow countertops and a wall with "saloon doors" opening into a laundry room. Her redesign included eliminating that wall and putting a butcher block counter atop the washer and dryer,

as well as increasing counter space and improving storage.
In "Sundays with Sarah," in addition to showing prospective clients how a well-designed kitchen can work for them, she wants to help people make home cooking part

She learned from her mother, who appears in one of the episodes. Mom not only cooked meals from scratch, but canned her own foods.

"We'd do things like go pick the cucumbers and then make pickles," she reminisced. Mother and daughter watched Julia Child together, too. Her dad appeared in a special Fathers' Day episode where they made jerky.

"If you love your kitchen, delicious things will come out of it," Boyle observed. One tip is simply to "be mindful of what you use most and put in in reach of the area where you're going to use it."

Keeping them together

For example, coffee drinkers should put mugs, filters, coffee grounds and related accessories together, preferably somewhere near the coffeemaker. She also recommends putting a favorite recipe on a Post-It inside a cabinet door so you don't have to look it up every time. Boyle loves making pancakes and crepes from scratch, so those ingredients are easy to find, as is the recipe.

"I don't think my kids realize you can buy pancake mix. They're cooking now, 'doing science,'" she said proudly. "It breaks my heart when people say, 'I can't cook.' Give yourself grace."

In addition to her business, cooking show, and family obligations, Boyle volunteers on the City of Pacific Grove's architectural review board. "I love my community and its architectural charm and diversity," she said.



become a commercial diver instead.

Daughter Marina, 32, a retired U.S. Marine Corps infantry officer, is studying medicine at Geisinger College of Health Sciences in Scranton, Pa., with plans to become a pediatrician.

Their youngest, Suzanne, 30, earned an economics degree from Colgate University, studied design for a summer at Harvard, worked in communications for a landscape architecture firm, then became a data scientist in New York City. She's in a master's program at the University of Michigan, applying data science to environmental problems.

Tom's interest in photography was "progressively sidelined by family and work obligations," he wrote in an artist's statement.

'Humbling and inspiring'

"My wife became the family photographer when the kids were growing up," he said of Karyn, who had a career as a drug and alcohol counselor.

She volunteers at multiple places, including Montage's Ohana Center for Child and Adolescent Behavior Health.




